Freshmen Talent Will Be Revealed Local Businessmen Present Pressbox

For over a month freshmen have been searching for talent and discovering it. The fabulous Dave Hooper will astound the audience with his wit and humor.

Myron Thorberg is the efficient stage manager while the co-producers are Mark Kloth and Dee Petersen.

The rest of the show is shrouded in deep mystery. The theme, acts, and details will be kept a dark secret until that long-awaited night. This much can be told: a variety of talent will be shown, and the theme will certainly be unusual! Remember to come.

The sum total of all the hurrying, scurrying, and tearing of hair by the Freshman class will be shown on Friday night, November 11. Admission will be 50 cents.

The Homecoming festivities were highlighted with the presentation of a \$900 pressbox located above the Viking track and field. This addition to our campus was supplied mainly through the efforts of the local Chamber of Commerce through a donation of \$200 and the Blair businessmen who contributed \$20 each instead of entering floats in the parade which was discontinued this year. Not only did the community pay the bulk of the finances, but went to work and constructed the pressbox. Dana paid the balance of the expense on this venture.

Construction May Start On Borup Memorial In January

The Dana College Board of Trustees has given final approval for construction of the Borup Student Activities-Physical Education Building. The building will bear the family name of Christen and Maren Borup of Beresford, South Dakota, whose bequest of \$172,000 made it possible to go ahead with building plans.

The Board instructed the firm of Helleberg and Helleberg of Kearney, Nebraska, architects for the building, to have all specifications completed by early December so that bids might be called for and contracts awarded by early January. Construction is expected to begin soon after the first of the year with completion date set for early fall of 1961.

New Borup Hall will contain a complete physical education plant plus necessary class rooms, offices and meeting rooms for the Student Council and other campus organizations. The basketball playing area will have provision for seating approximately 1400 persons. The building will be located on the north end of the recently completed Viking Field and Track.

Nixon Landslide

The results of the mock election yesterday showed that Dana faculty and students overwhelmingly favored the presidential team of Nixon and Lodge by a margin of 3 to 1. The actual percentages were 73% for the Republican candidates and 27% for the Democratic hopefuls.

Tonight's Lyceum Features Groman

Tonight at 7:30 the second lyceum program of the school year will be presented in the auditorium. The featured guest speaker, Mr. George Groman, dialect specialist, will speak on the topic, "How Other People Talk." Your time spent listening to Mr. Groman will be well worth your while.

Students Soon To Get Grade Cards

November 5 is the end of the first quarter of this school year. Mid-semester grade cards will be distributed soon afterwards. These grades are not recorded on the permanent records; they are only issued for the student's own use. However, a copy of these grades are sent to parents of freshmen except to those who are veterans or who are married.

Plans For Constructing Science Hall Underway

Dr. C. C. Madsen announced last week that the Board of Trustees has accepted the terms for a gift of \$200,000 from Mr. Charles Anderson Dana of New York City. Mr. Dana has offered to present the college with this gift to be used for the construction of a new science hall—the provision being that all plans and specifications be completed by October 1, 1961, and construction to begin immediately thereafter. The Dana Board of Trustees also committed themselves to the task of raising an additional \$100,000 for the building and the Dana College Development Program will provide the remaining \$300,000. The total cost of construction and furnishing the building is estimated at \$600,000. The firm of Helleberg and Helleberg of Kearney, Nebraska, will complete plans for the new structure.

SCHOOL GAME AT MIDLAND

On November 5, 1960, the Dana College football team along with the four cheerleaders and the students of Dana will be attending the "All School Football Game."

Around this time every year this type of football game is held. This year's game will be played at Fremont, Nebraska, when the Dana Vikings meet the Midland Warriors.

The game will be held in Memorial Park Stadium at 2 p.m. Everyone is urged to come to the game. This is our last game, so "come on, kids," let's see you all there rooting for your team!! It means a lot to the team to know that the student body is behind them all the way.

Folk Dancers To Greet Danish Group

The New Danish Quartet, presently completing their first North American Tour, will appear in concert at Joslyn Art Museum on Wednesday evening, November 9. Under the patronage of King Frederik IX of Denmark, the tour coincides with the visit of the Danish Monarch and Queen Ingrid to the United States.

For their current tour, the Quartet members, Svendsen, Heichelman, Frederiksen and Honenns, have found a congenial and festive atmosphere awaiting them in America, with the presence here of their King and Queen and also of the incomparable Royal Danish Ballet, which is presently completing its second tour of the United States.

Charles Anderson Dana is one of America's unique philanthropists. He believes in giving money to those who are resourceful and in his own words, "There is no money profit any more and it's human beings who make the world go round anyhow. This is the best long-range investment there is—better than paper securities. Why should I let Washington waste it?" Mr. Dana has proved his theory by giving aid to numerous colleges and universities through the nation.

