Introducing Mark Thomsen - Student

In 1953 one of Dana's most outstanding students graduated, leaving behind not only a fine record of achievement in scholarship, athletics, and extra-curricular activities, but also a memory that Dana shall cherish for many years to come.

Mark Thomsen, our Spiritual Emphasis speaker, was truly one of whom Dana can be proud. We, of the HERMES staff, want to give you, the students, a chance to know him better, not as a missionary, not as a speaker or a minister, but as a student like yourself. We want to take this opportunity to recall for you and for him, his outstanding days at Dana.

It was in 1949 that Mark Thomsen enrolled. His first interest was in Physical Education, and his favorite sport was Football. In the September 30, 1949, HERMES, we get a closer glimpse of Mark Thomsen the athlete. "Mark Thomsen, freshman, is the fastest man on the team this year. He plays left half and comes from Denmark, Wisconsin." It wasn't long before Mark established a lasting record in this sport here at Dana and by November 11, 1949, the HERMES illustrates a two-week development. "Thomsen's passing, running and punting has made him one of the outstanding backs of the conference in his first season on the Hill." That year he won all conference back.

Returning in 1950 for his second year, Mark soared to even higher honors in football. It was in that year that he was elected co-captain for the football team. By November 17, 1950, Thomsen's football scoring won a National Rating with 86 points—12 touchdowns and 14 extra points. Before long he was rated 11th in the Nation for his scoring. What a thrill it was to see a Dana name among all those top stars from the other colleges and universities across the country. He scored all the points in the Homecoming game of 1950 also, and of course Dana won that game.

The following years he was unable to play because of injuries received earlier in the 1951 and 1952 seasons. He did, however, play enough those two years to letter four years in football. In track he holds the 22 yard dash record at 22.4 seconds and ran an unofficial 50.8 seconds for 440 yards on a mile relay. He lettered two years in track and one in Basketball.

Other than athletics, Mark Thomsen had high scholastic ratings through his college career and was busy with other activities. He was on the honor roll time and time again and was Student Council Athletic Director from 1951-1952. He wrote features for the HERMES, was among the May Fest Royalty for two years and served as Senior Class President.

With these personal touches we hope that you have come to know Mark Thomsen better and are anxious to hear this remarkable man speak. We also hope that you will join us in saying to him, "Mark Thomsen, we the Dana students, past, present and future, will continually be proud of you."

Wesleyan Still Has Top NCC Season Record

Nebraska Wesleyan took over undisputed first place in Nebraska College Conference league play last Friday evening. The Plainsmen defeated the Midland Warriors to take the lead in the tight NCC race. Both teams going into last Friday's game had identical records 13-4 for the season and 9-1 in the NCC to share first place.

Wesleyan has beaten every team in the league at least once except Chadron, averaging 81.3 points a game while holding opponents to 62.3. Both marks are the best in the NCC.

Midland and Wesleyan will meet again Saturday evening at Fremont, but before they meet, the Dana Vikings will play both teams. Tuesday Nebraska Wesleyan made the trip to Blair and on Friday evening Dana will travel to Fremont to meet the Midland Warriors.

Another important game this weekend will be Friday evening when Wayne and Peru clash at Peru. The loser of the game will have four losses and the end of all title hopes.

Doane's Gene Velloff has moved among the leaders in NCC scoring after only four games. He has scored 153 points for a 38.2 average. Velloff scored only 33 points against Dana two weeks ago but last week against Concordia poured in 52 points. Rudy Stoehr for Wesleyan maintained his lead in the scoring race with 276 points followed by Denny Groves of Midland with 276 points in twelve games.

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Midland Hotshot Bags 36 Points As Determined Viking Try Is Overcome

Midland's Denny Groves poured in 36 points Saturday evening to turn down a determined Viking team, 69 to 50. Midland jumped off to an early lead when Groves made the first two points of the game and kept his team out of reach of Dana's hustling. During the first half the Vikings were unable to get the lid off the basket as numerous good shots failed to go in.

Lead Cut To 10

At rest period the Midland Warriors held a 37 to 19 lead. Following intermission Larry West and Don Joern teamed together to cut Midland's lead to ten points, 43 to 33 with five minutes gone by in the second half.

The Dana rally was short lived as Midland built up steam and their defense prevented the Vikings from scoring a single point until four minutes remained in the game. During the final four minutes Dana outscored Midland eleven points to three. Midland's Glen McCoy was lost by-way-of the foul route with three and a half minutes gone in the first half.

Joern Gets 12

Don Joern took scoring honors for the Viking team as he put in 12 points before fouling out in the last ten minutes of the game. Following close behind Joern was Don Jorgensen with eleven points. Freshmen, Randy Anderson and Tom Winscott teamed together to score six and five points respectively.

Bud West, Gary Lebeck, and Bob Erickson scored four points each and Ward Christensen and Larry Fustos completed the scoring with two points apiece.

The win put Midland back in the NCC title race following their defeat the night before at the hands of Wesleyan, 82 to 63. The win gave Midland a ten win and two loss conference record.

Reserves Win

In the preliminary game the Dana reserves handed Midland a 71 to 55 loss in a rough and tumble game. Midland's ability to make free throws was the only means of keeping them in the game. Midland scored only fourteen field goals but connected on 27 of 40 free throws compared to Dana's 31 field goals and their meager 9 out of 28 charity tosses.

Dana ran up a 40 to 24 half-time score and coasted to their victory. During the second half the two teams each scored thirty-one points. In the closing minutes of the game Dick Justice, going in for a lay-up, was fouled in the air and fell backwards landing on his head resulting in a head laceration.

The scoring was evenly divided as Bob Erickson, Gary Lebeck, Tom Winscott, and Mark Peterson scored fourteen, thirteen, twelve and eleven points respectively.

Hagedorn Gets 22 Santage 20 At Concordia

The Vikingettes traveled to Concordia College at Seward last week-end and downed the lady Bull Dogs 57-45.

Dixie Hagedorn and June Santage led the scoring with 22 and 20 respectively.

The first quarter it appeared that Dana was going to really tromp Concordia but they soon cooled down. At one time in the first half the red and whites were ahead by 25 points.

If it hadn't been for that tremendous start, it might have been anybody's ball game.

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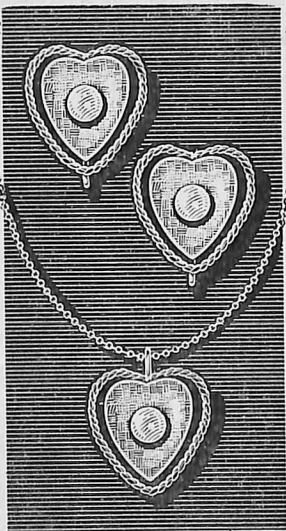
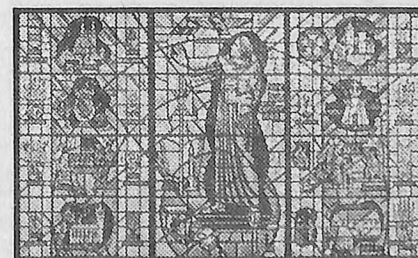
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
