## College Begins New Try For NCA Accreditation

Dana will ask for reconsideration of its application for membership in the North Central Association this fall. The action is being taken upon the recommendation of the association.

Four reasons were given for not granting accreditation last March when Dana's first application was reviewed. The reasons were: (1) Salaries for senior staff members were too low; (2) the average teaching load was too heavy; (3) the curriculum was too extensive for the teaching staff; and (4) the counseling program and the administration of certain personnel services were inadequate.

### Instruction Good

All other areas were given a clean bill of health by the examining committee. The purposes, competence and organization of the faculty, the curriculum, instruction, the library, the basic student services, the administration, the physical plant, institutional studies and the athletic program were all given favorable ratings.

Action has been taken to remedy the four deficiencies. The faculty has been enlarged and the teaching load has been reduced to the extent recommended by the North Central Association through the reorganization of courses and teaching hour loads.

This week a report was begun indicating the changes that have been made. This will be sent to the board of review of the Commission on Colleges and Universities of the North Central Association, along with a request for reconsideration. President

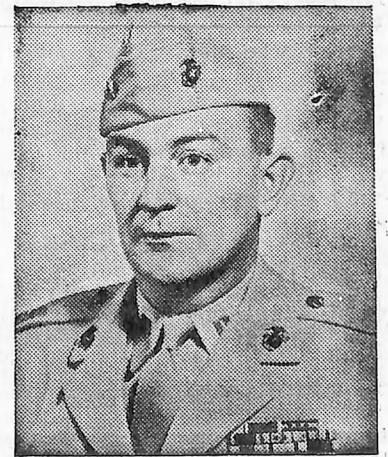

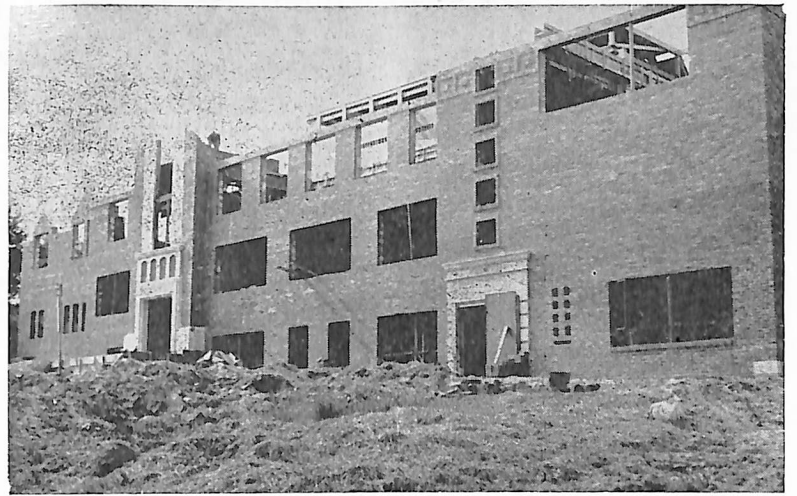
## Library Features 3 Sports Books

# Vikes Invade Westmar For 1st CCCC Contest

Dana opens its conference schedule as they travel to Westmar for a game with the LeMars, Iowa school tonight. The Vikings will be out to avenge a 26-20 loss to the Eagles last year.

Westmar dropped their season opener to powerful Dakota Wesleyan, 31-0, even though the Dakotans trailed the Eagles in most of the statistical departments.

Leading the Iowans into tonight's contest will be all-conference halfback Francis Brownmiller, who ran wild over much of the Eagle's opposition last year. He averaged 5.6 yards per carry against Dakota Wesleyan. Also back from last year's squad which finished second in the CCCC race is all-conference tackle Bob Braunschweig.

## Some Injuries

Other Eagles who have looked sharp in Westmar's initial action were halfback Len Rhode, fullback Wayne Traverse and ends Larry Dunphy and Stan Short.

