Supper will be served to all choir members at St. John's Lutheran. The Rev. John Streng is pastor of the congregation. Dana's choir concert will provide a fitting climax for the tour of ALC churches which the choir made in February and March.

Fremont's new First Lutheran Church building which was dedicated Sunday will be the site for the concert Sunday, May 5. The Rev. Archie Madsen is the pastor of First Lutheran.

Following the program in the gym, open house will be held in the dormitory from 8:00 to 10:30 p.m. Refreshments will be served in the lounge of the dormitory.

This is the second open house sponsored by the men's dorm residents under the new policy of each dorm having two per year instead of only one.

After a bad first inning on the mound for Dana in the eighth and gave up one run against Creighton U Tuesday at Boystown the Dana squad settled down and improved each to 0.

Pitcher Bill Davis, starter for Dana, was jumped on in the first and gave up five runs on loopers and soft ground balls before the side was retired.

Lack of power at the plate was the main problem as the Vikes collected only six hits in the entire game, three of which belonged to Ernie Anderson.

Davis was nipped for four more runs in the next three frames and then gave way to reliever Dick Poore who blanked the Blue Jays in the fifth, sixth, and seventh.

Although Creighton failed to score in these innings, Dana could do no better as Jim Berry shut out the Vikings for the first seven innings, and then Les Arantis completed the perfect job in the eighth and ninth.

Besides Anderson's three hits, Jan Philby, Ron Huston and Don Joern each had one for Dana.

Creighton University's track team scored a 68½ to 66½ victory over the Vikings at Creighton Wednesday afternoon.

Outstanding Viking performances were turned in by senior letterman Tom Langenfeld in the high jump, new-comer Don Jorgensen with 14 points making him high scorer for the Vikes, sophomore Paul Christensen with a win in the two-mile through a final sprint, and letterman Lee Ramage who scored 12 points with one first, two seconds, and a third.
