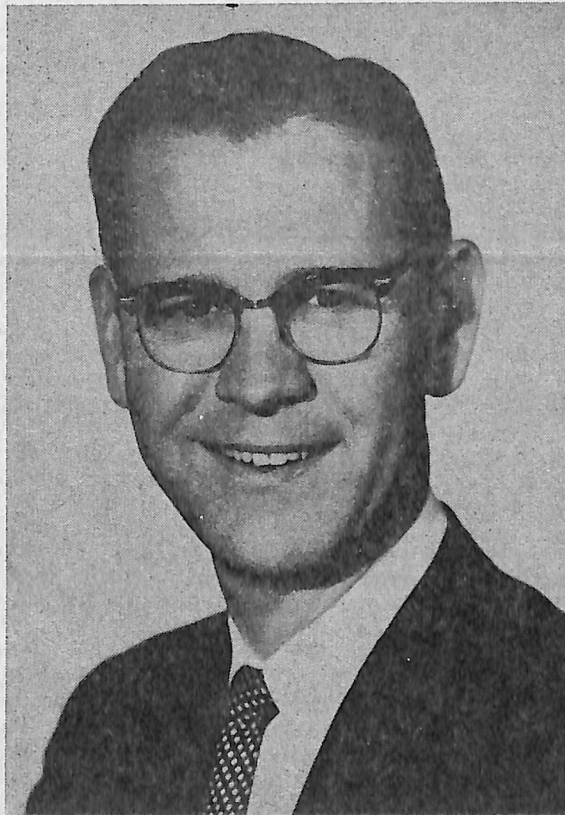

Spiritual Emphasis Days Built Around Theme of "Christian Paradoxes"

This fall's Spiritual Emphasis Days' speaker, Pastor William J. Hanson, comes to us from Christ The King Lutheran Church of Denver, Colorado. Pastor Hanson was born and raised in Chicago, Illinois. In 1941 he commenced his studies here at Dana and graduated with a BA degree in 1944. From 1944 to 1949, our speaker attended Trinity Seminary, graduating with a BD degree. The years 1945 and 1946 saw him serving twenty-one months in the USA in Germany. Since his ordination in 1949, Pastor Hanson has continued graduate study at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri, and Iliff School of Theology, Denver, Colorado.



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The speaker's calls include St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Graettinger, Iowa, 1949 to 1952, and Trinity Lutheran Church of Norwalk, California, of which he was organizing pastor 1952 to 1958. At present he is Director of Public Relations for the California Lutheran Educational Foundation, an agency of five Lutheran Synods through which California Lutheran College was established.

Pastor Hanson is a former Iowa District and Pacific District Luther League President as well as a former member of the Board of Governors of the California Lutheran Educational Foundation. He now serves as a member of the Higher Education Committee, Central District The ALC.

The wife of our honored speaker, the former Doris M. Petersen of Racine, Wisconsin, attended our college during the school years 1942 to 1943 and 1944 to 1945. They have four children.

The pastor has chosen "Christian Paradoxes" as this year's theme. This theme will be discussed at a series of meetings Monday through Wednesday, including regular morning chapel and special evening sessions commencing at 7:30 P.M. Pastor Hanson plans to be available in the canteen for a casual discussion and questioning. Let us prepare in prayer for a week of blessing.

Dana's Enrollment Reaches New High

Dana College enrollment figures rose to an all time high this fall with 444 students registering for fall classes. This number represents an approximate 18% increase in registration compared with the figures at the same time last fall.

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Fulbright Grantee Is Danish Instructor

"It is just a little Denmark here," mused Bodil Strøm, our Danish faculty member and fellow student.

In addition to teaching Danish and working in the Physical Education department, this sparkling blue-eyed blonde busies herself with psychology and education courses, besides speech, American literature, liberal arts, and choir.

Originally, Bodil was slated to teach P.E. classes, but, she explains, the type of activities taught in America differ too greatly from those in Denmark to make this possible. Contrary to our golf and bowling units, Danish students spend their time on gymnastics and Olympic-type games.

"I would like to stay another year, but I have only one year's leave of absence," says Bodil. Before coming to America late this summer, Miss Strøm taught German and English for two

years in high school and junior high school, respectively.

Although Bodil was a Fulbright grantee and also had her travel expenses to and from America paid, she had to take a total of 49 lessons a week in school and night school to earn money to make this trip a reality.

When the trip to America by boat finally came, Bodil discovered that among the 21 students aboard only two were girls. Asked whether she got seasick, she replied with a gleam in her eye, "Some of the boys got seasick but I didn't and neither did the other girl."

Oddly enough, when Bodil finally got to the States, she found that her Big Sister was going to be one of her pupils in her Danish class.

Whether or not Bodil is homesick or not, she did not reveal, but she did say, "I miss my bicycle, really I do."

Freshman Student from Far East Plans To Major in Business Administration

Seun Kyung Kim, freshman student from Seoul, Korea, will major in business administration so he can assist his oldest brother, who owns a large paint manufacturing concern. Kim, "the baby of the family" at 24, has three brothers and an equal number of sisters. His fourteen years of previous education include two years of kindergarten, six years of grade school, and three years each in junior and senior high schools. Kim had three years of German and attended a foreign language institute for three months to help him with English pronunciation.

All schools in Korea are privately owned by foundations or by churches. Only universities are government supported. Because of the war, Seoul was almost completely destroyed, but through American and United Nations aid much of the city has been restored to its former beauty. For this the Korean people are grateful.

After his schooling, Kim served with the Korean army for one and a half years, and then he worked to earn enough money to study in the U. S. His first airplane trip took him from Seoul to Rapid City, South Dakota, where he stayed with a Korean friend for three months before coming to school. He heard about Dana from a cousin who had studied in Nebraska.

A sport fan, Kim played baseball and volleyball in high school and will play intramural football with the third floor team of the Men's South Dorm. He likes it here at Dana because "The campus is very beautiful and the professors and students are helpful."

Kim has come a long way to get a good education, so let's make it worth his while by being helpful and friendly . . . a DANA tradition.

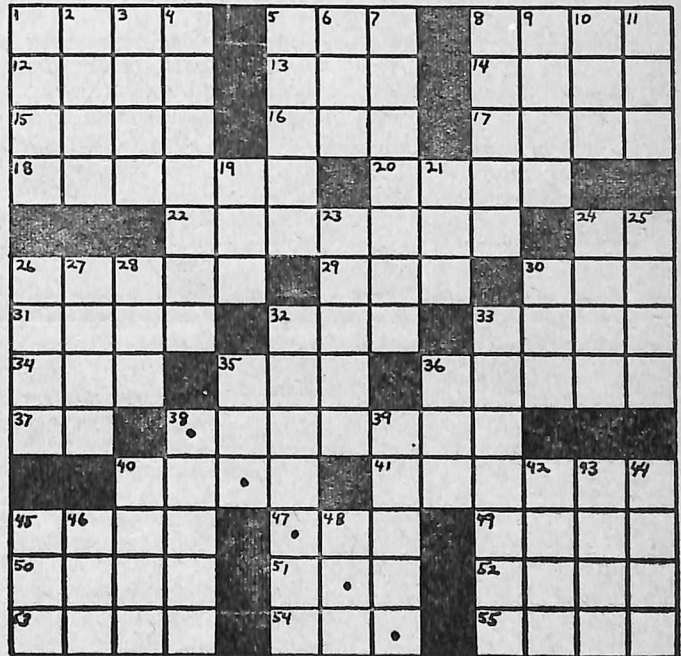
