Larson Accepts Position at Peru

Mr. F. H. Larsen, resigning this spring as Dana's registrar and business manager, has accepted a corresponding position at the State Teachers' college at Peru. He will take over the Peru State registrar's office on June 15.

Mr. Larson has handled the duties of registrar and business manager at Dana since 1945. He received his bachelor's degree from Augustana college at Rock Island, Illinois, and his master's from Nebraska university. He was a superintendent of schools for nine years before coming to Dana.

Dr. Elmer Rasmussen and Prof. A. J. Snowbeck will share the duties of registrar and business manager next year. The duties of a public relations officer will also be added to those now being vacated by Mr. Larson.

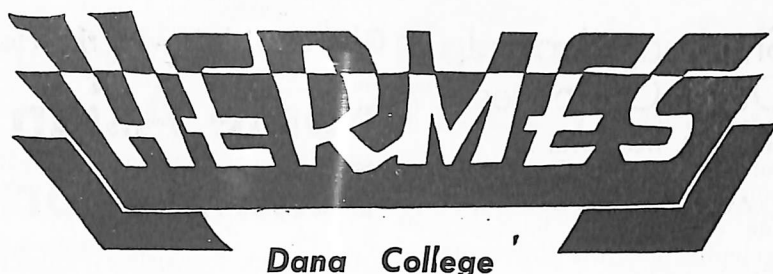
Admission is 25 cents a person.

Board Approves Budget; Relayed to Convention

The board of trustees met on the campus last week to approve a budget of \$284,375 for the fiscal year which runs from June of this year through May of next year. This sum is approximately \$2,000 higher than the budget for the current fiscal year.

Divided Between College and Seminary

\$56,800 is earmarked for the college, and \$23,000 goes for the operations of the seminary.

Education and general expenses, which include the pay roll, amount to \$207,170. Auxiliary services are allotted \$66,550. Student housing, refectory expenses and the athletic program are the top items in the latter fund. Non-educational expenses, which include maintenance, receive \$10,655.

Another \$6,700 has been set aside for Board of Trustees and Nebraska Association of Church Colleges scholarships. The number of these awards which are actually used by students each year varies.

\$80,000 of this budget will be asked for at the convention of the UELC in Audubon, Iowa, June 15-20.

Gifts also Received

Dana has also received gifts this year which amount to \$1,338 and a gift of \$1,038 from Standard Oil of Indiana acknowledged last summer. Other gifts have been from the following: L. K. Kjoller estate, \$500; Guyer and Hansen, \$250; Racine Hydraulics and Machinery, \$100; Nebraska Independent College foundation, \$388; and the Chicago Dana club, \$100.

The gift from the newly-organized College foundation is the second received by the college. None of these gifts were received

through the Dana foundation. The organization has itself received \$4,961 since June of last year.

Junior Receives Brotherhood Honor

Donovan Olson, junior, has been awarded a 300 dollar scholarship by the Lutheran Brotherhood, as announced by the May, 1954, issue of **The Bond**, a Brotherhood publication.

Twenty-six students attending four-year, liberal arts colleges were granted the scholarships on the basis of faculty recommendation for high scholastic standing and leadership.

These scholarships are given annually to a college student of junior standing, who demonstrates high scholastic achievement and leadership.

Seminarrians To Quit USB

At a meeting of the seminary student body Thursday, May 6, a proposal was presented to dissolve from the United Student Body. In revealing this action on the part of the seminary student body, Roland Hansen, president of the group, stated that they are doing this "in the interests of promoting harmony on the campus."

The proposal is now under consideration by Dr. R. E. Morton, president of the college, and Prof. Theo. I. Jensen, dean of the seminary. It is expected that they will give their approval to the action.

Recommendations will be offered by the two, who together with Hansen will meet to straighten out any difficulties arising as a result of the two bodies becoming distinct. After these have been resolved, the proposal then goes before the seminary student body for approval, before being presented in final form to the college student council.

According to Hansen, it is expected that the proposal will come out of conference next week and go before the student council.

Pushing across ten big runs in the first inning the Vikings defeated the Creighton baseball team Monday, 12-10, for their sixth win against four losses. The ten run barrage came on four hits, three walks and two Creighton errors.

Four Viking track men have qualified for the National Association of Intercollegiate Nebraska sectional track meet at Hastings, May 29. Marion Hudson qualified in the 100-yard dash, broad jump and javelin throw. Unfortunately, he failed to qualify in the high jump as qualifications were based on first and second place performances in the conference meet.

Also qualifying were Neil Moore in both hurdle races, Dean Rasmussen in the shot and discus throws and Rod Wead in the 100-yard dash. Winners at Hastings qualify for the National meet in Abilene, Texas, next month.

