## Rep. Walter H. Judd To Speak at Banquet Tonight

Missionary, congressman and physician Walter H. Judd will be the featured speaker at the banquet in the Auditorium-gymnasium at 7 o'clock this evening. He will speak on the subject, "Fulfilling our American heritage in today's world."

Congressman Judd is now serving his sixth consecutive term as representative from Minnesota. He is a member of the committee on Foreign Affairs, chairman of the subcommittee on the Far East and the Pacific and a member of the committee on Government Operations which reviews all federal expenditures.

### Politically active

During the Presidential election campaign of 1952, he assisted President Eisenhower in forming the party platform on foreign affairs and is now a close advisor to the President and Department of State on foreign policy.

Dr. Judd was born in Rising City, Nebr., and graduated from high school there. He attended the University of Nebraska medical school and was in the army during the First World War.

### Former Missionary

Dr. Judd was in China two separate times as a medical missionary of the Congregational church, 1925 and '26 in southern China and 1934 through 1938 in northern China where he was superintendent of a mission hospital. On his return to this country he entered medical practice in Minnesota until his election to Congress.

Toastmaster for the banquet is Mr. Robert Hoggzett of Oakland, Ia., who graduated from Dana in 1942.

### Larsen Speaks Sunday

Speaker for the Sunday morning worship service is the Rev. Homer Larsen, pastor of the Nazareth Lutheran church in Cedar Falls, Ia. Pastor Larsen graduated from Dana in 1945, attended Trinity seminary and was ordained in 1948. The service is scheduled for 11 o'clock in the Auditorium-gymnasium.

## Concert Pianist To Appear Here

Danish concert pianist, Claus Bahnson, acclaimed in the music centers of Europe and North Africa, will present a concert in the Auditorium-gymnasium Tuesday, at 8:15 p.m. under the auspices of the Dana chapter of the American-Scandinavian foundation.

Mr. Bahnson, scholar and musician, is a doctor of philosophy in psychology. He has studied music under Arthur Schnabel and Edwin Fischer, and received conductor training from Erik Tuxen of the Danish National orchestra. He has repeatedly appeared as soloist with European orchestras.

His repertoire includes Schubert's "Wanderfantasia," the Prelude and Fugue in D minor by Bach-Basoni, and selections from such contemporary Scandinavian musicians as Carl Nielsen, Harald Saiverud and Svend Erik Tarp.

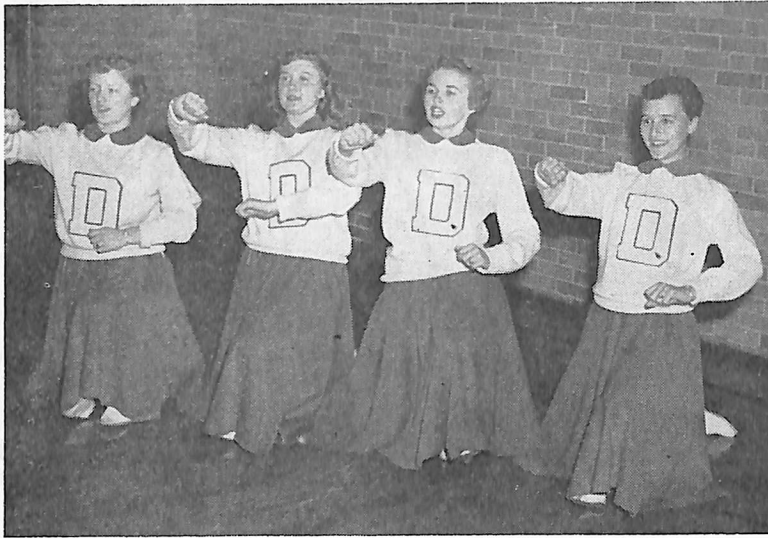

## Viewing the News

An inappropriate, spur-of-the-moment remark and a self-confession take top billing among the national news recently and also among news in general.

### Short lesson in politics . . .

Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson learned recently that an off-the-shoulder remark, although well-meaning, is not always taken in the same light as it is uttered. And for that reason, it may mean poor politics.

Not being proficient in the art of politics himself, Secretary Wilson has been called down by labor leaders and others for his recent remark that he "always liked bird dogs better than kennel-fed dogs." Responding to a question about unemployment in surplus-labor areas, he added that a bird dog will "get out and hunt for food rather than sit on his fanny and yell."

Although containing much good, common sense, this old principle of success in America did not sit right with many people. And so caught in a sudden crossfire of criticism, Wilson graciously apologized.

Perhaps his hastily-opinionated critics should have offered the final apology. At any rate, this principle of Wilson's could stand much consideration by people who could stand to shift for themselves, instead of always looking for handouts. Even the college student who plans to make a successful splash in the business world could well afford to review this truth. Nevertheless, it remains poor politics.

### Same course, different lesson . . .

It was a good story—good, that is, for the gullibility of the public. But there was only one thing wrong; it was not true. And with

its shattering, a Congressional career is ruined for Rep. Stringfellow, Utah Republican.

A distinguished story of war-time heroics which Stringfellow had claimed and which had helped his popularity among people of that state has now turned against him, after he decided to put the truth to his constituents. This has now resulted in his retirement from the coming election contest.

Although having once served in the Army, Stringfellow did not participate in any such heroics as claimed. It seems they were conjured up sometime in a hospital, when he found that people could be made to believe anything if it were somewhat reasonable. And so, the tale grew and grew.

