

## Shakespearean Eve Tonight With Plays And Music

Excerpts from three of William Shakespeare's famous plays will be presented by a group of Shakespeare students on Thursday evening, April 7 at 8:00 P.M. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. The three works chosen are, "Twelfth Night," "A Midsummer Nights Dream," and "Hamlet." All will be presented in authentic costume.

Two Shakespearean students, Al Girtz of Los Angeles, California and Holger Madsen of Rosedale, Alberta, Canada, are completing work on a detailed model of the old Globe Theatre where many of Shakespeare's plays were originally presented. The model will be on display at the Shakespearean Evening program.

This special performance is open to the public. A general admission charge of 25¢ will be made.

—On the national front Humphrey and Kennedy battle for democratic nomination in Wisconsin, a key state.

—On local front, floods left much of eastern Nebraska under water damage. Estimates are still coming in but at least four counties have been declared aid areas by Small Business Administration.

## Library Given Valued Pictures

Dana College Library was the recipient recently of a number of pictures that would be of interest to Dana people past and present. These were given by Miss Amanda Hansen who taught here from 1905 to 1914 and her sister, Mrs. N. T. Lund, whose husband taught here from 1905 to 1915. One is a picture of Elkhorn College in 1899, Elkhorn, Iowa when Rev. P. L. C. Hansen was President and Prof. H. W. Foght of "Skinny Angel" fame, and the Misses Dorothea Jensen and Amanda Hansen taught there. Elkhorn College later became Dana College. Another picture was the 1908 Viking Basket Ball team coached by A. K. Petersen, and the 1907 girls' Basket Ball team was coached by Miss Caroline Johnsen. Still another was of the 1907 Dormitory girls and teachers with Miss Amanda Hansen and Miss Caroline Johnsen in the group.

The 1907 Dana College Choir consisted of twelve singers with Mr. N. T. Lund as director and Miss Amanda Hansen as accompanist. In the picture can be seen Miss Caroline Johnsen, one of Dana's beloved early teachers, and N. C. Carlsen, the former president of the U.E.L.C. There were also several other student body pictures of later years.

Miss Hansen and Mrs. Lund also gave a number of old religious books. One of these was a Danish hymnal with a very interesting metal trimmed clasp dotted with ruby colored stones. Dana College Library is grateful to its friends for these gifts.

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## Tomorrow's Meet At Wesleyan

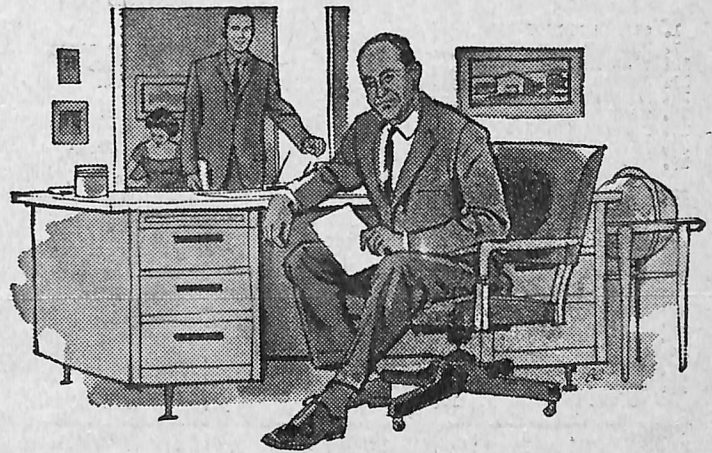

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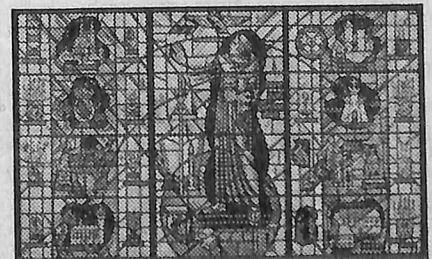

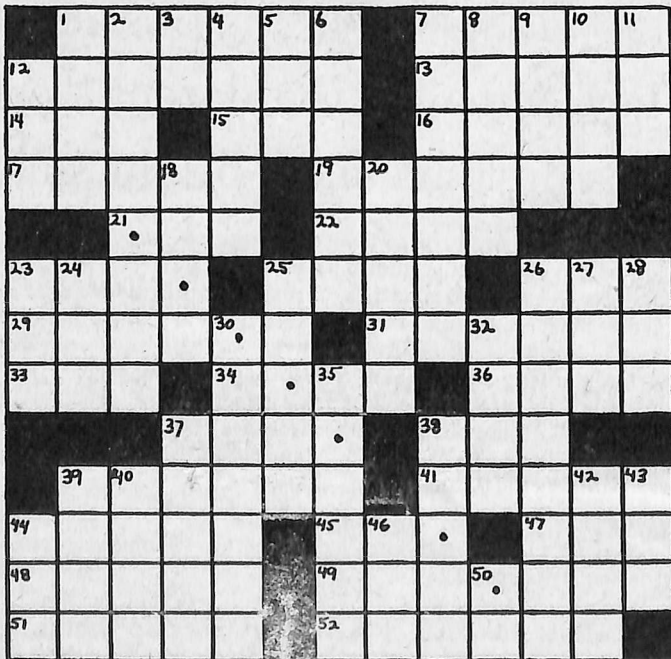
