

Band To March In Uniforms Tonight

Tonight between the halves of the Dana-Central game Dana's marching band will give its first exhibition of the year. Under the direction of Mr. Robert Campbell, the group will appear for the first time in the uniforms purchased last summer by the Alumni association. The uniforms arrived last week.

Basic colors of the uniforms are red and grey. The red jackets feature a military type collar, with a grey reverse flap across the breast and double white citation cords on the shoulders. The trousers are grey with a red-and-white strip.

Shako-type caps complete the uniforms, and the whole is topped off by a seven-inch white ostrich feather plume.

Library Adds New Reference Books

Two new sets of encyclopedias have been added to the library reference shelves.

The 1955 edition of the **Encyclopedia Britannica** contains excellent illustrations and a simplified text in its 24 volumes. Purchased with future elementary school teachers in mind, **The World Book Encyclopedia** is also suited for students who desire simple, well illustrated information.

Dana's student radio broadcast was resumed yesterday with KF-GT's first airing of the student council's new radio show, "Dana College Is On the Air."

Under the direction of Pete Smith the show included both musical and conversational feature. Dick Jensen, accompanied by Mary Sarmiento, led off with "Serenade" from The Student Prince while the choir was represented by four of their RCA Victor records.

Darlene Morton read "To Autumn" by Keats and Profs. Jerry Cloyd and Clifford Hansen dissertated briefly on the state of tension in North Africa. Carmen Craig announced the show with an assist from Doris Madsen who

covered the highlights of the 1955 Homecoming.

Recorded on campus, the entire show was on tape. Harold Holt and Mel Sick handled the technical end of the recording, which involved several splicings and re-recordings.

A recorder similar to the one ordered by the student council was used for the first broadcast and will continue to be used until the Omaha distributing firm which is handling the transaction can deliver the student council's own recorder.

Grad School Tests Scheduled by ETS

Graduate Record Examinations, required of applicants for admission to a number of graduate schools, will be administered at examination centers throughout the country four times in the coming year, Educational Testing Service has announced. During 1954-55 more than 9,000 students took the GRE in partial fulfillment of admission requirements of graduate schools which prescribed it.

Year book Will Be Different--Editor

Several innovations are planned for the 1956 year book, reports editor Smerls Beamish. Among the changes anticipated is the cover, which Smerls reports will be "one of the most striking in recent years."

Embodying a new color combination, the cover will be hand-carved out of rare iron wood imported from lower Tanganyika and inlaid with a mosaic of gold and precious stones to produce a photograph-like reproduction of the auditorium-gymnasium.

A neon border will light up when the book is opened, while an incased three-speed phonograph grinds out the familiar strains of "Hail Dana." A new, higher quality plastic coated parchment will be used instead of the older enamel stippled paper used last year. The 300 and some odd pages will be hand-lettered.

Big Pics

Another feature will be full page (139/16" x 17 7/8") tinted and retouched photographs of each Dana student and faculty member. Women are asked to wear formals for these pictures and men are requested to wear at least a clean sweatshirt and to remember to comb their hair.

For a small extra fee a 16 page supplement may be purchased. The supplement, which will be mailed to subscribers sometime during the summer, is to be a complete surprise as far as contents are concerned, but the editor has hinted that it will include a large autographed three color process photo of himself and a similar one of the associate editor in black and white.

Slight Extra Cost

To cover the slight additional cost Editor Beamish asked and received a \$1500 grant from the student body funds. The remaining cost averages out to roughly \$7.73 1/2 per student. This amount, plus the \$14.00 for the individual tinted pictures, will be collected when the books are distributed next July.

Central defeated the Red and White, 7-6, last year when Dutchman Arvid Pierson's extra point try hit the cross bar and bounced over for the marker. In 1953 the two teams fought to a 6-6 deadlock.

Central Speedy

So far this year the Iowans have defeated Carthage college, 20-13, and lost to Iowa Wesleyan, 13-6. The Central offense is built around a speedy running attack featuring a pair of sprinters and flashy LaVern Boelkens.

Crippled Dana will be looking for its second win after two losses. Viking standouts Jan Philby, Marion Hudson and Jim Kruse are all out of action with injuries picked up in the Westmar game.

Jack Lodl, Lynn Farrens, Hack Philby and Terry Wichert will take up some of the back field slack. Lodl was impressive against Westmar, his first action of the season.

Philby On 'Star Of Week' Listing

Jan Philby, Dana's triple threat quarterback, was named on this week's Omaha World Herald "Star of the Week" listing. Philby, who did everything from pitch a touch down strike to Charley Erickson to pull down Eagle runners behind the line of scrimmage in the Westmar contest, is the second Viking to be named on the listing this fall.

