## S.A.M. Places Well In National Awards Plan

S.A.M. has proven that Dana doesn't necessarily have to take a back seat to other schools merely because of size. The Dana Chapter of the Society for Advancement of Management has finished 78th out of 173 competing chapters located around the country in total points earned in the society's Performance Awards Plan. Points are received for various aspects of each chapter's programming for the year. This is the best means of which performance of each chapter can be measured.

Dana's standing is even better when the time which these points cover is considered. Our chapter was chartered second semester compared with a whole year's points earned by most of the other schools. But still Dana finished ahead of such institutions as the University of Alabama, the University of Pennsylvania, Syracuse University, and Cornell University, to name a few.

Bourne, professor of business organization and management at the University of Nebraska, will speak on specifics of employment procedures used by various companies. Next week LSA will continue with its study of the book of Jude. The Bible study session will again be led by Connie Sheldstad.

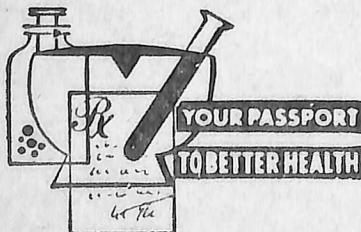
The meeting will be at the usual time, Tuesday from 7-8 p.m. in the canteen.

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## Hermes Began in 1918; First Newspaper at Dana

The spring of the year 1918 saw the beginning of a new student venture which has continued as a part of the college ever since—the student paper, the **Hermes**, edited and published by Chris B. Larsen and Anders Jorgansen. The first issue made it clear that this was an official publication, but a private undertaking which was nevertheless to be considered “A Messenger From Dana College,” since all the writers were connected with the institution. The opening statement continued:

In preparing this paper it has been our desire to avoid making it an organ for current tattle and the discussion of politics. It has been our aim to give vent to intellectual forces and assist in developing latent possibilities. In our efforts we have the interest of our school in view.

At first, the **Hermes** was essentially a literary magazine, appearing only a few times a year. Later it appeared on regular newspaper format and adopted a bi-weekly and then a weekly publishing schedule. It also became primarily a publication for campus news.

The forties saw the birth of a literary magazine, **Sower**, that has grown with the years and is today a leading campus publication. There had been earlier efforts at literary magazines—the **Hermes** was primarily such at its beginning.

Many interesting things have appeared in the **Hermes**, such as in the year 1928 when the **Hermes** reported that so few students were reading the Danish Column that it was being dropped; and in the spring of 1946 the **Hermes** took up the question of whether the college should be allowed to grow. Since then, the **Hermes** has become well-known and is read and liked by everyone here.

## “TAMING Of The Shrew” Cast Selected For Shakespearean Drama Production

**The Taming of the Shrew** was written around 1592 and was one of Shakespeare's earliest plays. **The Taming of the Shrew** is by no means Shakespeare's best written play, according to the literary critics. However, it has found outstanding success on the stage.

The play is clear, simple, and easily understood, containing no undertones such as in **Twelfth Night** and the **Tempest**. **The Taming of the Shrew** makes up for its lack of wit in action and fast pace.

This play combines two stories into one with the main emphasis on Petruchio's violent wooing of Kate. This is where the play receives its title.

Mr. Krueger, the director of the play, gives these reasons for performing a Shakespearean play and **The Taming of the Shrew** in particular. (1) A Shakespearean play has never been performed at Dana (2) **The Taming of the Shrew** is the best play for an introduction to Shakespeare (3) The play is light throughout and contains good humor. It is

Mr. Krueger's plan to work up the sub-plot and humor to what it should be without hurting the main theme. The play will be performed uncut and in order except for the induction scenes at the beginning of the play.

The lead characters will be played by Gary Danielson and Shirley Lincoln. The remaining of the cast is as follows.

