Others will receive special citations for outstanding service to the 75th Anniversary celebration at this time. They are: Mr. and Mrs. Peder Micklesen, Mr. Reed O'Hanlon, Sr., and Mr. Simon Korshoj.

Convocation

The Senior Convocation, which will be held Monday at 9:50, will include, this year, a procession from Old Main to Pioneer Memorial Chapel to display the academic gowns of faculty and seniors. The presentation of awards at the Convocation includes: Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities, Sower Awards, Student Council gifts to the publications' editors, seniors' gift to the college, and science department awards.

Special Recognition

Special recognition will be given to two Dana faculty members who have been teaching for fifty years—Miss Nellie Falk, Professor Emeritus of Dana College, and Miss Elja McCullough, Professor of Elementary Education at Dana.

Dinner for Grads Will be Sponsored by Alumni Assoc.

May 16, is the date set for the Alumni Banquet to be given for the graduating seniors. All seniors, their wives and husbands will be the guests of the association at the Fireside Restaurant in Omaha. The purpose of this banquet is to welcome the seniors into the Alumni Association. The Alumni executive committee will be on hand to help greet the seniors.

Any date of a senior will be asked to pay for the meal.

Miss Patricia Andersen will give her senior piano recital Friday, May 22 at 8:30 in the Alumni Memorial Auditorium.

Pat has been a piano student of Prof. Paul Neve for four years. Her recital will terminate a long and outstanding career of piano work at Dana. Pat has been accompanist for such productions as the "Messiah" and innumerable others.

For her recital Pat is playing two Chopin etudes, one Chopin waltz, a Bach partita, a Hindemith sonata, and "The Cat and the Mouse" by Aaron Copland.

Pat will be instructing music on the high school level next fall.

Government Loan of \$360,000 Makes Progress Possible

On April 29, Dana College received a telegram from Roman L. Hruska and Carl T. Curtis of the United States Senate stating that the school has been granted the government loan. This meant that \$360,000 would be lent when the school could produce \$160,000 as the initial funds for the four story girls' housing construction. This enabled architects to move forward to make detailed specifications for the new construction so that bids can be made. The work will begin either in June or July and will take approximately fifteen months to complete. The housing that will be finished for the fall semester in 1960, for the 132 girls, will be in great demand as the enrollment to date for the fall 1959 semester is 50% higher than last year at this time.

He also attended the University of Nebraska and the University of Chicago. The Rev. Siersbeck is now serving as pastor of St. Mary's Lutheran Church, Kenosha, Wisconsin.

Chaplain L. G. C. Pedersen of Tomah, Wisconsin, will speak at the morning baccalaureate services at First Lutheran Church. Rev. Pedersen attended Dana College and graduated from the seminary in 1929. He has served several parishes in the U. E. L. C. Synod and now is a chaplain in the U. S. Army, serving with the Veterans Administration at Tomah, Wis. Senior Malcolm Pedersen is Chaplain Pedersen's son.

Letter to Students Term Papers Seem to Burden Student

To the students of Dana:

It hardly seems possible that another year of our lives has slipped through our fingers. Another year, perhaps your first year here at Dana, perhaps your last, but another year is now a memory, no longer something to be. The close of this year is a good time for each of us to take time and look back on the happenings of the past year. Ask yourself these questions: What have I accomplished to make myself better, and Dana better during the past year? Was the school year 1958-59 a success for me? How many opportunities did I fail to take advantage of? How often did I forget to be a young adult, and instead acted like a child? How many times did I choose to reject my Christian teaching in thought, word, and deed?

Yes, certainly this IS a good time to take stock of the months that have passed, because even though mistakes were made this year, we still have a chance to correct them next year, be it at college, or at some other place.

We should set our minds right now to how we as Christian students representing Dana College can better ourselves, strengthen our faith, and use the intelligence we are endowed with to be more outstanding in every way we act.

Don't let another year go by without at least a sincere evaluation of what has been produced this past year and what has been missed.

Books, books, and more books. For the past several months this has been a common sight in many dormitory rooms, and the cause—term papers!

During recent inquiry it was discovered that the average student at Dana has been required four term papers, at an average of fifteen pages each. This is for the second semester alone!

Let us consider the work involved in producing one page of a term paper. Research material must be located, note cards recorded, a first draft must be written including precise footnotes for meticulous professors, this work must be edited, and a final draft must be made, which is to be nearly letter perfect at the threat of lowering of the grade. To do all these things it takes approximately two-and-one-half to three hours. Multiply this by 60, the average number of pages per student, and one arrives at a total of four to four-and-one-half forty hour weeks.

Many of the faculty complain that outside activities occupy too much of the student's time and as a result studies suffer. But can any student give just time to studies (disregarding time for leisure activities) when he is burdened by the excessive amount of research papers that Dana instructors assign.

"Professors, spare the term papers!", please.

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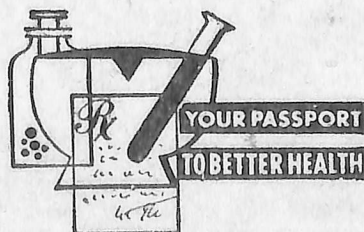


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OFFICERS CHOOSE CABINET

The appointed officers took office the first of May and will serve during the 1959-60 school term.

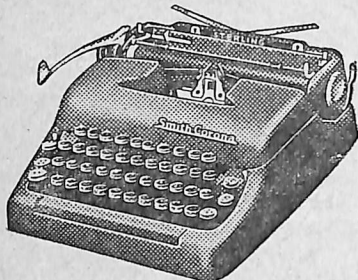

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Peru Drops Vikings in Double Header; Dana Now in Cellar

Peru beat Dana 5-4 and 2-1 Tuesday afternoon, the 12th, to drop the Vikings into the cellar in the mid-western league.

