

Iowa U. Professor To Give Lectures

Mr. Paul Engle, director of the creative writing department of the University of Iowa, will present two lectures at the college on April 24.

The author of six books including "American Song," "West of Midnight" and "American Child" will give a public lecture entitled "Poetry and People" in Pioneer Memorial chapel at 9:50 a.m.

Addressing advanced composition students and others interested in writing, Mr. Engle will also lecture on creative writing at 8:50 a.m.

Mr. Engle has addressed groups in all parts of the United States and England and has received noteworthy comment from many colleges and universities.

Miss McCullough Will Lead Summer Tour to Alaska

"All Aboard for Alaska" will be the cry for thirty-five teachers on July 28 when a tour led by Miss Elja McCullough begins.

Consisting mainly of teachers from Wayne State Teachers college although Jo Ann Jacob will represent Dana, Miss McCullough will guide the group to Yellowstone and Glacier National parks; Lake Louise, Canada; Anchorage, Alaska; and other places. They will travel along the noted Inside Passage to Skagway by steamship, past Prince Rupert and fishing centers in Alaska. Lasting approximately 24 days the tour will include a 1,000 mile plane trip in Alaska. Homeward, the group will have stops in Portland, Salt Lake City and Denver.

Guiding tours is not new to Miss McCullough, but began when she was a county superintendent. Sponsored by Wayne State Teachers college, her first tour took a group of teachers through the western part of the United States. The geography of Nebraska was studied in a second tour, while on a third, the teachers traveled to the southeastern part of the United States into Cuba.

These tours are for the purpose of educating teachers through travel. They are an explicit help in the studying and teaching of social sciences for the grade school teachers and may be taken for credit on a degree.

Plans are now under way for Dana to offer a tour for credit next year led by Miss McCullough. The Southwest is being considered for this tour extending into Mexico and the Panama Canal Zone. It is also hoped that a trip might be arranged to Europe in the near future. All present students, as well as Dana graduates who are now teaching should contact Miss McCullough for information if interested.

Trustees Adopt Budget, Decide Tuition Increase

Meeting on the campus April 2 and 3 the Dana board of trustees adopted a budget of \$278,755 for the coming year including a request of \$75,000 from the synod. This is an increase of \$34,755 over this year's budget.

Tuition will be increased five dollars per semester next year with the increase being used to raise faculty salaries, since present salaries are below the North Central association salary standard.

The administration, together with Mr. P. A. Magnussen, was instructed to investigate the possibility of acquiring additional private housing facilities in Blair for students. The board also decided that students applying for an apartment in the housing units after April 1 of this year must not only meet the qualifications established several years ago, but they must also have been married at least two years or have parental status at the time of application.

The board decided to go ahead with the preliminary work on the proposed gym project. Dr. Morton contacted Mr. Milton Bergstedt, a St Paul architect, last week to get the work started on plans and sketches.

The exterior of units A and C of the housing units will be refinished with plywood and painted this summer, it was also announced.

'This We Believe' Theme of Ashram

"This We Believe" will be the theme of the 1952 Lutheran Student Association Regional Ashram when it convenes at Camp Cedars, Stromsburg, Nebr., April 25-27.

Consisting of interest groups, Bible study, worship, fellowship and recreation the Ashram is an annual event. Leading speaker this year will be Dr. Gerhard Gieschen, a professor at Central seminary, Fremont. Bible studies will be led by Rev. J. H. Shiery of Wayne, Nebr.

Dana's part in the program will include a vesper service on Friday evening.

With a succession of swift, tense scenes the film, "Of Mice and Men," succeeds in making John Steinbeck's novel and play an artistic production.

Actor Lon Chaney, Jr., plays his first big role as Lennie, a fellow who seems to have a well-meant but heavy-handed way of stroking puppies, mice and women into rigor mortis. 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Golf Team Wins, Dana Places Tennis Team Loses Third in Meet

Playing its first game of the season last Wednesday, Dana's tennis team was defeated at Lincoln by Nebraska Wesleyan by a score of 6-0.

