This program is in part experimental, and will probably be extended to other liberal arts colleges in the area if it proves successful.

The science panel will consist of two parts: a formal presentation at 4:00 P.M. and informal group discussions at 7:30 in the evening with the three speakers as leaders. Topics of the afternoon lectures are: The Influence of Science on Human Thought, Future Problems in Science, and The Limitations of Science. The lectures will be presented by W. E. Approximately sixty teams representing twenty states including Kentucky, Texas, and Ohio were present at the contest. The Dana debaters received an "excellent" rating.

Of the four debates in which the Dana team took part, our debaters lost to the State University of Iowa and Murray State College of Kentucky. Our team defeated Cornell College of Mount Vernon, Iowa, and Abilene Christian College of Abilene, Texas, which incidentally was the top team in the tournament.

Kaldahl and Smith received ratings of "excellent" in the debates. Smith also participated in extemporaneous speaking, and Pagel gave an original oration entitled, "Why Johnny Can't Speak." Speech instructor Mrs. Elaine Watt accompanied the group.

## Summer Tour of Mexico Offered

The group will leave Omaha by bus Monday, July 30, and will arrive in Mexico City by way of the Pan-American Highway Saturday, August 4. Three hours of credit in social science or education may be earned by taking the tour.

Cities which will be visited in Mexico are Monterrey, Valles, Mexico City, Taxco, Cuernavaca, Puebla, and Fortin. In addition, several members of the group will fly to Guatemala from Mexico City.

Points of interest in and about Mexico City to be viewed by tourists are the Xochimilco Gardens, Pyramids of the Sun and Moon, Borda Gardens, and Aca-pulcho. Miss McCullough also stated that the group will observe Mexican schools in session, bull fights, Aztec dances, flower markets, Silver and craft shops, and the Tiffany Glass Curtain.

# Republican Hopes Rise With Eisenhower's Nod

Hopes for a Republican victory in the November presidential election were considerably strengthened by Eisenhower's decision to enter the presidential race "if the people want him." No other candidate the Republican party could nominate has the status and popularity of President Eisenhower.

However, nothing is certain, especially on the political scene. Many developments will take place between now and November, and they will determine the results of the presidential election.

Because of the popularity and prestige of the president, few direct attacks will be made on him; although at the Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner in Hartford, Connecticut, Adlai Stevenson, the leading Democratic hopeful, ventured to express a verbal blast against Eisenhower, as well as the GOP, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, and Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

## Library Features Scientific Books

In connection with the science panel which is being held on campus Wednesday, the library this week is featuring books which emphasize the spirit of modern science.

Designed for young people who are considering entering a field in science, **Careers and Opportunities in Science** by Philip Pollack is a thorough survey of the new and innumerable avenues open in meteorology, physics, chemistry, agriculture, astronomy, conservation, aviation, and other leading scientific occupations.

The story of how modern drugs including penicillin, streptomycin, aureomycin, bacitracin, and the sulfa compounds were discovered and of what they promise for the future is told in **The Miracle Drugs** by Boris Sokoloff. The author pays tribute to the scientific discoveries of such men as Dr. Frank Meleney, Dr. Rene Dubos, and Dr. S. A. Waksman.

Ralph Lapp flavors his summary of the first ten years of the Atomic Age with excitement and suspense. **The New Force** describes how the atomic bomb was produced and tells of the coming of the H-bomb seven years later.

Radium, the X-ray, vitamins, insulin, diphtheria toxoid, and yellow-fever control are discussed in **Milestones of Medicine** by Ruth Fox. The book gives an account of the discoveries that have been

Opinion in the Republican party is divided in regard to Richard Nixon.

However, the traditional advantage of the president to gain reelection if he seeks it, coupled with Eisenhower's popularity and record in office, give the Republicans a good chance to win in November.