The Bobcats scored one in the first and second innings, then nicked starter Larry Morrow for four straight singles and three runs after two were out in the third inning of the first game. After the third Morrow settled down and pitched four scoreless innings, while his teammates scored three runs on Duane Nietzel's home run. Dana got one more run in the sixth on a walk, a stolen base, and Gary Kubic's single. Dana's rally was stopped by reliefer Jim Poage in the seventh, and Peru had the first game 5-4.

Dana started the second game looking much better than they did the first game. They scored in the first inning, but then the story of who hits the ball and when told the rest of the story. Peru scored two unearned runs off Dana's ace hurler Dick Poore in the third. Dana threatened with men on base in the fourth, sixth and seventh, but couldn't get that extra blow to bring the run home.

Simon Gives Gift for Library Books

Paul Simon, Dana 1946-48, recently sent to Dana College Library a memorial gift with which to purchase several books in the field of government and law, in memory of the late John Mudge, "an outstanding young attorney who contributed much to better government in Madison County, Illinois."

The library has had a definite need for a general book in the field of law, and J. W. Ehrlich's **BLACKSTONE** (1959), helps to fill that need. Mr. Ehrlich has taken Blackstone's **COMMENTARIES**, the basic codification of English and American law, and by careful editing brought it completely up to date. He has made it possible for all to read and understand this historic work, and he says in his preface. "Here you can read why you submit to the law you have created."

The other book is William Ebenstein's **GREAT POLITICAL THINKER** (latest edition). The purpose of the book is to present the major turning points of western political thought from Plato to the present, taken from the original sources. This original material is supplemented by introductory chapter essays placing the thinkers and issues in the proper historical setting and perspective, and is augmented by a great number of bibliographical notes.

Variety in Lyceums for Next Year

The Special Events Committee, headed by Dr. Wayne Wise, is planning a variety of lyceum programs for next year. At least half of these programs will be held in the evening. One of the persons scheduled for first semester is Shoshana Shoshan, operatic soprano; she has given concerts at Carnegie Hall, Town Hall, Madison Square Garden, Constitution Hall in Washington, D. C., as well as appearances on radio and television and recordings.

Others first semester will include: Oliver Mutchuk, an Eskimo, who will speak on Alaska; Orville Fitzgerald, who will lecture on "Mind in Action"; Wes Santee—"America's greatest miler."

Those appearing second semester will be: Daphne Hellam, who plays all types of music on the harp; Hedley Hepworth—a "one man theatre"; Mr. Kenstric, who offers a demonstration-lecture on electricity, "Science on Parade"; Texas Lutheran Choir, which will probably perform April 20, 1960. There is also a possibility that Mr. Joseph Levine, director of the Omaha Symphony Orchestra, and his wife, will appear sometime second semester.

Review has Article of New Professor

Mr. D. Jerome Tweton, who is to become history professor at Dana next fall, has written an article which appears in the April, 1959, edition of **MID-AMERICA**, a historical review.

Mr. Tweton is presently working on his doctorate at the University of Oklahoma at Norman, Oklahoma.

The article, "The Midwestern Immigrant and Politics: A Case Study," describes the immigrant vote in the state of North Dakota in the election of 1900, and how there was a definite pattern to the foreign-born vote which followed ethnic lines. This group loyalty was one of the forces among many which influenced the immigrant vote.

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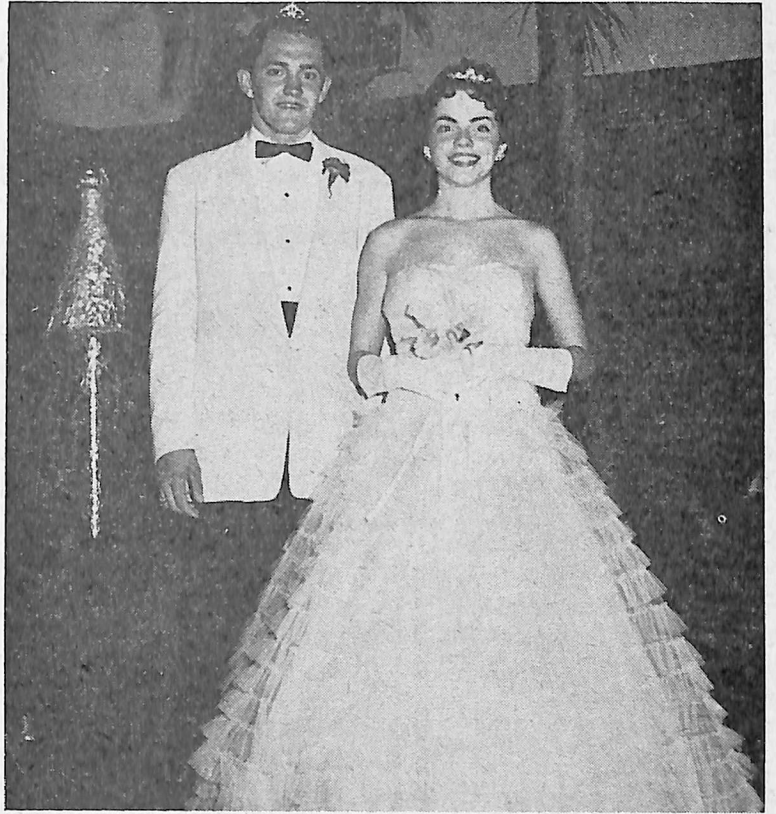
