Ike Excited Over European Tour With All-American Chorus In June

Isaac Jenkins has been selected for the 1960 "All-America Chorus." The group, conducted and organized by James Allan Dash, will spend from June 27 to August 7, 1960 touring France, Germany, Italy, Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland, and Luxembourg.

Members are chosen on the basis of recommendations by professional musicians and other persons who are acquainted with the applicant's musical and personal qualifications.

On Monday, June 27, they will meet in the Empire Hotel, New York City for their first "get-acquainted" meeting. On the following morning these "Ambassadors of Song" will board a trans-Atlantic liner and embark on a breathtaking journey that will take them all the way to Prague and Pilsen behind the "Iron Curtain."

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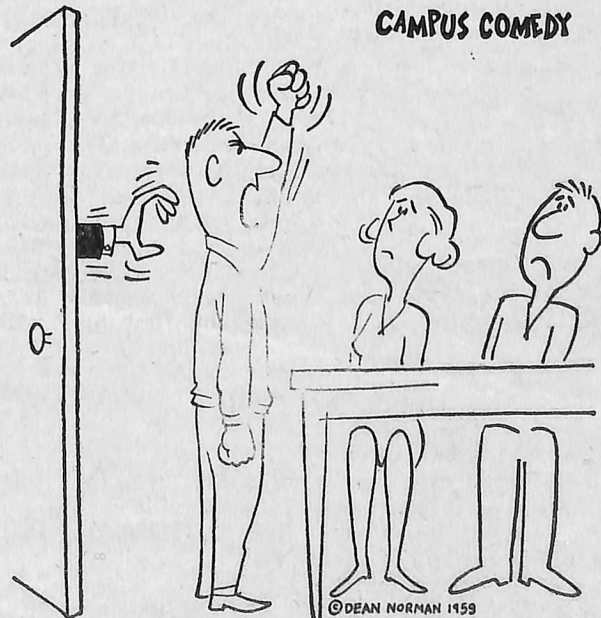

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Dana Clash With Wayne Ends '60 Season With Close First Half

A capacity crowd last Friday evening watched a determined Dana team go down in defeat 64 to 50 at the hands of Wayne State. Although fourteen points difference in the score the Vikings played a good game in and effort to dethrone the Wayne Wildcats from among the NCC leaders. The game marked the end of the season for both clubs.

Wayne jumped off to an early lead but three field goals by West and a free throw by Jorgensen with four minutes gone in the game found Dana ahead 7 to 5. The score throughout the first half was tied six times and the lead changed hands nine times. The largest lead Dana ever held over the Wayne Staters was a two-point margin.

With four minutes remaining in the first half the score was tied 22 all. During the final four minutes Dana was only able to score one point while Wayne scored nine to lead at halftime, 31 to 23.

During the second half Wayne continued to pour on the steam scoring 33 points to coast to a 64 to 50 victory. The win was the tenth straight victory for the Wayne State Wildcats.

Three seniors, Don Jorgensen, Don Joern and Mark Petrusson, played their final game for Dana College. Joern finished the evening with 11 points followed by Jorgensen with nine points. Petrusson did not score because he picked up three quick fouls in the first half and did not see much action for the rest of the game.

Taking scoring honors for Dana was Larry West with 15 points. Other point getters for Dana were Roger Petersen and Phil Larsen with four apiece, Ward Christensen with three, and Tom Winscott and Jack Madsen two points each.

In the reserve game the Dana freshmen were clobbered by the Creighton University B team 94 to 58.

The Dana freshmen team played an outstanding first half limiting the usually high scoring Omaha team to only 32 points. During the first half with five

and a half minutes gone in the game the Dana freshmen went ahead nine to seven on a field goal and a free throw by Randy Anderson. Later in the first half Randy again put his teammates ahead by two points on a field goal.

The half ended with Creighton on top with a 32 to 29 score. During the second half the Omaha team exploded and poured in 62 points while the Dana team could only score 29 additional points.

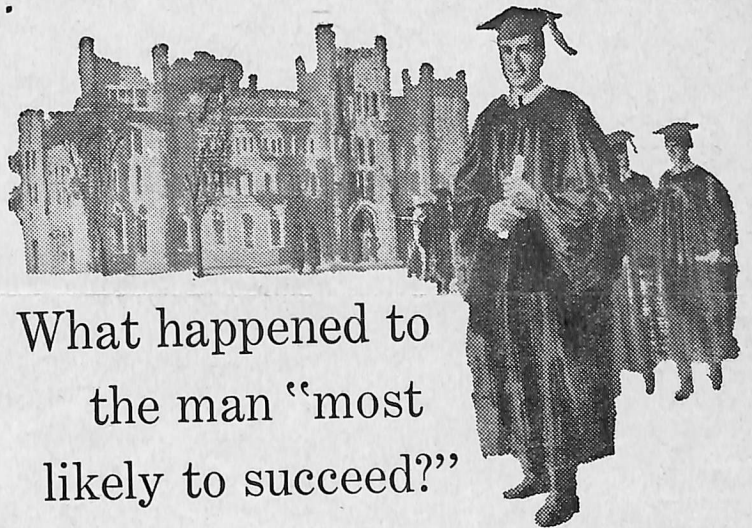

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Freshman Record Ends With Six Wins, Six Losses

The freshman team finished the season with six wins and six losses, winning twice from Doane and Midland reserves and splitting games with Nebraska Wesleyan and Concordia reserves. They fell victim twice to Creighton and Omaha University "B" teams.

