Administration Looks Ahead... Long Range Committee Plans Future Expansion

"What" and "when" are two questions frequently raised by the members of a committee which meets almost weekly. That committee has a very ordinary name, but its responsibilities are significant. It is The Long Range Planning committee, headed by Prof. C. Arthur Christiansen with Prof. Paul Petersen, Prof. A. Gordon Ferguson, Mr. G. J. Carlsen and Dr. R. E. Morton as the other members. Mr. Peder Mickelsen is the Board of Trustee member of the committee.

The committee concerns itself with the "what" and "when" of long range plans for Dana in four areas: The physical plant, campus grounds, academic expansion and student personnel services. It attempts to lay long range plans for the Dana of tomorrow, not so much in terms of dates, but in terms of enrollment, and tries to anticipate what will be needed in the four areas for an enrollment of 300 students, of 400, 500 and 600. The committee will make its first recommendations to the Board of Trustees at that body's meeting in April.

News Notes

Dana Hosts Cage Tourney

The Dana College Women's Invitational Basketball Tournament will get underway tomorrow afternoon at 1:30 when the Dana co-eds take on a strong Tarkio six. At 3 p.m. Concordia tackles the Offut Air Force base women's team.

Winners of the two afternoon contests will meet tomorrow night in the championship game at 8:30, with a consolation tilt slated for 7.

Originally scheduled for the week-end was the CCCC women's tournament, however, York college failed to file an entry and as a result, the Offut team replaces them.

Dana's Vikettes have a season's record of two wins and three losses, including a victory over Concordia and an overtime defeat at the hands of Tarkio. Leading Dana into tourney play will be Janet Rasmussen who has averaged 18 points per contest. Also a scoring threat is Eleanor Wohlers with an average of 15.

Since A.A.U. rules will govern tournament play, spectators will probably notice a few changes in the regulations. Chief among these rule differences is a section which allows a guard to move into the forecourt or a forward to move into the backcourt. In other words one "roving" player may cross the division line.

To get an idea of how closely matched Concordia, Tarkio and Dana actually are, one need only look at the CCCC standings. Only two points separate the top three teams offensively, with each squad holding their opponents under 190 points.

Individual scoring statistics show Fritz Youra and Marion Hudson in fourth and fifth places respectively in the conference scoring race. Ginn of Tarkio is in first place with a 21-point average. Youra boasts a 15.7-point average, while Hudson has been averaging a little less than two points less. Incidentally, Youra became the first Dana cager this season to gain the "Omaha World Herald Star of the Week" mention when he received the honor this week.

Women's action . . .

Playing under an extra handicap, the Dana co-eds put up an admirable scrap against Commercial Extension, last year's Women's A.A.U. champions. Playing for the first time under A.A.U. rules, the Vikettes showed considerably more spark than the taller Omaha cagers.

Warriors Roll

Scoring only one field goal in the first 16 minutes of play, the Vikings dropped their second decision of the season to Midland, 72-52, last Friday evening on the latter's home court.

Larry Fuerst, standout Warrior guard, netted 13 points in the first quarter, while Dana was collecting only six. Fuerst finished with 27 points, most of which came on his uncanny one-handed push shots.

Much of Dana's cold first half was due to the Vikings, inability to crack Midland's modified all-court press. Only Stan Cole moved effectively against this tight defensive measure as the second period ended with the Vikes on the short end of a 47-19 score.

Dana came to life in the third period as they managed to outscore the Warriors, 17-9. The two teams broke even in the final stanza with 16 points each, giving the Vikings an eight point margin in second half play.

On the brighter side for the Red and White was Fritz Youra's 18-point performance. Youra also sparkled defensively as he held Marshall Farley, NCC scoring leader, to below 14 points. Stan Cole hit nine points to punctuate a fine floor game.

Danes and Aces Win Friday Games

Action continued in the Tom and Jerry league last Friday with the Danes pitted against the Four Jokers and the Four Aces facing the Lucky Strikes. The league leading Danes rolled three straight victories over the Four Jokers. The Four Aces, second in the league, bowled a 2-1 victory over the Lucky Strikes.
