

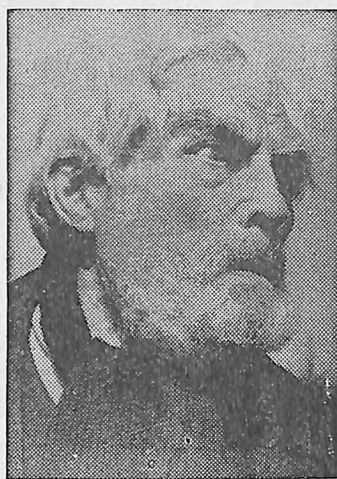
Religious Film, ORDET, to be Shown Sunday; Junior Class Will Serve Aebleskiver Supper

They Just Fade Away

(ACP)—From Washington's Whitman College PIONEER

It is an old adage which says, "Old Soldiers never die, they just fade away." Although President Eisenhower has been perilously close to death on two occasions, he fits the adage well for the most significant thing about American politics today is the demise of Eisenhower and his "crusade." No longer is he sacrosanct, no longer does he hold undisputed leadership on Capital Hill, no longer is he the guiding force of his party and the government.

There are many reasons for this and not least among them is the 22nd Amendment, limiting his presidential tenure. But, the major reason is simply the lack of willingness to pursue his policies with the necessary amount of action. Closely connected with this is the very lack of policy. Vacillation and inflexible stand-patism have been characteristic of the Administration. Although policy has often been quite definite, it has all too often suffered from a vagueness that amounts to drift and sometimes even camouflaged anarchy.

The two major things with which Eisenhower entered the White House were a "crusade" and a decision to reform and revitalize the Republican Party. His attempts at these lasted roughly through his first term and were not completely unsuccessful. But since that time, he has, in effect, abdicated not only his moral "crusade" and his party leadership, but many functions of his presidential office as well.

The present congress will be the proof, but it may not be too exaggerated to say that right now Lyndon Johnson (D-Tex), Senate Majority Leader, and not President Eisenhower is the real power of the government in domestic affairs. And with the retirement of the compromising Senator Green (D-R.I.) as Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and the assumption of that chair by Senator Fulbright (D-Ark), we may well see something similar occurring in the foreign area.

The Midland Warriors started strong yesterday, picking up eight runs in the first two innings at Vets' Field, but finished quite weak. The Vikes, with a barrage of 14 hits, overcame a lead of 9-2, to win going away 12-9.

Dick Poore started on the mound for Dana but was relieved by Everett Johnson at the top of the sixth inning. Johnson, pitching good ball, allowed 1 hit, 4 walks, and struck out two. He was the winning pitcher, and didn't give up a run. Wendt was credited with the loss.

The winning rally was in the bottom of the seventh when Myrvin Christophersen knocked in Bud West for the tying run. Don Joern collected an RBI when he hit a sharp single which drove Ernie Andersen in with the winning run. Ray Mether put the game on ice with two insurance runs when he got his third hit of the day driving in Don Joern and Myrvin Christophersen.

Midland had 9 runs on 10 hits and 4 Dana errors. The Vikes had 12 runs on 14 hits and 1 Midland error. Frieze had two round trippers for Midland.

N. Bansen Speaks at Lincoln Meeting

Norman C. Bansen, associate professor of English, was one of the speakers on the theme "The Imaginative Spirit at the College Level" at the annual meeting of the Nebraska Council of Teachers of English held April 11 at the University of Nebraska. He discussed "Imaginative Teaching of Composition." Dr. Dudley Bailey, chairman of Freshman English at the University of Nebraska, discussed the teaching of grammar, and Dr. Joseph H. Dugas, chairman of the Department of English at Chadron State Teachers College, discussed the teaching of introduction to literature.

The main address of the conference "The Craft of Writing," was by Mari Sandoz of New York City, known as the author of *Old Jules*, *Cheyenne Autumn*, *Crazy Horse*, and other works dealing with the early settlements in western Nebraska.

Dana Students Are Eligible for Rodeo

The University of Nebraska Rodeo Association is holding a Nebraska Collegiate Championship Rodeo on May 9 at the State Fair grounds coliseum at 1:00 and 8:00 p.m. The rodeo is in conjunction with the Lincoln Centennial. They are inviting all the colleges in the state to participate. Each school will be limited to five men and two women.

The events will consist of calf roping, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, and bull riding for men and pole bending, barrel racing, and goat tying for women. Entry fees will be three dollars for rough stock and women's events and five dollars for the timed events. The entry fees will be prorated among the winners along with buckles for first place and prizes for second and third.

All entries will close May 1. There will be facilities available for keeping horses two days prior to the rodeo. The stock will be furnished by Joe Wahn of Parmalee, S. Dak.