Bob Darrah, veteran Westmar quarterback, suffered a bad knee injury in the Dakota tilt and may see only limited action against the Vikings tonight. Another doubtful starter will be scatback Bill Omsted, who suffered a knee injury in practice.

Dana's forces came through the Sterling encounter without any major injury losses. However, freshman Ron Morgensen, a 215 pound tackle, is out with a broken foot.

## Potent Sterling Topples Gridders

Last Saturday, Dana's Vikings traveled to Sterling, Kansas where they met with their first defeat of the 1955 season at the hands of a well coached Warrior eleven, 26-0.

After taking the opening kickoff almost to mid-field, the Kansas hit paydirt on a series of end runs. A second score late in the first quarter put Sterling ahead by 14 points.

Early in the second quarter, the Vikings bounded back with a TD of their own on a pitch from Jan Philby to Marion Hudson, only to have it called back on a holding penalty.

Further Sterling scoring was curtailed in the second stanza as the Viking defense stiffened. Tallies in the third and fourth quarters brought the hosts point total to 26.

Scoring threats by Dana were stymied time and again by numerous illegal use of the hands penalties charged against the Vikes. The Red and White offense was spearheaded again by the talents of Marion Hudson, Dana's candidate for Little All-American honors.

Along with Hudson, Jan and Hack Philby were prominent in secondary play, while Frank Gabby turned in a top performance at his guard spot.

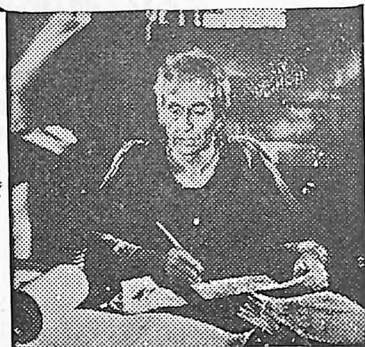

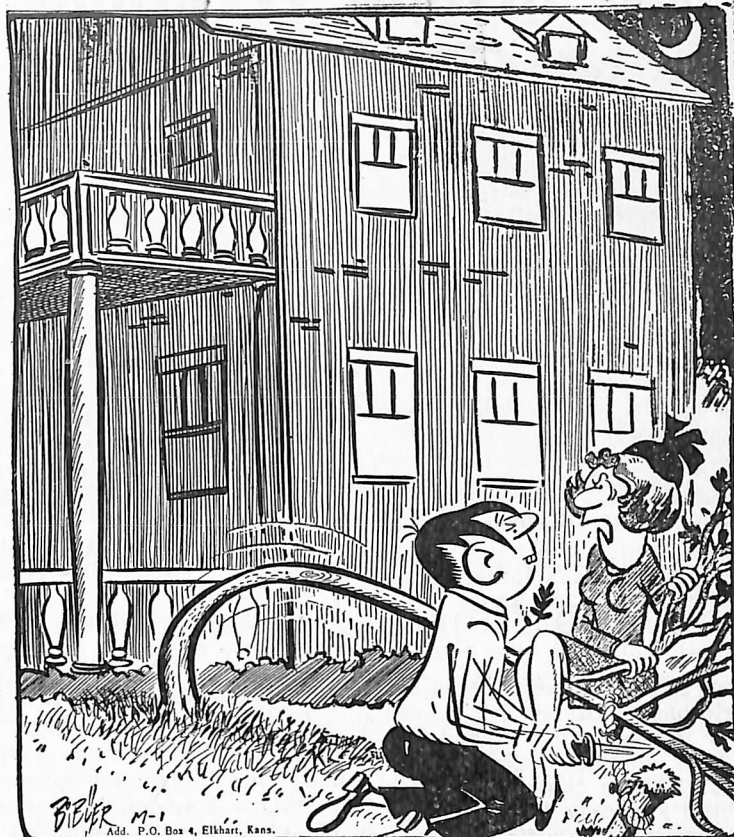
