

Danians Visit Site Of Arkansas Crisis

A group of Dana students including Jerry Lincoln, George Landbo, Frank Hansen, Anna Marie Pollmann, Shirley Nielsen, and Marlene Paulsen drove to Little Rock, Arkansas, Thursday to get first-hand insight into the crisis that took place there last fall.

The students visited Central High School, the four-story, block-long structure which was the scene of the national crisis. They also interviewed Mrs. Lillian Buckelby, vice-counselor to girls at the high school.

Dana students noted the National Guard still patrols the school, and that newsmen are not allowed to take pictures there or to interview teachers or students.

Copies of the editorials of Harry Ashmore, editor of the **Arkansas Gazette**, were obtained by the group, as well as day-to-day descriptions of the events of last fall.

Historical sites of the city which were visited by the Danians included the birthplace of General Douglas MacArthur and the state capital buildings which are still standing in their original locations.

On the 1600-mile trip which took them through the Ozarks, the students also visited Hot Springs and Fort Smith, Arkansas.

Students Choose Leaders For Coming School Term

Junior class president Richard Jorgensen will step up to assume the presidency of the student body beginning May 1.

Jorgensen was chosen in a campus election held Tuesday.

VP Jenkins

Filling the vice-presidency post will be sophomore Isaac Jenkins, who last year held the office of VP of his freshman class.

Student body secretary for 1958-59 will be Donna Byriel, also a sophomore. The present Home Ec Club head will soon begin her secretarial duties with the new administration.

Madsen Is Treasurer

Handling the finances will be junior Roger Madsen, a former student council member who moved up to the post of treasurer as a result of Tuesday's election.

The other item on the election agenda, the proposed amendment

to the student body constitution, was passed. It will appear in the Constitution as Article I, Section III, Part B, and reads as follows:

"In the event there are four or more petitions received for any student body office, there will be a preliminary election to limit the slate of that particular office or offices to two candidates. The primary shall precede the final election by two or more days."

Commission of Four

Ballots were counted Tuesday afternoon by elections commission members Jim Andersen, Ernie Anderson, David Bidstrup, and Bob Ostergaard.

According to the elections commission, 211 votes were cast in the campus-wide election. Of that number, 22 were invalid, since the voter failed to read the instructions at the top of the ballot regarding the preferential system of marking.

All votes thus incorrectly cast must of necessity be invalid.

Continuing the spring lyceum events will be a lecture by Lt. Colonel Robert P. Lukeman of Strategic Air Command Tuesday evening, April 8.

Lt. Colonel Lukeman is of the War Plans Branch, Directorate of Plans. An aerial observer, he served in the European Theater during World War II.

The speaker has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with Oak Leaf Cluster, the Air Medal with three Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Commendation Medal.

The April 8 lecture will be the second this year to have been presented by a representative of SAC.

Danish Actress Jorgensen To Give Dramatic Recital

A dramatic recitation of the **Book of Job** will be presented Tuesday evening, April 1, beginning at 8:00 p.m. in Pioneer Memorial chapel.

The recital will be given by Madame Louise Jorgensen of Copenhagen, Denmark.

Well-Known in Europe

Madame Jorgensen has given over 1,500 readings in Denmark and has been a guest reciter at universities in Birmingham, Berlin, Vienna, and Oslo, as well as at other institutions in England, Austria, Switzerland, Norway, and Sweden.

The Department of Education of the government of Denmark is enabling her to appear at a number of colleges and seminaries in America as a cultural ambassador of good-will.

Among the other institutions in America where Madame Jorgensen will make appearances while on her tour are Grand View College, Des Moines, Iowa; Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa; and Midland College in Fremont.

Spiritual Artistry

Berlingske Tidende, Copenhagen's largest daily, described Madame Jorgensen's recital as "art and religion united into one perfect whole." The **Daily Dispatch** of Manchester said, "Louise Jorgensen, Danish actress, held an audience spell-bound in Manchester Cathedral last night."

It is recommended that students prepare for this recital by carefully reading the **Book of Job**, noting both its religious and its artistic value. Most scholars agree that this book, which inspired Goethe to write **Faust**, is a masterpiece of literature.

Hermes Staff Pays Tribute To Basketball Great Davis

Basketball team captain William Harry Davis ended his college career by setting four records for Dana.

Scoring a total of 1,207 points in a four-year period, he broke the previous record of 1,067 points which was held by 1957 graduate Bob Jensen.

Consistent Work

Davis is an example of what team playing and aggressive hard work will do. He has developed into one of the best players Dana has had, and has by constant practice developed a form that enabled him to break Dana's previous basketball records.

Possessing a remarkable free-throw average of 89%, Davis missed only nine free-throws during this entire season. In his junior year, he scored 37 points against Concordia to set the record for the most points scored in a single game.

Bowling Teams Hold Final Tournament

Terry's Terrors captured the top honors Saturday at the intramural bowling tournament held at the Blair Bowling Lanes.

The team, which consisted of Joanne West, Harold Holm, Paul Christensen, and Gary Danielson, copped the team series with a 1762 pin total.

Second highest were the Gutters, who finished with 1754 points.

Holm High Man

Harold Holm was top man in the Men's Division, as he took the high series with a total of 558 points, the high game with 230, and the high average with 186 points. (These are scratch totals and do not count the handicap.)

In the Women's Division, Audrey Ericksen earned top honors. Her high series total was 414 points, and her high average was 138.

Lois Justesen had the high game for the ladies, with a 160 total.

Awards Given

Trophies were awarded for the high team series, the high men's series, and the high women's series. Everyone who participated in the tournament will be awarded a pin by the manager of the bowling alleys.

An individual had to have bowled a minimum of nine games in league play during the regular season in order to be eligible to compete in the tournament.

Honorable Mention

Davis also holds Dana's record for the most points scored in a single season, a total of 444 points.

The Omaha *World-Herald* honorable mention NCC player is now finishing his athletic career at Dana by pitching for the Vike baseball team.

Track, Field Need Additional Recruits

According to Coach Rolloff, previous experience is not necessary in order to do well in and to enjoy track. Out of 14 track or field events, the individual can certainly find one in which he is able to do well.

The number of men out for track is an important factor for a successful season. This is evidenced by the fact that Kearney has 80 men out for track, and has won the NCC title for four consecutive years.