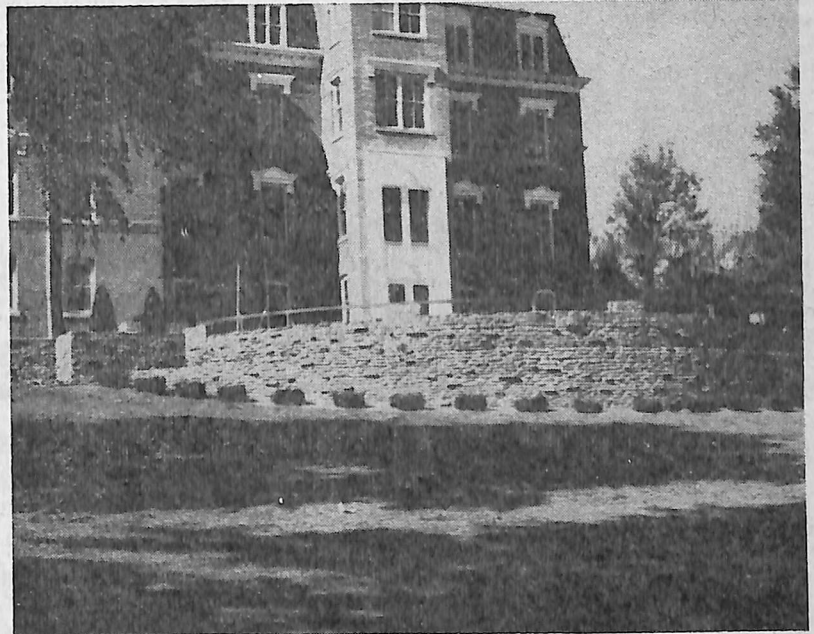

## Old Main Beautified By Terrace Of Flagstone

Driving up the hill in front of Dana this fall for the first time, I was stunned when I saw what had happened to the conspicuous hill and tall evergreen trees which once adorned the front of Old Main. All that was left of the hill was an ugly cliff a few yards in front of the front door of Old Main and a large expanse of barren land. The hill had been moved south to fill a low section just west of the gymnasium.

A few weeks ago, workmen began working on the cliff. They began by putting in cement footings at its base. Then flagstone was used to build up walls around the semi-circular cliff. It is divided into two levels: the first, which is about three feet wide, has been filled in with shrubbery; and the upper level has been made into a terrace leading up to the front entrance of Old Main.

Many people have spent much of their idle time just fascinated watching as the workmen slowly built up the flagstone wall which transformed the ugly cliff into what is now a beautiful terrace setting off the entrance to Old Main.

## Peterson

Paul Peterson, better known as "Coach Pete," graduated from Dana in 1941 when Dana's enrollment was pushing 200. He was active in only two sports while a student because only two sports were offered—football and basketball. Dana's over-all four-year record in football while he was here was 14-15. "Coach Pete" met his wife, Ruth, while attending Dana and they have one daughter Beth age 10 and two sons, Brian 16 and Brent 13.

Coach Peterson is amazed at the progress Dana College has made in the past twenty years and admits that he never thought he would see it progress this far! Of course, he agrees that the new gym will be a gigantic step for Dana after numerous smaller steps and all have been steps in the **right direction!**

His most exciting experience at Dana thus far was the winning of the conference championship in track last year. That was the second such championship in Dana's history. Mr. Zimmerman said it was rewarding to witness the quick development and improvement of that team.

As for our football team, Mr. Zimmerman stated "We have a young squad and a great turnover is a problem—We need to hold onto the Freshmen!" He says that Dana's weakness in the physical education area lies in the lack of facilities and equipment and this problem should soon be overcome.

Mr. Zimmerman met his wife while teaching in Ivanhoe and they have two daughters and a son. His hobbies are water-skiing, swimming, hunting and fishing.

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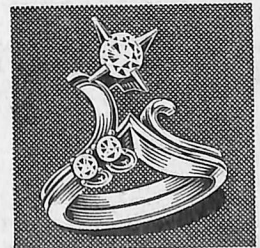
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## Dana's Neighbors Also Busy Building Ihrig Speaker For Reformation Day

Such things as the convention system of nomination, extension of suffrage to women and to Negroes, the direct election of senators, the prohibition of intoxicating beverages, the abolition of slavery, the income tax and postal savings banks were first advocated by third parties and eventually adopted by the major parties.

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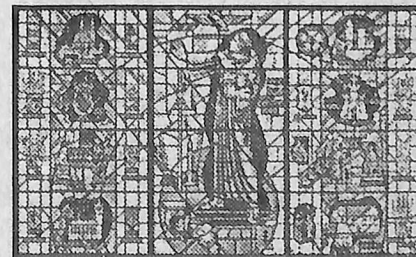
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
