Authentic or not, no one can be absolutely positive, and it is in this light that Dr. Linss presents his lecture. He points out many things in the photograph, however, that should give us all something concrete to think about during this season of our Lord's suffering and death, which we so often tend to minimize and forget about.

Everyone is welcome, and after you have heard and seen, I'm sure you'll agree that it is a tremendous presentation.

Visiting Lecturer Fitzgerald Will Tell About "The Mind In Action"

O. G. Fitzgerald believes it is possible to remember everything you have ever seen or heard, and proves it as he demonstrates "The Mind in Action."

Mr. Fitzgerald can meet 100 or more people and name them correctly — first and last names — hours, days or years later. After looking at a dollar bill for two seconds, he can later call off the serial number in any order or combination requested.

Memory is the result of our eyes and ears functioning as a camera and recorder, respectively, making impressions on the mind, which Fitzgerald compares to a blank film. Once recorded properly, any impression can be recalled from our mental storehouse.

Most often, however, the mind retains only those things of greatest interest to the individual, giving basis for the idea that we have a poor memory. For this reason one of Mr. Fitzgerald's chief functions is as a

teacher of memory training and development to students, businessmen and others who need or want to have a better memory.

With sufficient interest and a few easily applied methods of memory training, names, faces, dates, numbers, etc. can be recalled at will once they are properly registered in the mind.

O. G. Fitzgerald has a fantastic memory, and is willing and able to prove that your memory is better than you think it is and can be trained to amaze you and everyone you meet.

Mr. Fitzgerald is a Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania businessman with training in law, accounting and human relations. He is a Dale Carnegie graduate and is a member of the International Platform Association.

Mr. Fitzgerald will present his program at the 9:35 convocation in the Gymnasium-Auditorium, Tuesday, March 15.

But Was It Worth Cheating?

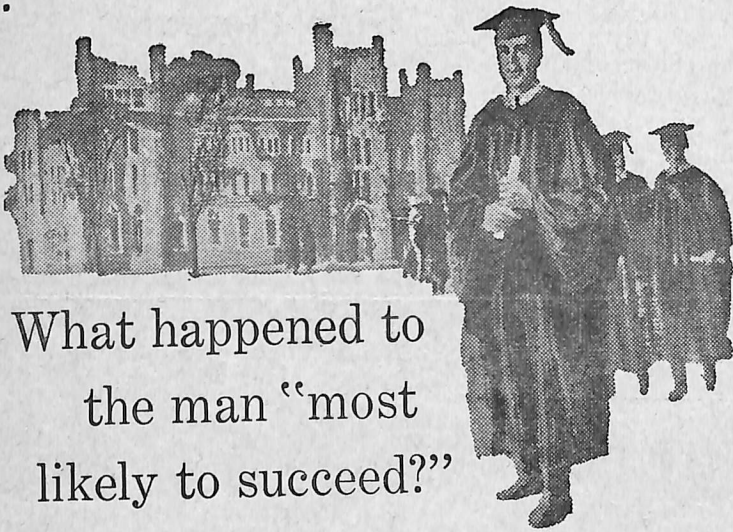

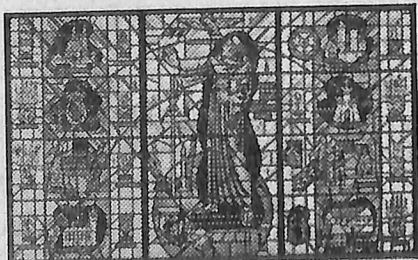

Omaha's Commercial Extension remained champions of Midwest AAU Women's basketball as they won the tournament for the eleventh straight year.

In the semi-final round they met Dana. Many predicted that the Vikingettes would have a good chance, but the Comet's name and reputation still reign in the eyes of the fans, as they tumbled the home squad 48 to 26.

The obvious difference between the teams was that one could make the ball go through the basket and the other could not. The first half saw the red and white shooting 8% from the floor while Commercial tallied 33%.

By the time Dana found the basket it was too late. They shot 33% in the second half as compared to 22% for the champs.

Donna Layton managed to pot in 10 points to lead in scoring—all during the latter period.

During the third quarter, it looked like Dana was going to make a come back. But the 20 point lead, and the fact that Miriam Petersen, star rebounder, was benched on fouls was too much to overcome.

Dixie Hagedorn and Shirley Thompsen deserve special credit for their hustle. They tried desperately to compensate for their cold shots by out-fighting the big girls, but nothing helped.

Another determining factor for Commercial was their superior defense. No one in this area can compare to All-American Karen Jones for rebounding and all-around defensive play.

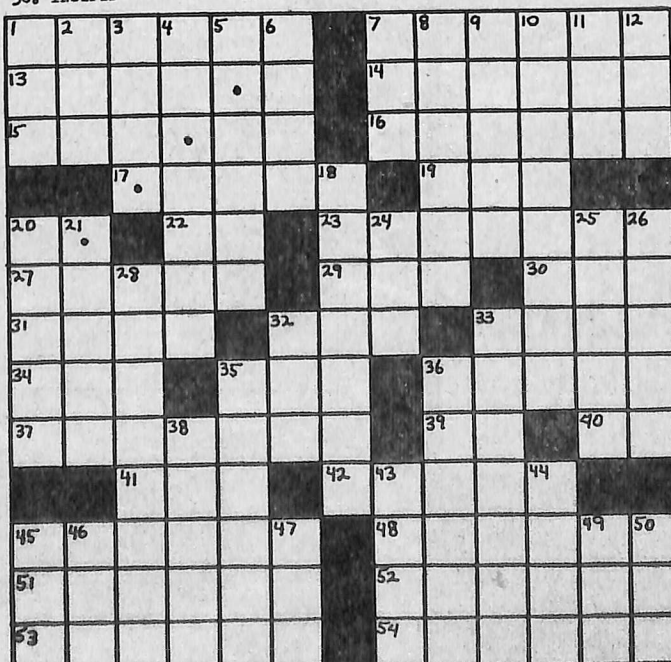

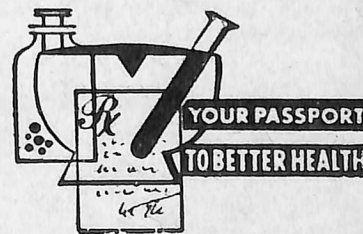
After graduating next spring, Miriam hopes to teach elementary school in Omaha and play basketball for Wrights.
