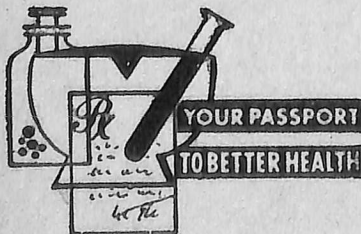

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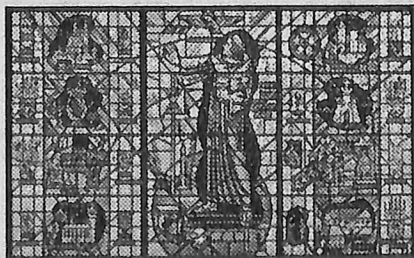
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What's Wrong With Student Council Night?

46 Per Cent Are Good But Score Runs Against Vikings 56 to 43

In spite of hitting 46 per cent of field goals the first half and playing their best game of the season the Dana Vikings were defeated by the Midland Warriors 56 to 43. The game was one of the best games the team has played this season, especially the first half.

Throughout the first half Dana held leads from one point to as many as five points. With less than three minutes remaining in the first half Midland scored six points while leaving Dana scoreless. The six points were enough for Midland to go ahead at the half 30 to 27.

During the first half Dana dominated the game by scoring twelve field goals and connecting on three for three free throws. Midland was able to lead at halftime because they had more trips to the free throw line. The Warriors connected on twelve for thirteen free throws while only scoring nine field goals.

The second stage of the game was reversed as the Fremont team outscored Dana 26 to 16.

Scoring honors for Dana went to Don Jorgensen who chalked up fourteen points followed closely behind by Larry West with twelve. Ward Christensen finished with six points, Don Joern five points, Mark Petrus-

son with four and Tom Winscott finished with two points.

In the first game of the evening the Dana reserves sneaked by the Midland reserves in an overtime 59 to 57.

The reserves had to fight off a Midland rally to come from behind to tie up the score. The score at the end of regulation playing was tied 57 to 57. Midland had several chances to take the win before the end of the game. With only thirty seconds remaining they had control of the ball but lost it on a driving lay up. Dana recovering the ball called a time out, not realizing they had used up their limit of five times out.

As a result of the sixth time out a technical foul was called against the Dana reserve team which entitled Midland a free throw. The free throw was missed, also as the result of the technical foul, Midland gained possession of the ball but were unable to put the ball through the hoop before the end of regulation playing time.

During the two minute overtime period Dana played control ball with Randy Anderson sinking the only two points in the overtime which were enough to give the Viking reserve team a hard fought victory.

The Dana B team led at halftime by the score of 31 to 27.

Randy Anderson took scoring honors with nineteen points with Tom Winscott and Bob Erickson following closely behind with seventeen and twelve points respectively. Mark Petersen with five, David Nielsen with three, Dick Justice with two and Gary Lebeck with one point finished out the scoring.

Stoehr Breaks Dana's Chances 62-52 As Score Soars Over Century Mark Hits 221 Pins For Individual High

A small crowd of basketball fans witnessed Rudy Stoehr defeat the Dana Vikings 62 to 52 Febr. 9. Stoehr, the scoring leader in the Nebraska College Conference, and scoring ace for Nebraska Wesleyan, collected 62 points as the Plainsmen ran rough shod over Dana 117 to 52.

During the first half Stoehr collected only 18 points as he led his teammates to a 45 to 27 halftime lead. During the first ten minutes of the second half he scored twelve points and in the final ten minutes poured in a total of 32 points to break all individual scoring records in the NCC. Stoehr hit 24 field goals for a 69 per cent average for the entire game. During the second half he hit 90 per cent of his field goals.

Wesleyan, shooting a torrid 56 per cent field goal percentage for the entire game, also connected on 31 for 33 free throw attempts, for a percentage of 94.

Wesleyan started the scoring and were never headed. A short lived Dana rally occurred within six minutes remaining in the first half when captain Don Jorgensen put through three straight field goals to shorten Wesleyan's lead 29 to 20.

Jorgensen took scoring honors for the Vikings with twelve points followed by Don Joern with nine points.

In the first game of the evening the Dana reserves took revenge of an early defeat at the hands of the Wesleyan reserve team by outscoring them 87 to 73. Wesleyan started off with a short lead which the reserves soon overcame and went into the lead to stay.

At halftime the reserve team had built up a 47 to 32 lead. Along with the balanced scoring the reserves were never headed once they were able to overcome the Lincoln team early in the first half.

Bob Erickson took scoring honors by pouring in 17 points followed by Randy Anderson, Tom Winscott, and Mark Peterson with sixteen, fourteen and twelve points respectively. Dave Nielsen hit eight points with Bryce Olson scoring six points. Dick Justice and Gary Lebeck each had five points while Gary Bates and Jens Mogensen collected two points apiece.

Three Top 200 In Febr. 7 League Bowling

Three bowlers had two hundred games Febr. 7 in the College League as Jack Bosen for the Alley Goofs scored 215 points to take first place in individual high game honors. Jack Madsen bowling for the Great Danes rolled a 211 and Lee Wiges bowling for Lee's Spirits got a 201 game. The three bowlers who bowled the individual high games also took individual honors for three games with a 575, 556 and 531 totals respectively.

The Cellar Dwellers with a 757 total for a single game took first place while the Fizzling Five with 754 took second place and the Alley Goofs with 749 took third place.

Everett Johnson bowling a 221 led the individual scoring in the Dana College mixed league bowling last Sunday afternoon. He was also high scorer for three games bowling a total of 522.

Larry Morrow with 215 and Howie Christensen with a 194 took second and third place respectively in the individual scoring. Second and third place for individual three games went to Larry Morrow with 512 and Jerry McCoy with 512.

The Foul-Blows with 794 took first place in the one game series with the Holy Rollers coming in second with 756. The Foul-Blows also took high game series with 2214 points in three games. The Holy Rollers with 2143 and Cellar Dwellers with 2080 finished in second and third place respectively.
