Student Reviews Past Years What Will Happen In 1958?

Tonight Dana's traditional Homecoming festivities got under way and we're all hoping it will be the best yet. But, looking back at former Dana Homecomings, we realize that we have a real challenge.

Twice in the past, Homecoming weekend has been October 25 through October 27, as it is on the same weekend this year. Both these former Homecomings, 1940 and 1946, were quite successful and each had points of interest. The 1940 festivities marked the year of the organization of the Pep Club of Dana. They and the campus Model T led the snake dance through the streets of Blair before the game. The 1946 game ended in a victory for Dana over Luther—the score, 44 to 7!

We're glad that the weather is on our side this year. In 1942 Old Mr. Winter took over as six inches of snow fell. The coach made arrangements to have the field scraped, but finally the announcement came that the game had been called off; instead they had a pep meeting, the main feature of which was the dramatic club's presentation

of "Goodnight Please," starring none other than Norman Bansen!

If we had had bad weather again this year, perhaps we could have called on Mr. Bansen to give a repeat performance. This wasn't the only year without a football game. At the 1944 Homecoming, on Saturday afternoon Coach Paul Petersen got two games of kittenball under way, one for the boys, the other for the girls.

The 1947 Homecoming was unique in that it marked the beginning of the tradition of crowning a queen to reign over the festivities. This first queen was Ruth (Pinkie) Solevad of Watsonville, California. Last year was another first for Dana's Homecoming—two queens were crowned, Queen Audrey Erickson and Queen Delores Petersen Jorgensen.

Ten years ago, 1948, was also an important year for Dana as the weekend's activities were climaxed with the dedication of Pioneer Memorial.

Decorations are always a big project in preparing for visiting alumni. In 1939, they must have been extra-special as Paul Neve,

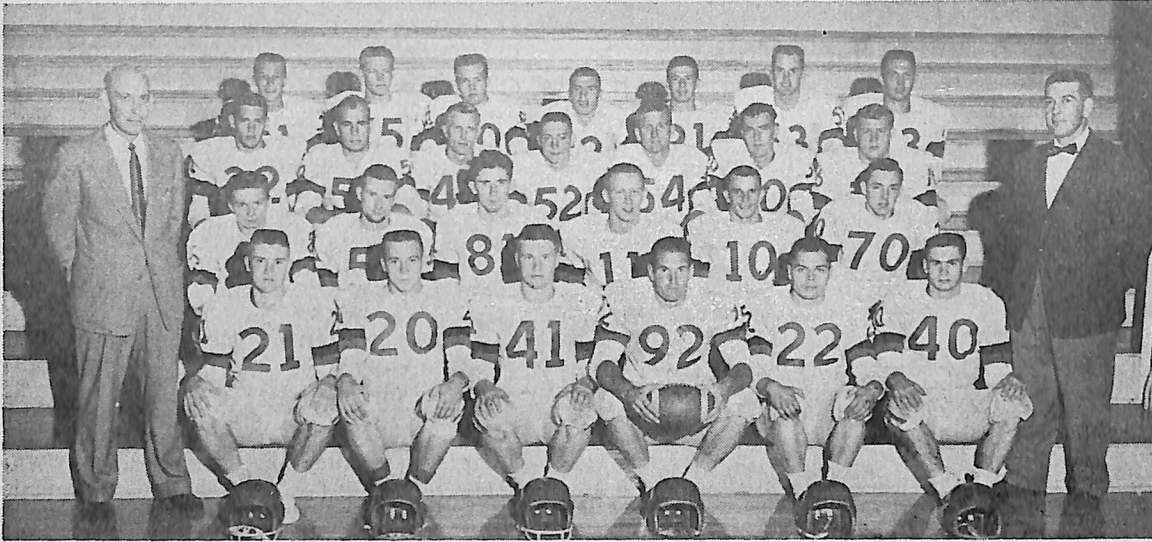

The Dana College Viking team for the 1958 season has shown much spirit this season although our scores don't put us on the winning side. We have played in a new and tough conference. With the team's work, Coach Rolloff and Petersen's leadership and, the support of the student body we can make good in this conference.

Vikings Want Win From Doane Tigers Saturday Afternoon

Tomorrow, Dana will be looking for its first conference win, as the Vikings will be host to Doane College from Crete, Nebraska.

The Tigers roster number 54, with 16 returning lettermen and 30 freshmen.

Looking in the backfield Doane has only four lettermen, led by quarterback Larry Roth and half-back Bob Armstrong, who managed to score three times against Concordia. Also a backfield standout for the Tigers is Vern Swanson who ranked 6th among the nation's small college punters last year.

The line picture looks somewhat more experienced with 12 lettermen returning for service. Heading the list are five ends, which possess a passing threat for Dana, with three experienced tackles and guards from the 1957 squad, and a returning pivot man.

Doane College season record this year is one win and four losses. The Tigers won over Concordia 59-14, while losing to Wayne, Hastings, Chadron, and Kearney by the scores of 13-20, 0-28, 13-34, and 0-33 respectively.

Stronger Chadron Topples Dana Team Season Recap Proves Spirit Of Team Exists After Losses

Last weekend the Dana Vikings traveled across the state where they were defeated by a strong and mighty Chadron State Teachers College team by the score of 45 to 6.

