### Prof. T. I. Jensen Students to Attend Granted Leave Evangelism Meeting

Leaving the campus at the end of the first semester will be Prof. T. I. Jensen, dean of Trinity seminary. Prof. Jensen will enroll in the Divinity School of the University of Chicago in March to continue his graduate study.

Dr. Ethan Mengers has been appointed acting dean of the seminary to replace Prof. Jensen by the Board of Education.

Prof. Jensen's leave of absence is part of the policy of Trinity seminary, which allows one professor to be absent one semester of the year.

Although Prof. Jensen will not be leaving for Chicago until March, he will not teach at all during the semester. During his absence the other professors of the seminary, Prof. C. B. Larsen, Prof. Paul Nyholm and Dr. Mengers, will teach the courses which Prof. Jensen would otherwise teach.

### Council Discusses Plans for Office

In the past few weeks, members of the student council have discussed the possibility of securing a room in Old Main to be used by the council. Files will be kept from year to year on such items as the work on the Homecoming and May Festival committees and also on the various organizations of Dana.

It was also decided that each club must have a constitution. The council is now studying the various organizations and looking into their plans for next semester. If the club does not meet the standards or does not show signs of beneficial activity, they will be asked to disorganize if they cannot improve.

A "Stuffer sheet" is being discussed which will contain extra news or controversial subjects when there is not enough room in the *Hermes*.

This past year the student directory has not been issued to all the students. However, the student council is planning to begin the issuance of blue books to all students.

A number of Trinity seminary students plan to attend the largest evangelism conference in the history of the Lutheran Church in America. All the Lutheran bodies of the National Lutheran Council are united in this gigantic effort in Minneapolis, Jan. 23-27. The conference will be held in the Armory which seats about 10,000 people. Pastors, students and laymen from all parts of the country will attend this evangelism conference.

The theme of the conference will be "Share Christ Today." The sessions will be devoted to training men to do evangelistic work as well as to inspire all. The Sunday evening service will be broadcasted over the Liberty Broadcasting company network.

Trinity seminary students also attended the annual Nebraska Town and Country Church conference on Jan. 15 and 16. The conference was held at the Activities building on the campus of the College of Agriculture, University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

Among the prominent speakers was Governor Val Petersen. Timely topics such as "The Missouri River Basin Project," "The Message of the Church for the Rural Family," "Farming—A Christian Vocation" and other equally important and helpful subjects were discussed. An all-Lutheran dinner meeting was held the first evening.

### 'Oxbow Incident' To Be Next Film

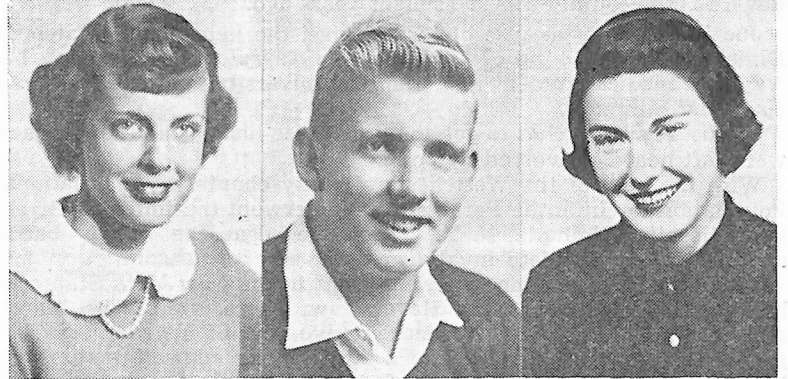

## Christian Living Emphasized In Sunday Memorial Service

Tragedy struck the Dana college campus with the death of Bonnie Dealy, Peggy Kinion and Hal Cole and the injury of Janet Justesen in an automobile accident at Needles, Calif. on Dec. 22. Dr. C. C. Madsen led the memorial service held for these students in the Pioneer Memorial chapel, Sunday, Jan 13, at which Dr. R. E. Morton and John Nielsen, Trinity seminary student who was at the scene of the accident, spoke.

Dr. Morton said that we know death exists, but it was brought

close to us now. People ask the question, "Why?" The real question is, "What are the lessons to be learned from the facts of life?"

In the easy circumstances of our campus we should live a better Christian life. But for the grace of God we could be before the judgment throne. We must live a more effective, convincing and positive Christian life.

John Nielsen read from II Corinthians 1:3-22. He said that when everyone left the campus that last Thursday no one realized what would happen. What we have often read about happened; yet through this, God was speaking clearly to us.

