## "Inside Story" Given About Library Books

The Dana College Library recently received a copy of "A Brief History of the Japan Lutheran Theological Seminary", 1909, written by Sueaki Utsumi and B. Paul Huddle. It was presented by Paul C. Johnsen, Dana graduate of 1950, now a missionary at Chiby City, Japan. In his letter, Rev. Johnsen said that it "was most significant that the second and one of the most influential presidents of the Seminary is our own Dr. J. P. Nielsen.—Also Dr. J. M. T. Winther, who is still active in Japan, was a professor of the Seminary for many years." The book can be read in English from one end and in Japanese from the other, depending on the reader's ability to handle the language. The book will be on display near the Reading Room desk.

**Hill, Alfred T.—THE SMALL COLLEGE MEETS THE CHALLENGE;** the story of CASC. The Council for the Advancement of Small Colleges, Inc., came into existence three years ago when "a particular group of sixty-five small colleges organized in order to improve their own educational programs, increase their financial support, achieve accreditation, and improve their visibility on a national scale.—Alone, they are not likely to influence the educational field; in a group, they promote the American tradition of diversity and independence. The book also contains the result of the all-CASC student testing program." The write-up on Dana College is to be found on page 179.

## Evening Class Features Guest Instructor Polchert

The Dana College Night School program will include a special course in ceramics featuring a guest professor, Mr. Stephen Polchert of Boys' Town. Together with Professor F. William Thomsen of the Dana Art Department, Mr. Polchert will teach a class in advanced ceramics beginning Tuesday, February 2, 1960.

Mr. Polchert, a native of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, studied art at the Layton Institute in that city, the Cranbrook Academy in Michigan and received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from that institution in 1953. Since June of 1953, and at present, he is instructor in ceramics on the College of Adult Programs at the University of Omaha and is head of the Ceramic Department at Boys' Town.

Mr. Polchert has displayed his work at several well known art museums throughout the country including Joslyn Memorial in Omaha. He is also represented in eight permanent collections at various institutions in the United States.

Representative examples of his work are now on display near the Library entrance inside Pioneer Memorial.

## New Library Book Tells Many Stories

**Lin Yutang—FROM PAGAN TO CHRISTIANITY.** In this book the world-renowned philosopher and scholar set down for the first time the full story of his conversion from paganism to Christianity. He was born into the Christian faith but the steady exposure to the words of Confucius, Mencius, Laotse, Chuangste and Buddha gradually coaxed him away from this faith. After weighing one philosopher after another in his constant striving for religious truth, the search led him back to "the form of Christianity which suited him best." Whether or not the reader agrees with his final position, this story of his "spiritual quest" makes inspiring reading.

Here are some of his other books which are available in the library: **THE GAY GENIUS, THE WISDOM OF CONFUCIUS, THE WISDOM OF LAOTSE, THE WISDOM OF CHINA AND INDIA, A LEAF IN THE STORM,** a novel of war-swept China and **MOMENT IN PEKING,** a novel of contemporary Chinese life.

The difference was at the free throw line where the Kearney Antelopes sank thirty-three free throws out of forty-nine.

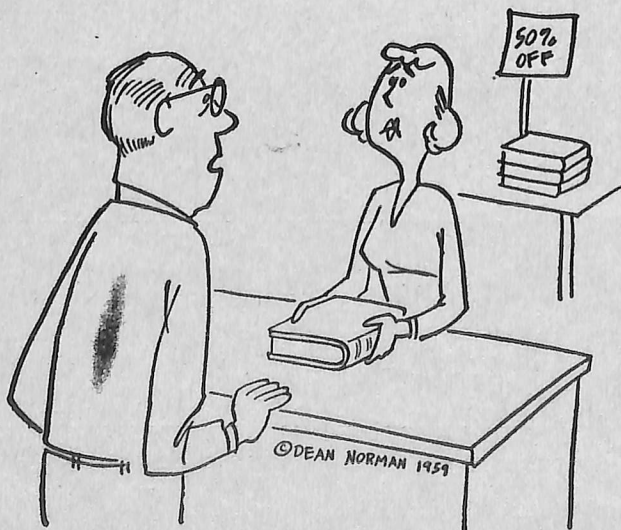
