Statistics Show Little Time Spent For Christ

Today, we use statistics and figures to illustrate many things in our lives. The average adult, say experts, spends so many hours in sleep, so many hours at work, so many for meals, and the remainder of his time at rest or in recreational activities. Each of us can adjust a schedule to fit in with this plan, with only a few minor changes, and with slight variation from day to day, if we wish to do so. And yet, this schedule is incomplete—no time has been left for God. Where does He fit in?

You might say that it is easy to find a minute or two to read His Word and to pray—that can wait until it is time to go to bed. By then, you may be so tired that if you do read from the Bible, you cannot understand what you are reading, or you put it off until tomorrow when you will have more time. So many of us use this same excuse for chapel. Perhaps we have not studied for a test or we are getting behind in some of our work. Without that half hour spent in chapel, we will never have time to catch up. At night, there just is not time for dorm devotions or student chapel.

Hour Spent In Church

Have you ever thought of just how much time is spent with God each week? In seven days, there are 168 hours. Each Sunday, we spend about an hour in church. During the week, we can spend

almost two hours in chapel, twenty minutes at dorm devotions, and forty minutes in student chapel.

Chapel Neglected

Perhaps we spend an hour each week for private or room devotions. All of this adds up to five hours a week or less than one hour out of thirty-four, spent with God.

And yet, we do not have time for chapel, or much time to read His Word. It has been shown that by reading three chapters of the Bible (this would require less than a quarter of an hour) every day, and five chapters on Sunday, the entire Bible could be read in one year.

Can't we afford to spend this fifteen minutes a day, and grow in our Christian lives?

Dana's Vikings ground out 1549 yards and a total of 39 points during the 1955 football season, according to figures released this week by the athletic department. Averaged out this comes to about one Viking score for every 260 yards gained.

Marion Hudson led individual scoring with 30 points on five touchdowns. Hudson also led in rushing statistics with 469 yards, followed by Hack Philby who picked up 269.

Top passer was Jan Philby who completed 14 tosses for 196 yards, and Charley Ericksen was the number one pass target with 12 grabs for 134 yards.