This is, indeed, a sad situation. However, others have used these tactics and others probably will use them, unless the unwary American public wakes up and questions some of these so-called exploits. The whole affair reflects badly on the democratic system of government in this country. A little salt would probably help decrease the number of such storytellers.

# Iowa Central Surprises Dana; Four Vikes Injured

Displaying an inconsistent offense and hampered by a series of injuries the Vikes fell before a surprisingly tough Iowa Central eleven at Pella, Friday night, October 15.

Dana drew first blood as Jim Thomsen tossed a 25 yard aerial to Lynn Farrens late in the second quarter. Marion Hudson set up the play with a sweeping 32 yard dash in which he simply outran the opposing secondary. His try for the extra point was blocked by the hard charging Central line.

Central came roaring back at the start of the third period, marching 65 yards for a score, LaVern Bolkin going the final yard. Kicking specialist, Arvid Peirsen kicked the all-important extra point, his effort barely clearing the uprights.

Dana's passing attack gave the Iowans a few anxious moments in the final quarter, as Terry Wichert completed several short passes to put the Red and White deep in enemy territory. However, the Viking attack failed

completely inside the host's 20 yard line.

Dana's injury list was swelled considerably. Guards Russ Moseman and Dean Fisher were stopped by leg injuries, and Don Petersen suffered a slight brain concussion and Hudson received a shoulder injury. Several other backs are limping with not more than two expected to be at full speed for the Tarkio game.

# Vikings Host Tarkio in Homecoming Tilt Today

At 2:30 this afternoon the Dana Vikings play host to a powerful Tarkio eleven at Veteran's field in an effort to improve their season record of one win, two losses and one tie.

Boasting a squad of 44 players, including 12 lettermen, the Owls have a vastly improved aggregation compared with the Tarkio outfit that lost to the Red and White last fall. In previous action this year the Missourians have posted one-sided victories over Culver-Stockton and Missouri Central, while dropping narrow decisions to William Jewel and conference favorite, Concordia.

Sophomore quarterback John Gregory and senior passer Carl Davis have combined with a trio of glue-fingered ends, Lowell Bair, Ray Nelson and George

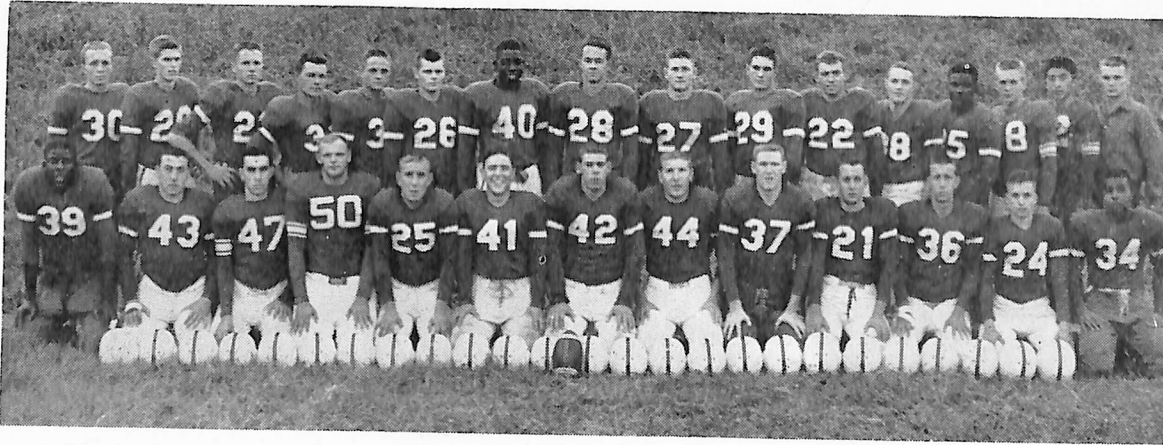
Phelps, to give Tarkio a dangerous aerial attack. Bair received all-conference honors last year.

Scat back Bob Bacon, an all-conference choice for three years, will spark the visitor's running attack. Bacon returned a kick off 90 yards for a touchdown against Missouri central earlier this season proving he still has the speed which has made him Tarkio's most valuable player for the last four seasons.

Tarkio coach Paul Gilbert has a starting line averaging about 193 pounds, the heaviest forward wall yet encountered by the Vikes.

Usual Dana starters, Russ Moseman, Marion Hudson and Jan Philby are nursing injuries and may see only limited action in today's game.

# Research Council Reveals New Plan

Washington, D. C.—The National Academy of Sciences—National Research Council has announced the inauguration of a new program of National Research Council—National Bureau of Standards Postdoctoral Research associateships in chemistry, mathematics and physics for the academic year 1955-1956. These research associateships have been designed to provide young investigators of unusual ability and promise and opportunity for basic research in the following fields: pure and applied mathematics, applied mathematical statistics, numerical analysis, experimental thermodynamics and calorimetry, statistical mechanics, molecular structure and spectroscopy, low temperature physics, solid state physics, theoretical and nuclear physics, radiological physics, analytical chemistry, inorganic chemistry and physical chemistry.

These fellowships are open only to citizens of the United States. Applicants must produce evidence of training in one of the foregoing fields equivalent to that represented by the Ph.D. or Sc.D. degree and must have demonstrated superior ability for creative research.

In order to be considered for awards for the academic year 1955-1956 applications must be filed at the fellowship office on or before Dec. 10, 1954. Awards will be made about April 1, 1955.
