In addition to her teaching duties at Dana, Miss Strøm intends to take several courses in History and American Literature.

\$7600 Grant To Dana Senior Howard Christensen For Economics

Howard Christensen, senior at Dana College, has been awarded a three year National Defense Graduate Fellowship in the amount of \$7600. He will continue his work in the field of Economics at the University of Nebraska beginning this fall.

The National Defense Graduate Fellowship is an award intended to enable the holder to work toward a Doctoral degree in his field of study and assist him in preparing for prospective positions in the Nation's colleges and universities. The award is made by the National Department of Health, Education and Welfare in Washington. Mr. Christensen has been an active participant in campus affairs during his four years at Dana. He has held positions in the student government, lettered in athletics and served as an officer in several campus organizations. He is presently completing his under-graduate major in Business Administration and Economics and intends to enter the field of college teaching upon receiving his Ph. D.

Announcement of the award came from Mr. Henry Bent, Chief of the Graduate Fellowship Section, Department of Education, Washington, D. C.

More Books Donated For Library Use

The past several weeks have seen an increase in the book collection of the Dana College Library. Mr. William Christensen, the author of *THE SAGA OF THE TOWER*, presented the book, *OLD DANISH SILVER*, by Boesen and Bøje. It is the first of a series of richly illustrated books on the applied arts of Denmark in past ages. This volume deals with silver as used in the service of food and drink. Gudmund Boesen deals with some aspects of the use of domestic silver, and Chr. Bøje discusses the technique of the goldsmiths' craft and conditions under which they worked in Denmark.

The *TIME MAGAZINE* presented the art book *THREE HUNDRED YEARS OF AMERICAN PAINTING*, by Alexander Eliot, art editor of *TIME MAGAZINE*, with an introduction by John Walker, director of the National Gallery. 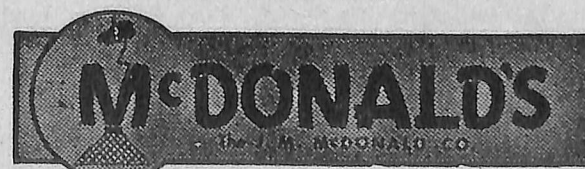
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Library Week Theme "Wake Up And Read"

The third National Library Week is being observed throughout the United States the week of April 3-9. The theme will be "Open wonderful new worlds—Wake up and read."

Are people reading more than they used to read in the GOOD OLD DAYS? Evidence points that way. One European traveler says she was impressed when going through several libraries in Russian cities, that reading of good books and the classics "is a national activity in the USSR. Wherever you look, you see Russians reading. Their libraries and bookstores are full. The Soviet citizens hunger for knowledge and do something about it." Do we?

It was a dire prediction of a generation ago that radio, television and other distractions would crowd out culture in America, but a recent report from Johns Hopkins University points out that quite the opposite has happened. Americans are studying and reading more and this "tremendous upsurge in learning in this country is a challenge to all libraries, and points up the need for solid libraries not only in communities but in every educational institution in the land.

This interest is manifested in practically all worthwhile magazines with their weekly, monthly or occasional book reviews and suggested readings, as BETTER HOMES & GARDENS, LIFE, LOOK, SATURDAY EVENING POST, SEVENTEEN and many others.

Dana College, too, has contributed toward this better reading world through its Liberal Arts reading program now in its fourth year and its various displays. The sale of paper bound books in the Canteen has also been a force for wider reading, so WAKE UP AND READ!

Petersen and John Andreasen.

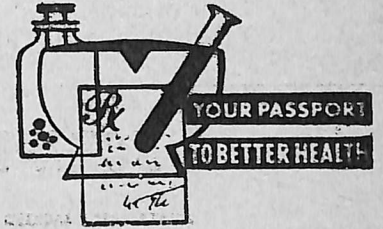

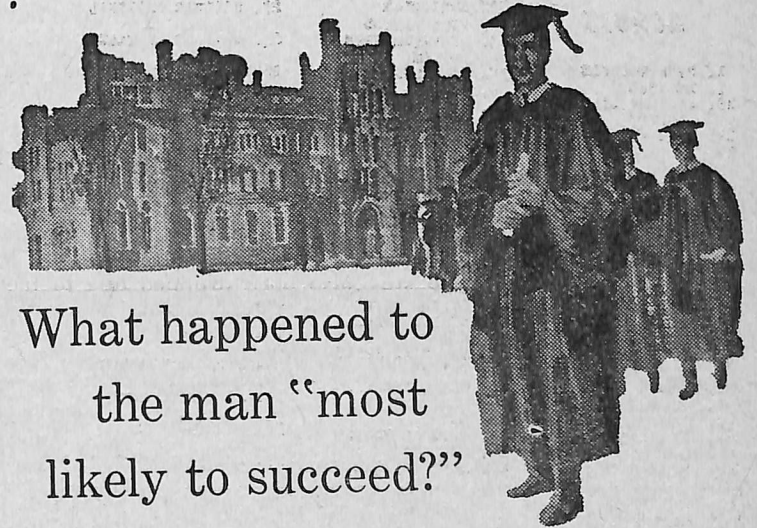
