## Andersen Memorial Park Will Someday Include Plaque, Statue

Five years ago on April 2, 1955, five young Beech trees were dedicated and planted in the small grove between towering Old Main and Pioneer Memorial. They were to honor the memory of one of the world's greatest writers, Hans Christian Andersen. The Beech trees were small and insignificant in comparison to those that surrounded them, but they were a part of Denmark; a gift from the city of Odense, the birthplace of Andersen, and have now become a part of Dana.

The trees themselves have a very interesting history. They were presented to Dana College by the mayor of the City of Odense, Chris Verner on the occasion of Hans Christian Ander-

sen's 150th Anniversary. The trees were flown from Odense to New York via Scandinavian Airlines System and then from New York on to Omaha where a special envoy greeted them and brought them to college hill. The trees were all planted, but only two of the original five survived. However, through the courtesy of Odense and with the aid of John Hansen of Davenport, Iowa, who is a former Supreme President of the Danish brotherhood, five new trees were again sent to Dana and all are now planted and thriving in Hans Christian Andersen Memorial Grove.

The still small trees have a lot of progress to make and will grow along with the college, but they will no longer feel insignificant in their stature. Rather they will now take on a proud aid of someone Kingly, for surrounding them are three shining guardians from the streets of beautiful Copenhagen, Dana's recently acquired Danish Gas Lamps.

Future plans for the Memorial Grove include the possibility of a bust of Hans Christian Andersen and dedicatory plaque to be placed in the midst of Denmark's and Dana's beloved Beech trees.

The rapid pace of modern life and even the sounds of progress at Dana seem oft times to envelope us in a swiftly-moving race for the future. However Hans Christian Andersen knew that certain things will always remain, to echo the ideals and love of past times into the world

Pastor Frederick received his college and seminary training from schools of United Lutheran Church at Rajahmundry, India. He is married and the father of eight children. He has been in active pastoral service for twenty years.

### Serves Jungle

Part of the area which Pastor Frederick supervises is jungle territory, accessible only on foot. When he makes his rounds he covers from 150 to 200 miles walking and camping. There are sixty villages in his area.

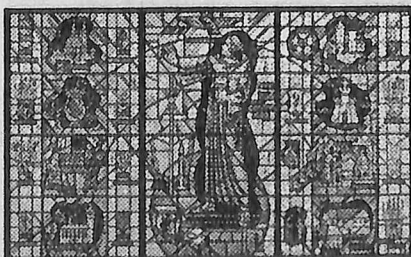

### Six Share Points

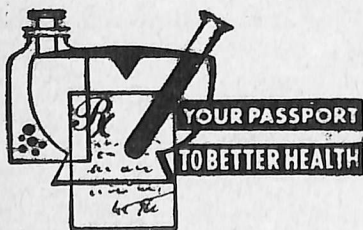

## Transfer Gives New Look To NCC As Doane Beats Dana On His Shots

Doane College Tigers scored decisive points in the last half and downed Dana College by a 79 to 65 score. Doane, battling its way out of the cellar of the Nebraska College Conference standings was led by Gene Velloff who scored 33 points.

Velloff was playing his first game of the season on the varsity team being a transfer student from St. Louis University. He became eligible last week as the new semester started. Trying forty field goals, Velloff only connected on fifteen.

### Game Tied Four Times

Velloff scored the first basket for Doane on an easy lay up with only seconds gone in the ball game. Bud West came back seconds later to tie up the score at two all. The game was tied four times during the first half. Once with nine minutes left in the half Dana took a short lead of one point, 25-24, when Larry Fustos scored on a free throw.

At half time the Doane Tigers held a 39 to 30 lead. During the second half Doane increased the lead and took their first NCC victory by the score of 79 to 65.

### Bud Kept Quiet

During the first half Bud West scored 16 points but Doane's defense during the second half prevented Bud from scoring a field goal. Bud finished the game with 19 points and took scoring honors for Dana. Bud was followed by Fustos who scored twelve points.

### Andersen, Nielsen Hot

In the reserve game a scoring combination of Randy Andersen and Dave Nielsen who scored 19 and 18 points respectively was able to fight an uphill battle and defeat the Doane reserve, 76 to 69.

During the first half the score was tied twice but the Dana B squad was unable to take the lead. The half ended with Doane on top of a 31 to 29 score. During the second half Dana again tied the score four times but were un-

able to pull away until nine minutes remaining in the game. In the final minutes the Dana five held a twelve point advantage coasting to their hard fought victory.

### Perfect Record For Dana

Dave Nielsen connected on eight for eight free throws in the Doane game. Dave in the last two reserve games has scored sixteen for sixteen free throws. Last Tuesday, in the game against Omaha University reserve team, Dave made eight for eight free throws.

The scoring was evenly divided with Andersen and Nielsen heading the scoring list. Bob Erickson scored 12 points followed by Eugene Wallman with eleven points and Tom Winscott with ten points. Gary Richey, Calvin Hultman and Gary Lebeck completed the scoring with two points apiece.

Scoring honors for Doane went to Mac Campbell and Marv Drevvo who scored fourteen points each.
