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New Book Is On Lutheran And Education

Is there a Lutheran philosophy of higher education?

Fifteen educators have teamed up to provide an answer in "Christian Faith and the Liberal Arts," published this spring by Augsburg Publishing House, Minneapolis, Minn.

The book discusses the liberal arts in relation to the contemporary American college—as viewed from the perspective of the Christian faith.

After discussing the role of the liberal arts in Christian higher education, the theological basis for such an education, a philosophy of man, the place of objectivity, the curriculum, and the administration of a Christian college, eleven chapters are used to present the fields of religion, philosophy, literature language studies, history, music, visual arts, natural sciences, sociology, psychology, and political science, and their place in the curriculum on a Christian college.

Thesis of the book is that the Christian Church must be a place of "liberal" learning, ever leading man into deeper knowledge of himself and providing him with that knowledge and those experiences which will assist him in being a responsible growing Christian person.

Nebraska Treasurer Larsen Offers Detailed Account For Eligible Voters

As a courtesy to the students of the state of Nebraska, Richard R. Larsen, state treasurer, discloses the following student voting rights.

Students may vote at the seat of a university if they have residence there and are otherwise qualified. Mr. Larsen cites the case of *Berry V. Wilcox*, 44 Nebr. 82, 62 N.W. 249 (L. 895). The *Berry* case further states that if other voting qualifications are fulfilled, students may vote if their main purpose for coming to the seat of the university was to obtain an education and they are not dependent upon their parents for support and have no intention of returning to their parental home upon completion of their studies. The students need not have a purpose formed as to their movement after their studies are completed. If the student regards the seat of the university as his home, going away during vacation with an intent to return when the term opens does not affect residence.

If students do not fall within the classification of the *Berry* case, Mr. Larsen points out that the student may exercise his right as an absent voter. 32-803, R.R.S. 1943 states that the absent voter should ... Not more than ninety days nor less than two clear days before such election, apply in writing to the county clerk or election commissioner of the county of such voter's residence, as issuing officer, and request that such officer forward an absent voter's ballot to such voter by mail, or by such means as the congress of the United States may provide. The application for an absent voter's ballot shall be in writing and signed by the voter, and shall state the voter's residence address and the address where the ballot and supplies shall be sent to the voter. If the election be a primary election, the voter must state the political party with which such voter affiliates.

According to 32-102, R.R.S. 1943

... No person shall be qualified to vote at any election unless such person shall have resided in the state six months, in the county forty days, and in the precinct, township or ward ten days, and shall be a citizen of the United States.

If a student falls under the rule of the *Berry* case (which is still followed) the residence requirement means the county and precinct in which one resides while attending the university. If voting by absentee ballot, according to Mr. Larsen, the residence requirement is in reference to the county and precinct in which the person is voting.

If a student is self-supporting (falling under the rule of the *Berry* case) and fulfills the other legal requirements and desires to vote in city and county in which the university is located, he should go to the office of the election commissioner or city clerk (if registration is required and so state his intentions.)

Mr. Larsen says there is no reason to believe that the *Berry* case would not apply to all colleges and universities in the state of Nebraska.

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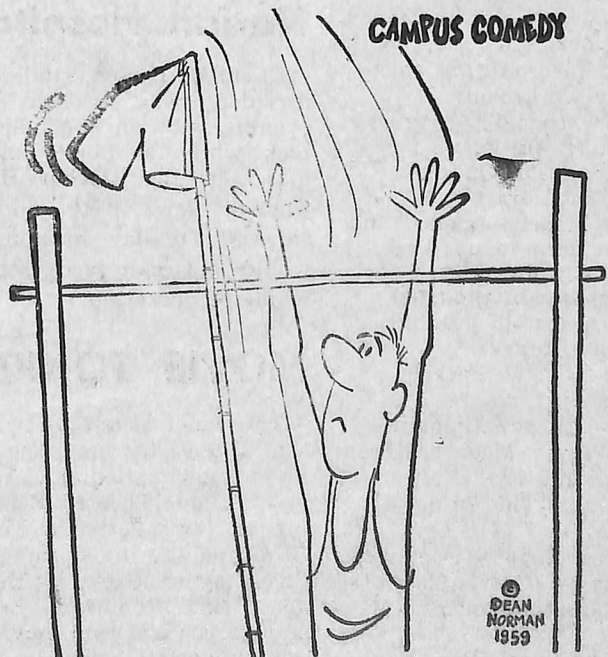


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Wayne Tromps As Dana Falls In Two Tries

Tom Winscott lost a heart-breaker in the opening game. Tom allowed but four hits. Two of the Wesleyan runs were unearned. Dana scored two runs in the fourth inning with two down, Don Joern walked and singles by John Templeton and Lee Barney, plus a Wesleyan error, accounted for the runs.