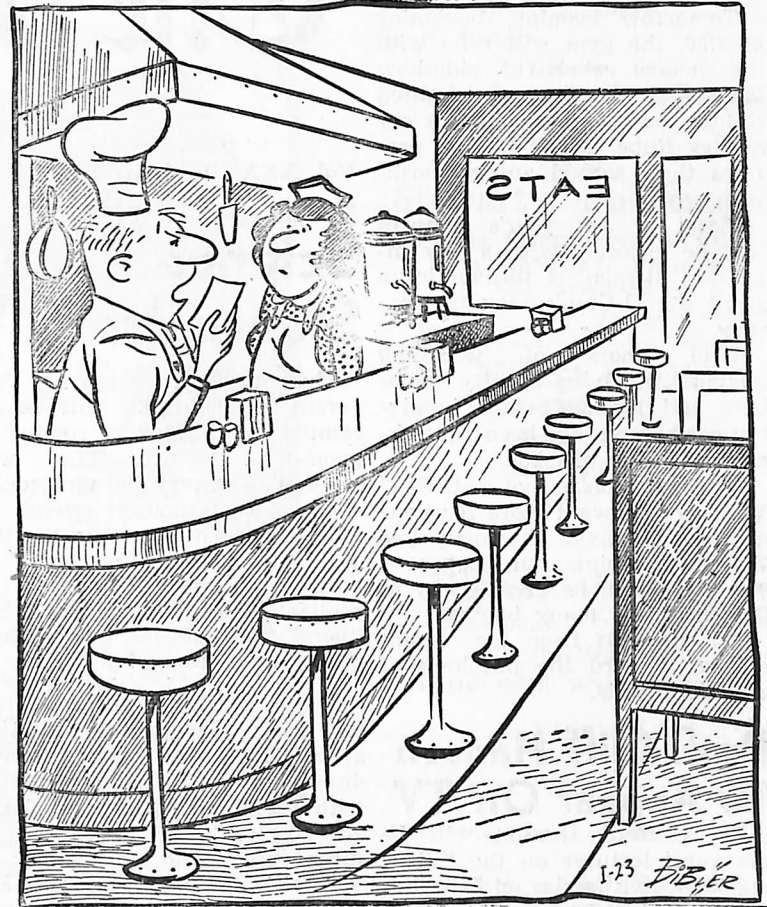
### Basic reality

For the fifth straight year Tarkio has had a guard named to the squad. For four of those years the guard was Carl Davis, Owl play-maker and long shot artist. This year it was sophomore Stan Sienkowski who replaced Davis in Newt Kyle's offensive pattern.

## Firehouse Five Rolls To Intramural Championship

It was the ninth win against one loss for the champs. The Kool Kats finished with a five and five record. Mil's Maniacs, regular season champs, ended up with an eight and one record, thanks to a three point upset loss to the Rackers in the first round of the tournament.

Gary Jessen led the scoring with 19 points on nine baskets and a free throw. Jan Philby was high for the winners with 17 points on eight baskets and a free throw.

made in the treatment of disease and describes the discoveries themselves.

Rachel Carson portrays **The Sea Around Us** in a manner which Thor Heyerdahl says is "a perfect combination of the fascinating science and the eternal beauty of the sea." The chapters include discussions of how the earth acquired the sea, how life began in the primeval sea, the birth of an island, tides, and mineral resources.

Ruth More, formerly a reporter for the **St. Louis Star-Times** and at present working for the **Chicago Sun-Times**, summarizes the story of evolution from the standpoint of a reporter in **Man, Time, and Fossils**. She discusses theories of Darwin, Lamrack, DeVries, and Mendel. The latter part of the book contains information on prehistoric man including Pithecanthropus, Peking Man, and Ape-Man, and also tells how scientists reckon the age of the earth.

Water, the most common and yet the most uncommon of substances, is the subject of **Water, the Miracle of Nature** by Thomson King. The book is divided into two parts: "Water and the World" and "Water and the Life of Man." Man's struggle for control of the sea, the uses to which man has put steam, irrigation, and canals are topics dealt with in the second section.

Charles G. Fraser lets each scientist tell about his discoveries in his own words in **Half-Hours With Great Scientists**. Mechanics, acoustics, optics, thermics, and electricity are discussed.