Chadron took their fifth straight win and their fourth in the Nebraska College Conference while handing Dana their fifth straight loss and their fourth in NCC play.

The Chadron Eagles scored two touchdowns in each of the first three quarters and one TD in the final quarter.

Dana's only score came early in the third period when Stan Cupp took a 20 yard pass from quarterback Terry Wickert on the five yard line and raced over for the touchdown. A pass from Wickert to end Jack Madsen for the extra point fell incomplete.

In the closing minutes of the game Dana had two scoring drives going. The first drive ended when Chadron intercepted a pass on the Chadron 20 yard line. One minute remaining Jack Linahan, center and team captain, intercepted a Chadron pass and went for ten yards. Time ran out before the Vikings could get the ball moving.

The Dana Vikings were able to get 13 first downs to Chadron's 17. In the rushing department Dana was held to 87 yards while Chadron piled up 360 yards.

Ten passes were completed out of 28 tries by the Dana passers for a total of 153 yards in passing. Chadron picked up 141 yards in passing when they completed 9 passes out of 18 tries.

DANA-Tarkio

Dana opened their season on the short end of a 19-6 score against the Owls from Missouri.

The Vikings found it difficult to gain ground against the hard line of the Owls. However, in the second quarter Dana managed to stun Tarkio with a spread formation, with Terry Wickert climaxing the drive by an eleven yard run for Dana's only touchdown.

Peru-DANA

The Vikings officially entered their 1958 NCC football schedule to the turn of a 62-0 vanquish at the claws of the Bobcats of Peru.

Dana found it impossible to stop the running of Bookwalter and Adams who managed to score 18 and 14 points respectively.

The Peru coach, however, found it necessary to keep his first string in until the third quarter.

DANA-Wesleyan

Nebraska Wesleyan scored in every quarter to defeat Dana 26-3, for the second conference defeat.

The score doesn't represent the

game, as Dana played on almost even ground with the Plainsmen, Terry Wickert was the big gun for the Vikings as he completed nine out of fifteen passes attempted for 99 yards.

Tom Leehy scored the only touchdown on a six yard run.

Concordia-DANA

The Vikings lost their third straight conference game at the hands of a spirited Concordia team by the score of 26-12.

Stan Cupp was Dana's main threat as he caught a pass from Gary Kubik that covered some 40 yards for the Vikings first touchdown. In the second quarter Cupp raced for 46 yards for Dana's second score.

Concordia's John Suhr accounted for three of their touchdowns, as he ran one and passed for the other two.

Chadron-DANA

Undefeated Chadron thumped Dana, 45-6 for its fourth straight conference victory.

Chadron reserves took over early as the Eagles ground out 390 yards on the ground and 131 passing. The Vikings completed 10 out of 28 passes for 158 yards, but were held to 76 rushing.

A Terry Wickert-Stan Cup pass for 28 yards accounted for Dana's only touchdown.

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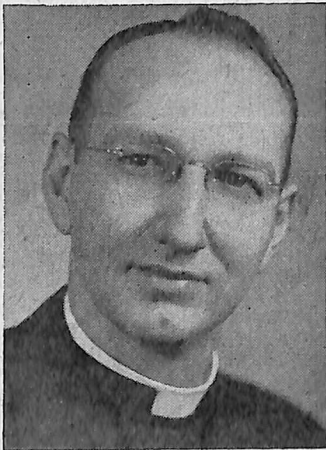

Oct. 24 Reminds Us of Attempt for Peace

United Nations Day—October 24th is the birthday of the United Nations, mankind's noblest attempt to establish everlasting peace with justice. October 24 was the historic day in 1945 that the United Nations officially came into being. It was the day on which the Charter of the UN was ratified by a majority of the then 51 participating countries—a Charter in which a war sickened humanity placed its hopes and aspirations for a peaceful world.

Recognizing that no international organizations can long endure without the support of the peoples of the world, the UN General Assembly in 1947 passed the following resolution: "... that October 24th shall henceforth be called 'United Nations Day' and shall be devoted to making known to the people of the world the aims and achievements of the United Nations and to gaining their support for the work of the United Nations."

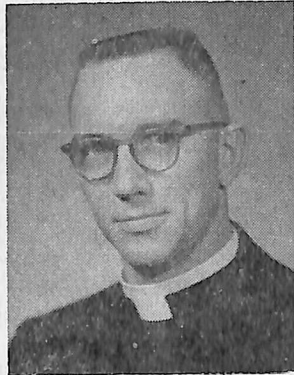

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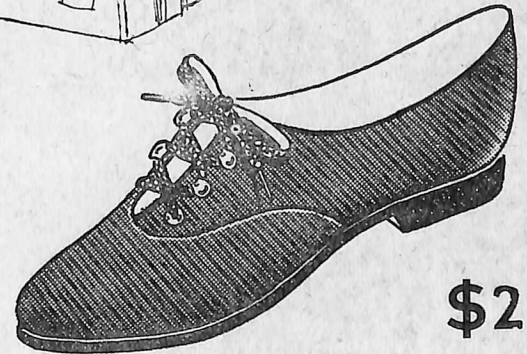

The council meets three times a year, in January, May, and October. It is attended by representatives and registrars of all colleges, the PTA's, the State Department of Education, and many others, for a total representation of 17 educational organizations in Nebraska.
