Wayne Armer, former Dana coach, served as master-of-ceremonies for the evening. Rev. Clair Olney, local pastor and assistant football coach last fall, gave the table prayer.

Following the meal, Wayne Armer introduced athletic director and coach, Paul Peterson, who introduced the visiting guests and spoke on the upcoming season in the new conference, the Tri-State Conference. Coach Peterson announced the 1959-60 honor athlete of the year, Don Joern. Don was selected by the members of the D-Club and was presented a trophy by Coach Peterson.

Coach Peterson also presented a trophy to Everett Johnson for his fine and capable job as coach of the girls' basketball team for the past two years. Peterson in turn introduced former coach Rufus Olson who presented Miriam Petersen with the Olson trophy for the outstanding girls' player on the girls' basketball team. This marked the second consecutive year that the Olson family has presented a trophy to a member of the team. Last year's winner was Donna Layton.

Coach Darrell Zimmerman spoke on the track team and football team and upon the upcoming season. Coach Zimmerman announced the results of the balloting for football captain for this fall which resulted in a three way tie. From there the plan must be taken to the Board of Trustees for further approval, the clerical work must be completed and loan agreements and questionnaires will be given or sent to each member of the Dana student body.

I am convinced that we can successfully carry out the project. It is important to remember that students before us made sacrifices because they wanted future students to benefit. He also stated that a project like this could do a world of good for publicizing Dana. 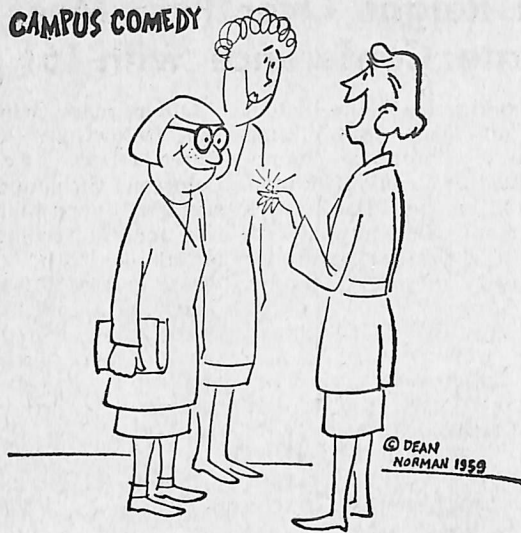

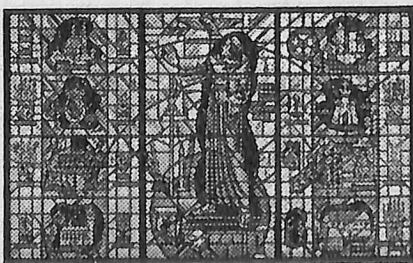

Summer Session Offers Total Of 52 Credit Classes

The 1960 Summer Sessions at Dana College in Blair will feature the largest number of course offerings ever listed by the mid-continent college, plus the opportunity for educational tours and a special workshop in health for elementary teachers.

A total of 52 academic courses will be available during the June 6-July 8 regular session ranging from courses in Art to special projects in Speech. Students may earn a total of six credits during the regular session.

A highlight of the Dana summer program is the annual educational tour with Miss Elja Mc Cullough. Miss Mac, as she is known on the campus, has conducted tours throughout various parts of the world for the past ten years. Her "college on wheels" will tour his year through Dixie Land, Old and New Mexico and Guatemala. The tour is being organized in three divisions and those interested may take any one or all three of the planned excursions. Regular college credit may be earned through travel and the completion of several written requirements. Inquiries should be directed personally to Miss McCullough.

During the post session at Dana, July 11-July 29, a special Health Workshop will be offered by the college in cooperation with the Nebraska Psychiatric Clinic and the State Department of Health. The workshop is designed to assist the elementary teacher in her program of health instruction and services. It will feature regular study, lectures by authorities in the field and several afternoon tours.

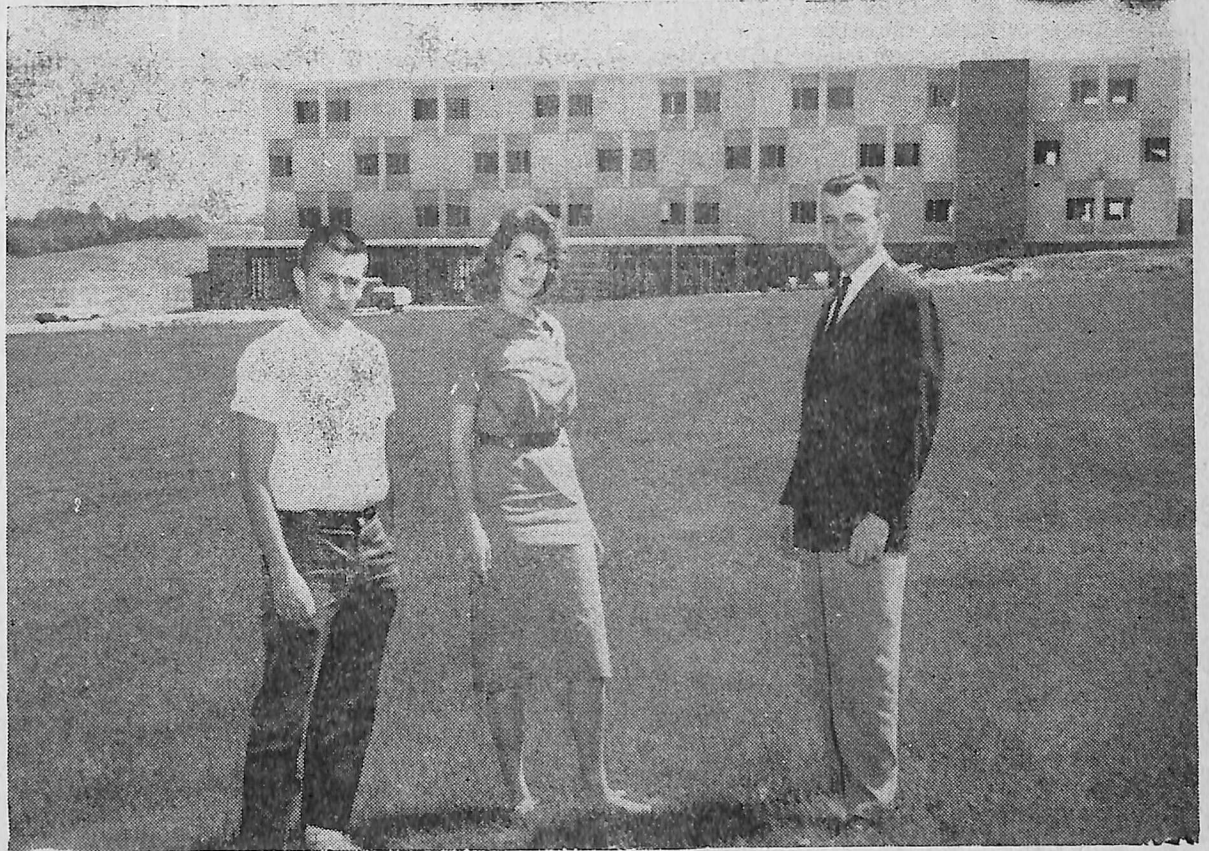
