## Choir to Appear On CBS 'Church of the Air' Sunday

Sunday at 10:30 p.m., EST, the Columbia Broadcasting System's "Church of the Air" will present a program in commemoration of the 250th anniversary of Protestant missionary work in India. The Dana College choir will sing the liturgy and anthems, and Dr. H. C. Jersild president, of the United Evangelical Lutheran Church will be the liturgist. Dr. George F. Hall of the Lutheran Council will preach the sermon.

Professor Paul E. Neve will direct the choir in "Praise the Lord", by Machael Praetorius; "Jesus, Guard and Guide thy members", by J. S. Bach and the Danish folktune, "Arise All Things." The choir will also be heard in three hymns, "From Greenland's Icy Mountains," "Hail to the Brightness of Zion's

Glad Morning" and "Jesus Shall Reign Wher'er the Sun."

In 1706, under the sponsorship of the Danish King, Fredrick IV, mission work was begun in the colony of Tranquebar in South India by the German missionary Bartholomew Ziegenbalg.

In his sermon the Rev. Hall, executive secretary of the Commission on Younger Churches and Orphaned Missions of the National Lutheran Council will pay tribute to this early missionary.

## Coed Caught In California Flood

Miss Shirley Chandler and a companion were headed for a movie on Monday, Dec. 19, in a 1949 Mercury. It was around 8 p.m., quite dark and California; the two were not aware of the danger that lay close ahead, until they came to a low spot in the road and the car engine was drowned by the rising flood waters.

When the driver got out to go for help, the water was about two feet deep, but it wasted no time in seeping into the car and continuing its relentless rise there. Shirley climbed up and sat on the back of the front seat.

The car nosed down into the low place in the road so that the back of the car was higher up than the front. When the level reached three feet Shirley climbed into the back seat.

When the water rose to about four feet, the car started to move threateningly and turned sideways, slipping off the road and coming to rest against a fence.

## Dana at CTC For 4-C Tilt Tonight

Concordia provides the opposition tonight as the Vikings journey to Seward for their third conference contest.

Both teams defeated Tarkio in CCCC opener last month, Concordia by one point and Dana by two.

Boasting eight lettermen, including all-conference picks Bob Otte and Dave Faszholz, the Bulldogs were inserted as CCCC co-favorites at the start of the season.

Dana has not won a game at Seward since 1952, losing to host Bulldogs, 91-77, last year. Concordia has failed to beat the Vikings here since 1951.

Rounding out the probable starting five tonight will be Don Petersen, all-CCCC choice in 1954, Vic Beckler and Corky Markin, giving the Bulldogs a first line averaging 6'2".

Otte, a six foot, 180 pound dazzler from somewhere in Kansas, has paced Concordia scoring so far this season, with a healthy assist from 6'3" Faszholz. Otte rang up a Concordia scoring record of 432 points last season, a game average of 19.6.

## Library Suggests Seven Life Stories

Biographies old and new make fascinating reading. Featured this week by the library are seven outstanding life stories.

Richard Rumbold and Lady Margaret Stewart are the authors of **The Winged Life**, a portrait of Antoine de Saint-Exupery, poet and airman. His life was packed with adventure as a pioneer airman, writer, poet, philosopher, administrator, mathematician, scientist, and practical inventor. His literary masterpieces: **Night Flight, Wind, Sand, and Stars, Flight to Arras, and The Little Prince** provide the reader a new insight into the man, his work, and his vision.

**Paul Laurence Dunbar and His Song** by Virginia Cunningham is the biography of an outstanding Negro poet from Dayton, Ohio. Dunbar is noted as both an admirable man and a gifted poet.

Illustrated with photographs, Kathleen Mellen's book, **Lonely Warrior**, is the story of the life and times of Kamehameha the Great of Hawaii. This Hawaiian ruler united the islands in the eighteenth century, and put an end to wars and oppression until "the old, the men and women and the little children could sleep safely in the highways" a half-Eskimo, half-Norwegian boy, brought up in Unalaska, who came to the United States to study medicine and later found that the career he really wanted was in music. He became a well known pianist, lecturer, and artist.

# Federal Service Sets Second Test

College seniors and postgraduates will have another opportunity on February 10 to try for a career in the Federal service, the Civil Service Commission announced Monday. The second nation-wide test under the Federal-Service Entrance Examination program will be held on that date. January 18 is the deadline for filing application.

College men and women who passed the first Federal-Service Entrance Examination last month will be eligible for job offers in many administrative, personnel, technical or professional fields by February or March, the commission said. Similarly, those passing the February 10 examination should be eligible for a job offer by spring.

It is estimated that 7,700 Federal openings at salaries ranging from \$3,670 to \$4,525 annually will be available during 1956.

Details of the program will be explained by special Federal teams which plan to visit many college campuses before February 10.

Persons who cannot meet the January 18 deadline should file as soon as possible thereafter to obtain consideration for future examination in this continuous program, the Commission added.

(Continued from page 1) Shirley resumed her position on the back of the front seat. A few minutes later, which to Shirley "seemed like hours," the driver returned in time to rescue Shirley through a rear window.

Two and one half hours later the car was still in the hollow, covered by the flood waters. Only a few inches of the top of the car were visible.

Twenty minutes after the rescue, another car plunged into the same watery trap. The flood, 20 minutes stronger, thwarted rescue attempts this time and a man drowned.

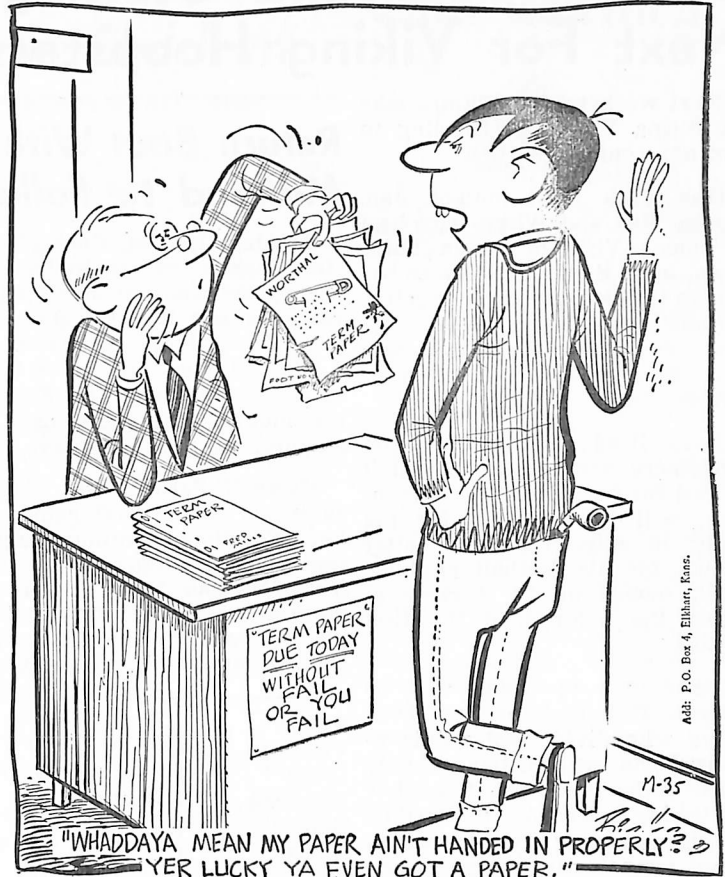