Steve Sutton, playing in the number one singles spot, lost 6-0, and 6-1. Number two man, Russ Eckert, lost 6-4, then won 9-7 and then lost 6-2. Leon Piphon, playing in the third spot, lost 6-0 and 6-1 as did Paul Nyholm who played fourth.

In doubles Steve and Russ lost 6-4, then won 6-3 and lost the final game 6-3. Leon and Paul were defeated 6-2 and 6-3.

The golf team fared far better. They pounded out victories over both Wesleyan and Concordia on that day. The Dana boys outsocked Wesleyan 7½-4½ and Concordia 9½-2½. Charlie Pedersen playing top man was low scorer for Dana. Points were based on a point for each nine and a point for the eighteen. Other members of the team are Boyd Nelson, Tom Nelson and Dick Jacobsen.

"Little" Ken Christensen started off the Dana hitting by singling in the first inning. Jack Scott followed this hit with a triple. Two runs were scored in the initial inning when Scott scored on a grounder by "Smiles" Jackson.

In the second inning the Vikings scored again as Ingvert Appel walked and Rod Knudsen tripled. Midland came back in the fourth and fifth innings, however, with a run crossing the plate in each frame, but this was all the Warriors could get as Tom Christensen and Jack Scott pitched brilliant ball the rest of the game.

Dana obtained another score in the seventh on two walks and a pair of hits and tallied two more in the eighth as Vaughn Christensen singled with the bases loaded.

At the plate Jack Scott was the

Wesleyan Wins Triangular Meet, Dana Places Third

Dana trackmen placed third in their second meet of the season, a triangular affair between Nebraska Wesleyan, the winner of the meet, Concordia and Dana held at Nebraska Wesleyan university, April 16.

Mark Thomsen and Neil Moore proved to be the bright spots in a rather dismal afternoon. Thomsen won the 100 yard dash turning in a time of 10.5 and placed second in the 220 with a time of 22.8. Moore took first in the 220 low hurdles in 26.1 and second in the 120 high hurdles with a time of 16.4.

Dana's 880 relay team composed of Jack Allen, Bob Coffey, Moore and Thomsen was literally nosed out of first place by Wesleyan. Wesleyan's time was 1:36.1 while Dana's was 1:36.18.

Dana's other second place was gained by Coffey in the mile. Vikings who placed third were Allen in the 100, Harry Landbo in the two mile and Gay Mengers in the 880 and the 440.

Fourth places were gained by Allen in the 220, Moore in the javelin, Olaf Alquist in the pole vault and Mengers tied fourth in the high jump.

The final scores for the meet were Nebraska Wesleyan 69, Concordia 67½ and Dana 33½.

Coach Keith Skogman said that Dana was hurt by their weakness in the field events. He also stated that Dana's chances in the conference meet, which will be held May 17, are not too good since the Viking team lacks depth.

Opening competition for the Dana track team saw the thin-clads humbled by Omaha university and Concordia college in the indoor triangular meet held Friday, April 4. Omaha U scored 96½ points. Concordia placed second with 40 points and Dana third with 22½. The meet was held in the Omaha fieldhouse.

Neil Moore led the Vikings placing second in the high hurdles and third in the lows. He also ran on the mile relay team which came in second behind Omaha. Neil posted an :08.5 to take second and :07.8 in the mark in the 60 yd. high hurdles lows for the third place.

The 60 yd. dash was won by Omaha in a mark of :06.4. Mark Thomsen took second being a tenth of a second behind. Lloyd Lorensen came in third in the 440.

Gerhardt Mengers and Bob Coffey came in third and fourth in the 880. Gay's time was 2:14.8.

Dana picked up a third and fourth in the distance with Coffey rounding out the victors in the mile run, and Harry Landbo setting a consistent pace in the two mile for the third spot. Bob's time for the mile was 5:03.7.

Outclassed and outmanned in the field events, the Vikings were able only to garner a tie for second in the pole vault and a fourth in the high jump. Ole Ahlquist vaulted close to 11 ft. to bring Dana the second place tie. Wilbur Layman, Gary Hansen and Gay Mengers settled for a fourth place tie in the high jump.