Eagles Cool Vike Gridders

Westmar college handed Dana its second loss of the season, downing the Vikings, 27-7, last Friday night at LeMars, Iowa. The loss gives Dana a record of one win and two losses.

A Viking fumble in the first quarter gave Westmar a first down inside the Dana 15 yard line. The Eagles wasted little time capitalizing on the break, scoring on a series of running plays, but missing the conversion.

Dana came back strongly late in the first half, climaxing a long drive with a scoring pass from Jan Philby to Charles Erickson, giving the Vikes a 7-6 half-time edge, as Hack Philby converted.

Two Eagle touchdowns in the third quarter and one in the final period raised the score to 27-7 as the Iowans uncorked a potene down-the-iddle offense seasoned with a bit of deadly passing attack.

Injuries Costly

Much of Dana's misfortune can probably be blamed on the fact that the Red and White saw three of its starting backfield stopped by injuries during the contest. Defensive standout, Jim Kruse suffered an elbow injury in the first quarter that will keep him out of action for several weeks. Marion Hudson was felled by a pulled knee tendon just as he got the Viking scoring drive underway in the second quarter. Jan Philby also received a knee injury, but not until the Omaha sophomore had harrassed the Eagles for the better part of three quarters.

Standouts in the Viking line were Milan Johnson and Russ Moseman, while Hack Philby turned in his usual sparkling game in the Dana secondary.

the GRE on Saturday, November 19. In 1956 the dates are January 12, April 28 and July 7. ETS advises each applicant to inquire of the graduate school of his choice which of the examinations he should take and on which dates.

Applicants for graduate school fellowships should ordinarily take the designated examinations in the fall administration.

GRE tests offered in these nationwide programs include a test of general scholastic ability and advanced level tests of achievement in 16 different subject matter fields.

Application forms and a Bulletin of information, which provides details of registration and administration as well as sample questions may be obtained directly from Educational Testing Service, 20 Nassua St., Princeton, N. J. or P. O. Box 27896, Los Angeles 27, Calif.

A completed application must reach the ETS office at least 15 days before the date of the examination for which the candidate is applying.

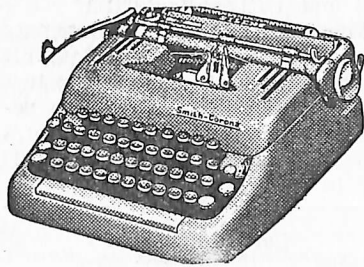

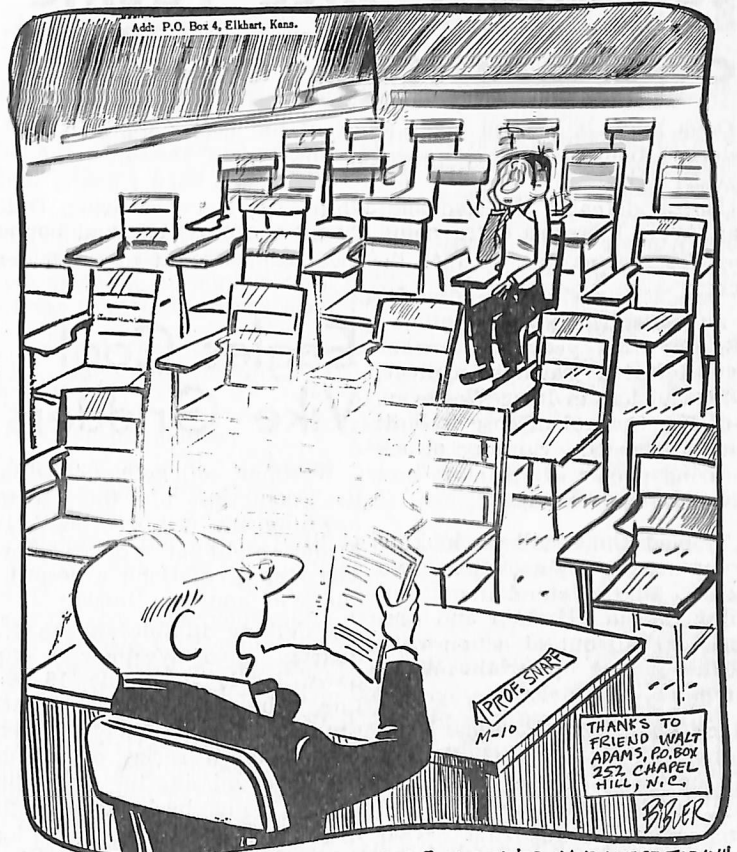