Concordia Takes Fourth Track Title; Dana Second

Concordia Teachers college last Saturday swept to its fourth straight CCCC track title, scoring 76 5/6 points to 51 2/3 for second place Dana and 43 1/2 for Tarkio. York's six man squad failed to score.

Hudson, Moore, Rasmussen Star

Marion Hudson, Neil Moore and Dean Rasmussen provided Dana's scoring punch, garnering six firsts, a second, a third and a fourth between them.

Hudson, competing with a badly wrenched elbow took only two throws, but his 155' 6 1/4" effort was enough to win. Arvin Quist and Neil Moore took third and fourth respectively in this event.

The top mark of the day also fell to Hudson as he sailed to a record breaking 24 ft. 1 in. broad jump victory. Later he came back to win the 100 yard dash in 10.1 seconds. Unofficial watches caught Hudson in 9.9 and 10 flat. Rod Wead finished second two feet behind Hudson.

Shotput Record Falls

Neil Moore picked up two firsts in his favorite hurdle races, narrowly missing a meet record in 120 yard highs. Dean Rasmussen smashed his own school record as he putted the shot 42' 4". He placed second in the discus and Vordyn Nelson took fourth in the same event.

The meet's biggest disappointment came in the high jump where neither Hudson nor Tom Langenfeld managed to place. Dick Orton of Tarkio and Gary Seevers of Concordia tied for first at 5' 9" on a soft take-off. Quist and Bill Ingle saved a shut out tying for fourth.

Distance Men Score

Harold Laursen placed third in the quarter mile which was won in record breaking time. Norm Hagberg finished fourth in the mile and Al Jessen scored a third in the two mile.

Dana's 880 relay team of Jim Thomsen, Laursen, Moore and Hudson finished second, inches behind Concordia.

Tennis Squad Hosts Strong Midland Team

The tennis squad closes out its season next Tuesday as they entertain powerful Midland, here. The Warriors, defending NCC champions, shut out the Vikings in an earlier contest at Midland. Dana will continue to use its same doubles combinations of Bill Lawson and Carl Nelson and Jim Thomsen and Dick Jensen. The four divide singles duty.

Luther has a small squad and is not counted on for much. The Indians scored only 17 points in a triangular meet recently with Concordia and Luther.

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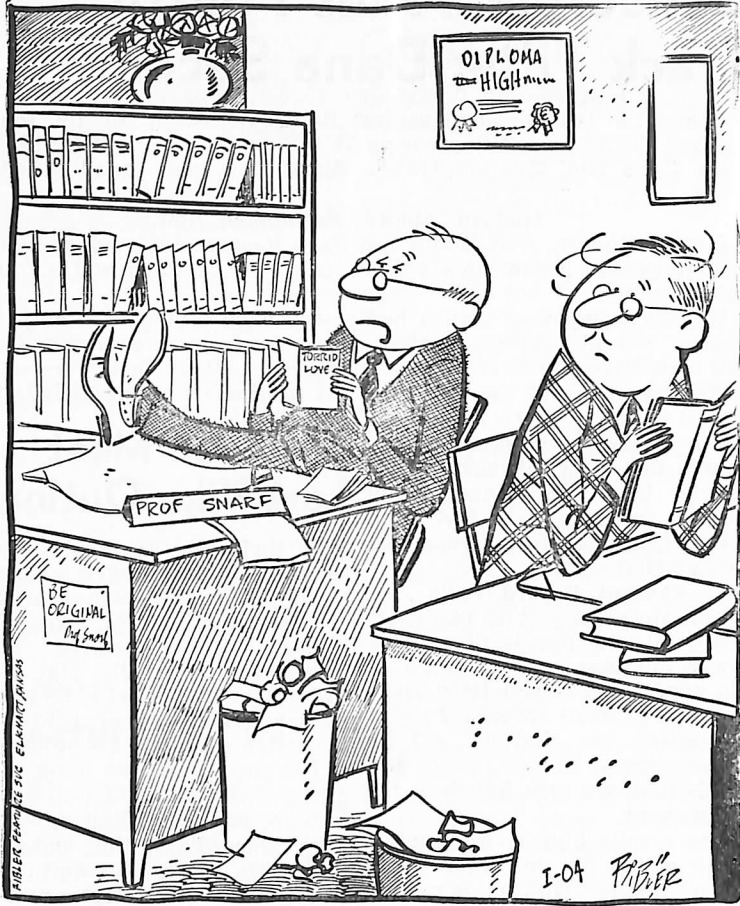