The freshmen had several close games, winning one Concordia reserve game 64 to 63, and losing one to the same team by the score of 70 to 71. They also defeated the Midland reserves 59 to 57 in an overtime.

The entire team scored a season total of 802 points while their opponents had a slight margin of 866 points in 12 games.

A total of 15 freshmen entered into the scoring column with Randy Anderson taking first place honors with a 183 season total for a 15.2 game average for the 12 games.

Bob Erickson with 141 points finished the season with 11.8 points per game average. The third freshman to score in the triple figures was Tom Winscott with a 108 total for a 9.8 average in 11 games.

David Nielsen finished in fourth place with 69 points followed by Marc Petersen with 63, John Volkman with 44, and Gary Lebeck with 42 points. Gary Bates scored 38 points while Dick Justice put through 31 points and Gary Richey 29 points.

Gene Wallman hit 24 points, Jens Mogensen 11 and Calvin Hultman nine. Two new second semester students finished out the scoring with Byrice Olson hitting eight points and Jim McKay hitting two points.

Vikingettes Pull Game From Fire Turn Roth Away From Victory Hopes

The Vikingettes pulled another close contest out of the fire last Sunday by defeating Roth Packers 47-42 in overtime during the first round of the Midwest AAU Women's Basketball tournament.

Dana did not take the lead until half way into the fourth quarter and they were never ahead by more than three points until the last seconds of the overtime period.

With ten seconds remaining in regular play the home squad was awarded two charity tosses. These were missed, however, and Roth controlled the rebound but chose to hold onto the ball and play the extra three-minute period.

Going into the overtime the score was 42-42. Roth became over aggressive and was penalized three times. Sharon Mardesen connected on one of her penalty tosses while Shirley Thompson contributed two.

With the score at 45-42 Donna Layton was left unguarded under the basket and made an easy lay-up. Before Roth could work the ball down court, the final buzzer sounded and Dana won, 47-42.

Layton led the victors in scoring with 26 points, most of which were jump shots off the post. Petite Thompson, besides playing a tremendous all around game, added 13 tallies to the cause; seven of them free-throws.

In the back court Miriam Petersen, Judy Hansen and Joyce Nielsen did a very creditable job of controlling rebounds and intercepting passes.

Tomorrow night the Red and White will take on Commercial Extension who have won the tournament the last ten years. Some say they are much weaker

now than ever before, so who knows, they might tumble over their own crown.

Wesleyan Ties With Wayne For NCC Top Team

Nebraska Wesleyan and Wayne State finished in a tie for first place in the final Nebraska College Conference standings. Both teams finished with identical records in conference play, 15 victories and three defeats.

The new co-champs had pre-season billing as contenders but Peru, which finished third, was the favorite to repeat as the NCC king. Midland was the surprise of the league, making a run for the title until the last week before settling in fourth place at 13-5.

West Averages 14.2 Per Game For 270 Total

Larry West took scoring honors for the 1959-60 basketball season with 270 total points for an average of 14.2 points per game. Bud's highest single game occurred towards the end of the season when he scorched the net with 33 points against Kearney.

Don Joern with 168 points took second place in the scoring race. Don had a 8.8 average for 19 games. Captain Don Jorgensen followed close behind with 163 points for an average of 9.1 points for 18 games. Don did not play in the first game of the season against Tarkio College.

The other member of the Dana team to score in the triple figures was Larry Fustos who finished the season with 104 points. Larry had a 5.8 point per game average in 18 games. In four games he did not score which lowered his game average.

Roger Peterson with 63 points took fifth place followed by Myrvin Christopherson with 58 points, Mark Petrusson with 54, and Phil Larsen with 50 who finished in sixth, seventh and eighth places respectively.

Other scorers on the varsity team include Ward Christensen with 43 points, Randy Anderson with 36, and Tom Winscott with 33. Finishing out the season total were Gary Lebeck with 15, Jack Madsen with 13, and Bob Erickson with six.

Dana scored a total of 1076 points in 19 games while their opponents scored a total of 1411 points. In conference play the Vikings scored 999 points in 18 games while their opponents ran up a 1348 total.

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
