Students Are Greeted By Week of Activities

Trinity Seminary Holds Opening Day

Speaking on the subject "Theology and the Pastoral Ministry," Rev. Erhardt Nielsen, pastor at Audubon, Iowa, delivered the opening day lecture at Trinity seminary on September 10, 1951.

After the lecture a reception was held at which the Dean of Seminary Theodore Jensen was master of ceremonies. The program consisted of a brief talk by Dr. R. E. Morton and a vocal solo by Joe Andersen who sang "Trust in Thee."

In the evening a communion service was held at the First Lutheran church. Dr. Ethan Mengers gave the confessional address and was assisted by Prof. Paul Nyholm in conducting the communion service.

Hansen President

Bill Hansen, former vice-president of the student body has taken over the president's duties this year in the absence of President-elect Elmer Petersen who was drafted into the army last August.

The vice-president is elected by the student council each year from out of its ranks and assumes the office of president if that office becomes vacant.

Since becoming president, Bill has been forced to give up his position as social director on the campus, and the post has been awarded to Esther Lank. Esther stated that she promises to promote nothing but the best in the way of social activity.

A week of heavy activities principally for the freshmen came to a close on Sunday evening, September 9, when Dr. R. E. Morton, president of Dana college, addressed the student body at the opening convocation. This marked the official opening of the college for the 1951-52 year.

Dr. Morton chose as his topic, "Why Christian Higher Education," stressing as one thing essential in education today, is the training of Christian leaders in all branches of society.

Tuesday, September 4, was marked with freshmen receiving their entrance tests. The tests might well be called an initial endurance period for the freshmen as they lasted for a total of six hours on Tuesday and 2½ hours on Wednesday afternoon.

An all school mixer was held in the gymnasium on Tuesday evening at which time the freshmen were able to become acquainted with each other as well as the upper classmen. Bill Hansen, student body president, was in charge of the games, and Don Olsen led the students in singing afterwards.

Literally going through the mill as far as hand shaking is concerned the student body met the faculty at a reception held Friday evening. Everyone had the privilege of meeting personally every member of the faculty. One of the events of the evening was the presentation of the history of Dana by a faculty member, Prof. Richard Videbeck. He was assisted in his presentation by two live puppets, Prof. Keith Skogman and Prof. Paul Petersen.

Full Year Scheduled For Dana Students

Students at Dana may look forward to a year that is filled with many activities varying from religious to entertaining.

Spiritual Emphasis days will open the year with Rev. Phillip S. Dybvig, executive director of department of home missions of the Evangelical Lutheran church, as the speaker.

Already in the process of being planned is the 1951 Homecoming scheduled for October 26-28. Included in the weekend will be a banquet Saturday evening at which Dr. Lawrence Acker, well-

known speaker on the Lutheran Hour and pastor of First Lutheran church in Omaha, will be the guest speaker. On Friday night the Vikings will clash with Friends university from Wichita, Kans.

Coming from different colleges in Kansas and Nebraska, approximately 150 students will meet at Dana when the fall conference of the Lutheran Student association, midwest region, gets under way on November 9-11.

Shortly after this conference will follow one of the highlights of the year. The Don Cossack chorus, an outstanding group of male singers, will present one of its dashing programs as part of the lyceum series.

Dana's Enrollment Soars to 241

Registration statistics for the first semester at Dana this year are better than had been expected. It is reported that there are 241 full time students enrolled.

Besides these 241 students, there are 8 part time students. Five of them are enrolled in post graduate work, and the other 3 are special students. In addition to this there are 24 seminary students.

Dana has representatives from 19 states and 3 foreign countries this year. The geographical distribution is as follows: Nebraska 78 students, Iowa 62, Wisconsin 34, Minnesota 14, California 13, Illinois 8, Michigan 6, New York 5, North Dakota 5, Arkansas 3, Maine 2, Montana 2, Oregon 2, Kansas 1, Massachusetts 1, Missouri 1, South Dakota 1, Wyoming 1.

