Varied Program Planned

Under the direction of Mr. A. E. Rembold, the band will present a program that ranges all the way from long-hair to rhythm and blues. On the one hand, Sunday afternoon's audience will be regaled with the first movement from Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony," the "Hero Overture," and "First Roumanian Rhapsody." On the other hand, the band will tear through LeRoy Andersen's "Bugler's Holiday," mambo all over the place with "Copa Cabana," and knock the plaster loose with J. E. Handlon's classic "Time Out for a Jam Session," a low-down swing number with a good bit of stomp to it.

The concert starts at 3:00, and no admission will be charged.

Shirley Andersen To Give Recital



Miss Shirley Andersen will present a vocal recital on Saturday, May 28, at 8:15 p.m. in the Dana auditorium. She will be accompanied by Miss Dorothy Skinkle and assisted at the organ by Miss Bette Miller.

Miss Andersen's first group of numbers will consist of "Tu Lo Sai" by Giuseppe Torelli; Handel's "Care Selve"; and "Rejoice Greatly, O Daughters of Zion."

She will open her second group of numbers by singing "Erlkonig" by Franz Schubert. Other selections will be "Traum Dusch Die Dammerung" by Richard Strauss; "Verbargenheit" by Hugo Wolf; "Elizabeth's Prayer" by Wegnes; "Ah, Fors' e Lui He L'anima" (Is He The One); and Recitative and Aria from the opera "La Traviata" by Giuseppe Verdi.

Selections in the third group will include "Music I Heard With You," by Richard Hageman; "Tilum-Bom," by Igor Stravinsky; "When I Have Sung My Songs," by Ernest Charles; and Victor Herbert's "Italian Street Song."

Dr. Mengers Chosen By Seniors To Speak

Dr. Ethan Mengers has been chosen by the senior class to be the speaker for the baccalaureate service which will be held May 29 at 11:00 a.m. in Alumni Auditorium. The service is being held in co-operation with the members of First Lutheran church. The senior class usually chooses the father of one of the seniors to be speaker if he is a pastor.

Eighteen To Graduate; Three Are 'Cum Laude'

Eighteen college seniors and six seminary seniors are candidates for graduation in 1955. In other years the senior class has had as many as forty-three members, with the average graduating class of the last five or six years numbering about thirty-five. About fifteen men were drafted two years ago after their sophomore year or the class would have been average size. Additional losses due to the draft have since decreased the number.

Gifts Increase Library Assets

Gifts of books from the South and the East have recently been received by Dana's library. Donors are Miss Rena Nielsen of Delroy Beach, Florida; the General Conference of Seventh-Day Adventists, Washington, D. C.; and Harold Nelson, Dana senior.

First Editions Given

Miss Nielsen sent a large number of first edition books, both fiction and non-fiction. Among these books are a 1848 edition of Thackeray's *Vanity Fair*, an 1851 edition of Breck's *The Flower-Garden*, an 1811 edition of Humboldt's *Essay on the Kingdom of New Spain*, and copy 69 of a limited edition of Orcutt's *Kingdom of Books*. This latter book is very valuable.

Senior Also Donates

Others among Miss Nielsen's gifts are Sherwood Anderson's notebook, Dreiser's *Gallery of Women*, Prescott's *History of the Conquest of Peru*, and other first edition American and English fiction. Previously, Miss Nielsen had sent a Hans Christian Andersen story book and pamphlet on his homeland to the library.

The Harold Nelson donation numbers fifteen catalogued books. These include: Curtis, *Lions Under the Throne*, which deals with the Supreme Court; *Prefaces to Peace*, a symposium of works by Wilkie, Hoover, Gibsen, Wallace, and Welles; and Hofstadter, the *American Political Tradition and the Men Who Made It*.

The General Conference of the Seventh-Day Adventists presented a collection of twenty-four volumes which comprises their "Home Library." Most of these deal with the tenets of the church or with some phase of the organization of that church body.

This year's honor students are Bette Miller, Donovan Olson, and Orvan Peterson, who will graduate cum laude. Donovan Olson will be valedictorian for the class.

Peterson; Bachelor of Science Degree—John Stark (to complete requirements by August 31, 1955); Bachelor of Science in Education—Margaret McQuarrie Brodersen, Emil D. Rasmussen, Vordyn D. Nelson, and Erling N. T. Schultz.

In the seminary, the candidates for the Bachelor of Divinity degree are John Beck, Robert G. Nelson, Lloyd Lorensen, and Robert D. Thoms. Candidates for the Theological Diploma of Graduation are Ervin W. Dohmeier and Anton C. Kirkegaard.

The seniors will wear academic hoods for the first time this year. Academic robes and hoods were once worn as regular student garb during the school year for protection from the weather.

After graduation, about fifty per cent of the class will go into teaching, twenty-five per cent into graduate work, and twenty-five per cent into business and other activities.

Vikings Roll Over Creighton U., 5-2

Dana eased into second place in the Midwest Baseball conference at the expense of Creighton last Friday afternoon as they downed the host Jays, 5-2. Roger Jensen turned in another fine pitching performance, allowing only six hits as the Omahans scored their two runs on a home run with a man on in the third inning.

Scoring four runs in the third inning, the Vikes ousted Creighton starter Bob Gibsen. Gibsen's replacement, mound-ace Fritz Stanek, finished the game with a two hit performance, giving up one additional run.

No Viking managed more than one hit but well-placed safeties by Dave Banghart, Lynn Farrens, Jon Shulke, Jim Kruse, Jan Philby and Bob Jensen proved disastrous for the Bluejays. Defensively the Danians hit a new high, backing up Jensen's one-walk pitching with errorless fielding.

Dana's diamond forces dropped the final game of the year to Concordia by a score of 6-2 last Tuesday at Vet's Field. Roger Jensen gave up only eight hits but walked five, and his mates committed four errors as the Bulldogs pushed across their six runs. Three of the runs were earned.

Seven Vikes each contributed a hit but the Red and White were unable to put together a big inning. Dana runs were scored in the second inning by Dave Banghart, on a triple by Bud Kruse, and by Larrie Stone on a double by Jensen.

Concordia scored one run in the fourth, one in the sixth, one in the eighth and then exploded for three in the final inning.
