

# Dr. Madsen To Meet Danish Royalty Oct. 15

Dr. C. C. Madsen will be among the select few who will be privately presented to their majesties, King Frederik IX and Queen Ingrid of Denmark on October 15 in New York City. King Frederik and Queen Ingrid are paying a 14 day State Visit to the United States as guests of President Eisenhower.

President Madsen left Omaha Sunday and went directly to New York where he represented the Nebraska Independent College Foundation at the "National College Corporation Day" on Monday. Representatives from College Foundations of America were on hand for the two-day meeting and did concentrated work in raising funds for education.

From these meetings Dr. Madsen will go to Washington, D. C.,

and attend the gala dedication of the new Royal Danish Embassy building. He will be a guest at a dinner for the Danish monarchs sponsored by Secretary of State Herter.

On October 15, the Danish American Society of New York will sponsor a spectacular dinner reception in the grand ballroom of the Waldorf-Astoria, where the King and Queen of Denmark will be the honored guests. Dr. Madsen has been informed that he is to be one of the few who will be presented privately to the royal couple.

The present King and Queen visited the Dana campus as Crown Prince and Princess of Denmark in 1939. Their hurried schedule prevented them from paying another visit here.

## Young Republicans Sponsor Congressman Cunningham

Congressman Glenn Cunningham has accepted an invitation by the Dana College Young Republicans to present an address on Monday, October 17, at 7:30 in Pioneer Memorial Chapel. Congressman Cunningham, former two term Mayor of Omaha, is running for re-election from the 2nd Congressional District of Nebraska.

President of the Young Republicans, Dave Ihrig, stated that as Congressman Cunningham is the first political figure to appear at Dana that he hoped all the students and members of the faculty who are interested in politics would attend the address and show Congressman Cunningham a warm welcome. It is hoped that there will be a question and answer session at the conclusion of the Congressman's speech.

## Applications Due On Fulbright Awards

Less than one month remains to apply for some 800 Fulbright scholarships for study or research in 30 countries. Requests for applications must be postmarked by October 15th with applications being accepted until November 1. Interested students should consult Dr. Rasmussen's office.

Recipients of Fulbright awards for study in Europe, Latin America, and the Asia-Pacific area will receive tuition, maintenance and round-trip travel. IACC scholarships cover transportation, tuition, and partial maintenance costs. IIE administers both of these student programs for the U. S. Department of State.

General eligibility requirements for both categories of awards are: 1) U. S. citizenship at time of application; 2) a bachelor's degree or its equivalent by 1961; 3) knowledge of the language of the host country; and 4) good health. A demonstrated capacity for independent study and a good academic record are also necessary. Preference is given to applicants under 35 years of age who have not previously lived or studied abroad.

Applicants will be required to submit a plan of proposed study that can be carried out profitably within the year abroad. Successful candidates are required to be affiliated with approved institutions of higher learning abroad.

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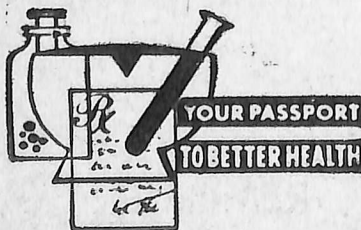

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## All Campus Letter Writing Campaign Expected To Raise \$80,000 For Pool

On Wednesday, October 5th the students of Dana College met at various places on the campus to write letters to their friends and relatives.

These letters concerned the swimming pool that is being planned for Dana in the very near future.

After talking to Merv Christopherson, I find that plans have been made for the construction of the swimming pool.

The idea was first thought of with a gift of \$172,000 made by the Borup family of Beresford, South Dakota to the UELC synod which was passed on to Dana College. This will be used for the new P.E. building.

David R. Larsen, President of the student body last year, with other students, went to Seward's Concordia College to see their pool. The students at Concordia raised \$108,000 during the 1959 two weeks Christmas vacation. Dana, too, accepted the challenge and a few weeks before school was out last spring voted to (1) go on with the project, and (2) to assess each student \$7.50 per semester to help pay off the loans.

To be able to make a deal like this, the Dana College Students, Inc. had to be formed. This non-profit corporation is separate from the college with a board of directors, consisting of the four student body officers, the president of the association of Women Students, the president of Dana, the athletic director, and a representative each of the Dana Faculty, Alumni Association, and trustees of Dana. Peter Mickelsen is an honorary member of the Board of Directors. Though the pool is the first project of this new organization, it will by no means be the last.

"It is my plea that as students, we do not give up, but it is rather my hope that we will ban together in a united effort to show outsiders that Dana Students have the potentiality to progress."

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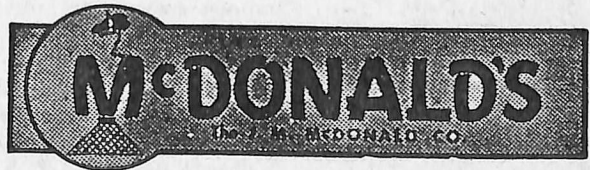
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# Northwestern Stunned 19-0 By Spirited Viking Defense

Last Saturday night at Orange City, Iowa, the Viking defense once again showed its great ability as it held the Red Raiders of Northwestern to a minus two yards total rushing as the Vikings evened up their season's record with a 19 to 0 victory.

From the starting gun to the end of the game it was all Dana. The Red Raiders never got any kind of an offense going during the game. The Raiders were completely outmanned by the superior depth of the Vikings. But credit should be given to the Northwestern team for holding the Viking offense to a total of nineteen points.

The leading offensive players in this game were three halfbacks. Two of them have been leading the Viking offense throughout the season and the other one has begun to live up to his potential as a power runner in the single wing formation in the last two games. The three are Stan Cupp, Bryce Olson, and Dave Sinclair. Cupp gained a total of 81 yards for a 4.7 average. Olson gained a total of 45 yards for a 3.7 average and Sinclair gained a total of 34 yards for a 3.4 average. Credit should also be given to Daloy Nielsen for his fine running from the fullback position. Our two quarterbacks, Beck and Morrow, should also be mentioned for their passing. Between the two of them they gained a total of 98 yards through the air. Beck had a total of eleven completed passes and Morrow five.