The ones at the accident and the families of the students killed in the accident saw their prayers answered. Tragedy turned to triumph. Sorrow turned to joy. Death turned into life. He said that you cannot see parents of the students comforting their friends without seeing Jesus. You cannot see vital living Christianity without having your own faith strengthened.

Jesus Christ died that we might live eternally. Were these three students in the newness of their faith more ready to go than we? There is no doubt but what Peggy, Bonnie and Hal were ready to go. What made Hal in one of his writings shortly before Christmas speak about the uncertainty of death and the permanence of God? What made Bonnie take her Testament with her? What made Peggy pray so hard for her friends and roommates?

In the face of everything we cannot help but know the uncertainty of life. We should become children of God and dedicate our lives to God.

### Booklet Published Plan to Stimulate Covering Dana Life Enrollment Given

Pictures will be the accent in a new booklet being published by the faculty committee on student retention and recruitment. The twenty-eight page, 8½ in. by 10 in booklet is a pictorial view of the curricular and extra-curricular life at Dana.

The view book will be sent to high school graduates.

Two other booklets are planned for early publication. One will cover extra-curricular activities on the campus, and the other will be directed to the parents of prospective students.

The faculty committee includes Coach Paul Peterson, chairman, Prof. Richard Videbeck, Prof. A. J. Snowbeck, Coach Keith Skogman and Mr. Homer Nielsen. Paul Jahnke is the committee's photographer, and Dick Andersen is layout assistant.

Plans were offered in a special chapel meeting Dec. 19, concerning the encouragement of growth in Dana's enrollment. The plan is to encourage students to go out and recruit new students for the college.

In a recent statement by Coach Paul Peterson, chairman of the committee on student retention and recruitment, clarification was made of the plans originally presented.

As an incentive and aid, students will each be offered the opportunity, if they desire, to draw from an expense account of \$15 prior to June 1 and \$10 after that date. This expense account, which will be applied to a student's tuition, will cover the costs involved by students in contacting new students.

# Dimes Helped Joe Bilbao

Joe Bilbao of Tarrytown, N. Y., was an average American teenage boy from an average American home.

He had done well in his studies and better than that in athletics. Joe had co-captained his high school football team. and he had swum across the Hudson River, accomplishments rated much better than "average." Today Joe is 25 and well on the road toward becoming a doctor. But between these achievements Joe had polio.

He was 17 and had just signed up for the pilot-training program of the Naval Air Corps when he was stricken. For awhile he seemed down for the count. That was eight years ago.

Joe is up again because of his courage, the help of the March of Dimes and the backing of his friends in Tarrytown. He is on his way as a medical student at Columbia University's college of Physicians and Surgeons.

Joe uses two crutches to get about, because his legs and lower back were left heavily involved by polio.

With the help of the Westchester County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, he underwent treatment at Grasslands hospital, Valhalla, N. Y. There he began the tough battle against almost complete invalidism.

The second phase came when Joe went to the New York State Rehabilitation hospital at West Haverstraw. Here, again with March of Dimes help, Joe began the more active part of his recovery program. He found he could make a full life for himself within the limitations imposed by polio. He learned that a man could accomplish a lot with a good head and shoulders.

The March of Dimes is not a charity. It is a voluntary movement by the American people aimed at ridding the world of one of its greatest scourges—poliomyelitis. Polio is one of the world's most expensive diseases to treat. The iron lungs, braces and long hospitalization often involved in polio treatment are beyond the financial reach of four out of five of all those who are stricken. The March of Dimes comes to the patient's aid, not giving alms — but as part of its aim to fight the disease whenever and wherever it is found. The March of Dimes represents help freely given by all Americans for the benefit of those particular Americans who have suffered the accident of polio.

New second semester library fines now in force are 5c a day on 2 week books; 50c first hour on reserve books, 25c each additional hour.

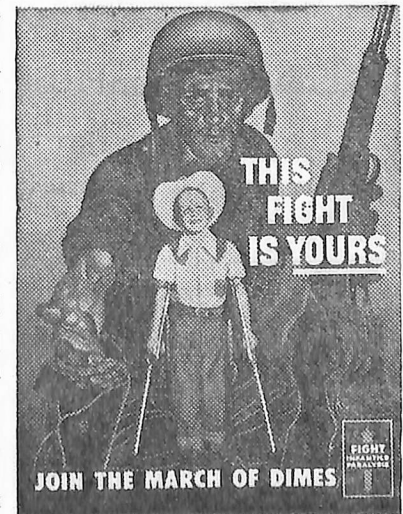