Dana collected four hits, all singles, by Templeton, Barney, Joern and Roger Petersen.

In the second game Wesleyan scored five runs in the opening frame. Larry Morrow, Dana hurler, then settled down and allowed but two hits the rest of the game.

Dana scored two runs in the first frame. Dave Nielsen and Gary Lebeck each singled. Two infielder's choices were followed by a single by Mark Petersen. In the sixth inning, Lebeck singled, and later scored on a single by Mark Petersen. Petersen and Lebeck led the hitters.

Golfers Lose To Two Teams

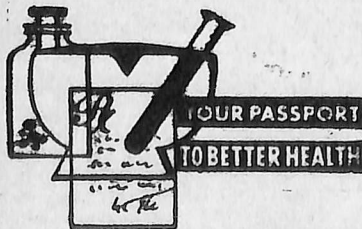

Wind Blows Good For Omaha U And Dual Meet Victory 70-57

Last weekend Dana gave Omaha University a good run but came up on the short end of the score, 70 to 57. The wind at times was gusting 40 to 50 miles per hour. Because of the wind the low hurdle event was eliminated because barriers couldn't be made to stand on the curves.

During the high hurdles event fans held string against the hurdles to keep them in place.

In the field Dana swept the events except the discus which was won by Krogh of Omaha on a throw of 163 ft., 5-in. and the pole vault which was won by Elliott of Omaha.

First place winners in the field events were Emory Anderson in the shot with a distance of 45 feet, and the javelin with a toss of 159 ft., 6-in. Bill Bracker took first place in the high jump with a jump of six feet. Norman Bock was the other first place winner with a 22-ft., ½-in. leap in the broad jump.

Andy Anderson and Dick Carr took second and third places in the pole vault. In the high jump Phil Larsen and Dean Hendrickson tied for third place. Ray Hundtofte took second place in the broad jump. Andy Anderson took third place in both the discus and the shot. Mel Mueller took second in the discus. In the javelin event Norman Bock took third place.

The only first place in the track events was won by Larry Swanson in the 220-yard dash with a time of :25.5. Larry West took second in the 220 and the 100-yard dash. In the mile run Kermit Paul came in second and in the two-mile run Paul Christensen captured second place. Hans Willadsen came in second place with Paul coming in third in the 880-yard run. Tom Frank took third in the 120-yard low hurdles and Darrell Mertens took third place in the 100-yard dash.

Dana Tops In Sioux City

Thursday before Easter vacation the Dana track and field team chalked up their first victory of the 1960 season. The Vikings won the quadrangular meet with a total of 77 and 2/3 points at Sioux City with Morningside as host team.

Other teams in the meet were Morningside who came in second with 49 points, Westmar with 27½ points and Augustana of Sioux Falls, South Dakota, in last place with five points.

Emory Anderson won the shot put with a toss of 41 ft., 1 in., and the javelin with a throw of 171 ft., 9 in., to win two firsts for the Vikings.

Mel Mueller won the discus with a toss of 118-6; Ray Hundtofte the broad jump, with a leap of 19 ft., 10½ in.; Dean Hendrickson and Bill Bracker tied for first in the high jump, with a 5 ft., 8 in. jump.

In the running events, Vernon Mathieson won the low hurdles in :26.6, Tom Frank the highs in :15.9 and Hans Willadsen the 880 in 2:05.2.

The 880-yard relay team, composed of Larry West, Hundtofte, Larry Swanson and Bryce Olson, set a new school record running the event in 1:32.5.

Eighteen high school relay teams are expected to compete Saturday in the first annual Dana College Relays. The relays will be held on the new track. The meet is scheduled to begin at 1 o'clock.

The eighteen teams, with more expected to enter, are divided up into two classes, A and B. Special trophies will be presented to the winners of the different relay events.

Ten teams have entered in the Class A division. They are Blair, Valley, Plattsmouth, Lincoln Pius X, Nebraska; Missouri Valley, Woodbine, Onawa, Griswold, Underwood, and Logan, Iowa.

In Class B: Modale, Ia.; Herman, Kennard, Fort Calhoun, Arlington, Bennington, Gretna and Craig, Nebr.

Dana had bad luck in the sprinting events due to pulled muscles by three sprinters. Bud West has been placing consistently in the 100 yard dash.