From the foreign countries there are: Canada 3, Denmark 2, and Estonia 2.

Dr. Kirby Page Speaks Monday

Speaking on the theme, "The Christian Answer to Communism," Dr. Kirby Page, noted Christian leader, will appear in Pioneer Memorial chapel on September 24 at 8:00 p.m.

Dr. Page, who has been given the title, "Circuit Rider for Peace" by the **Christian Advocate**, has traveled over 1,000,000 miles on his speaking tours for the building of peace. He has spoken before more than 400 colleges and universities and in more than 1,000 churches.

Around the Globe

Senator Paul Douglas (Dem. Ill.) screamed and left the Senate floor when he heard the administration's military tax proposal (61 billion dollars).

Secretary of Defense George Marshall resigned this week to be succeeded by Robert A. Lovett, well known in Washington as a competent administrator of 10 years experience in high government posts.

Secretary of State Dean Acheson distinguished himself at the San Francisco conference for ratification of the Japanese peace treaty by blocking Soviet attempts to scuttle the pact.

Foreign Secretaries of Great Britain, France and the U. S. are negotiating a contract to grant Western Germany full sovereignty in exchange for their participation in Western defense. Russia is expected to fight this tooth and nail. The communist propaganda grist mill is turning out tales of a German army being built to invade Russia.

Egypt is trying to evict Great Britain from the vicinity of the Suez canal and the Sudan.

The Editor Thinks Bob Hemmingson

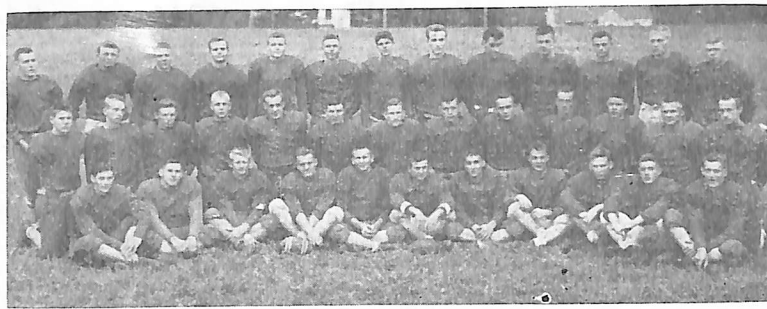

Dana Plays Tarkio In Conference Tilt

Tarkio college, Tarkio, Mo. will be Dana's first game in the newly organized Central Church College conference. This conference is composed of only four colleges so each game will be of great value in deciding the conference champions.

Tarkio has been on the Vikings schedule for the past four years. In these four contests the results are even at two wins and two losses for each school. The scoring has never been high and the greatest margin of victory is by 13 points. The scores from 1947 through 1950 are as follows: 7-13, 6-0, 7-20 and 13-7. From these scores one can visualize the competition when these two teams meet on the cold and hard gridiron. This game is always a very spired and a highly competitive one.

There is one jinx which the Vikings are going to have to upset this year and that is by defeating the Owls on their home gridiron. Don't forget on September 21 the Vikings are going to give the Tarkio boosters a new set of scenery because victory points towards the Vikings.

The third quarter was also a defensive battle with the Vikings having difficulty stopping the Midland passing attack. Brad Clapman went high into the air in end zone for the Warriors to pull down a 40 yard pass from Kenneth Johnson. This was the only scoring of the game as the conversion went low.

Mid-way in the fourth quarter the Vikes seemed to have an offensive rolling but Midland started to rough it up. The tragedy of the game came when halfback, Mark Thomsen, was hit hard by a Midland griddier and suffered an injury. The injury amounted to a bruised and slightly cracked fibula and will keep Mark out of action for two weeks and maybe longer. Last year Mark led the Vikings in scoring and was ninth in scoring on national records, with a total of 93 points during 1950 season.

After Thomson left the game the Vikings failed to play a very impressive game. Neither team scored in the fourth quarter and the score at the final horn was Midland-6, Dana-0.