Although the names of Dana College and Mr. Charles Dana are the same, this is the first direct contact that has been made between the two. By early fall of 1961, the names will be even more closely related as construction begins on the Charles A. Dana Hall of Science on the campus of Dana College.

The appearance in Omaha is being sponsored by the Joslyn Chamber Music Society in cooperation with the Elizabeth Sprague Coolidge Foundation in the Library of Congress. The group will present only one concert at Joslyn on November 9 beginning at 8:00 p.m. An informal coffee hour will follow the performance and all guests are invited to meet these personable young men. The Dana College Folk Dancers will be on hand to add a festive touch and to remind the artists that many traditions of their homeland are being perpetuated here.

Individual and season tickets will be available at the door on the evening of the concert.

WHO WINS PRESIDENTIAL MATCH IS DETERMINED BY YOU

By now almost everyone has taken sides in the coming presidential election, but does he know the facts? Well, if not, here is a brief story on the presidential candidates and their running mates.

In this corner, from Whittier, California, the present Vice-president of the United States, and Republican candidate for the Presidency, 47-year-old Richard Milhaus Nixon. Mr. Nixon seems to be in top shape for the match, with five years of experience as a lawyer, two terms in Congress, and eight years as the Vice-president of our country.

His able tag-team partner, former U. S. Ambassador to the United Nations, hailing from Nahant, Massachusetts, is the 58-year-old Henry Cabot Lodge. Previously a graduate of Harvard, a reporter for the **New York Herald Tribune**, senator for 13 years, war hero, and strong representative for the United States in the U. N., Mr. Lodge looks threatening.

And in the opposite corner, from Brookline, Massachusetts, World War II hero, Pulitzer Prize winner, and now an influential United States senator, is 43-year-old John Fitzgerald Kennedy. Kennedy is confident that his experience and youth give him the edge in this main event of the year, the presidency of the United States.

From Stonewall, Texas, a senator serving since 1937, is the southern gentleman, 52-year-old Lyndon B. Johnson, who has joined forces with Kennedy for one of the strongest Democratic teams in history. With the backing of his southern fans, Mr. Johnson looks like he will offer good competition to the opposition.

The match will be scored on a vote basis. The referee is . . . you.

Several years ago the **Hermes** staff was confronted with a very delicate problem. How were they to convey the news of the college-sponsored square dance without giving the impression that this upstanding Christian college was approving of dancing? Much deliberation resulted in printing the announcement that "square games" were to be held on such and such a date!

Dana now sponsors the Danish Folk Gamers more correctly called the Danish Folk Dancers. This light-footed group has become known not only through the **Hermes** but through its many appearances at outside civic functions as well.

The folk dancers have performed at a variety of occasions including at high school assemblies, the Joslyn Art Museum, and the Officer's Club at the SAC Headquarters, Offutt Air Base. In honor of Dana College's Diamond Jubilee, the folk dancers were asked to dance by the Omaha Symphony Orchestra, during the intermission at a concert in Peony Park.

This group which has gained so much prestige throughout the area was organized several years ago by Miss Sandra Thomsen, a former Dana student, and is sponsored by the Dana Chapter of the American-Scandinavian Foundation, a national cultural organization. Norman C. Bansen, an English professor who is on a Sabbatical leave this year, is adviser to the group.

Nearly all the Scandinavian dances are comparatively simple, involving basic walk, run, skip, and jump steps. One of the most popular folk dances of Denmark is "Little Man in a Fix." An uneven number of couples is required. The "odd" couple then tries to obtain admittance into a set after each waltz. If the young lad does not succeed his partner gives him a severe tongue-lashing.

Since Dana College is the only four-year college in the United States of Danish heritage, we as students may be proud that we have such a wonderful group as the Danish Folk Dancers to carry the light from Dana's Hill!

VIKINGS SET OUT TO STOP WARRIOR DRIVE

This Saturday afternoon the Vikings will travel to Fremont to take on the Warriors of Midland College. This is the BIG game of the season as far as the team and student body is concerned. Midland College has been the arch rival for the Vikings down through the years. The last contest between the two teams was during the 1957 season when the Warriors defeated the Vikings by a score of 6 to 0.

The Midland Club runs from a basic pro offense with a split end and flanked halfback. Going into Saturday's game the Warriors have lost only once while capturing six wins. If the Vikings are able to come up with a performance like they did against Doane, they might very well come off the field victors.

The main offensive threats of Midland are Keiser and Freize at halfbacks, and Flynn and Nielsen at quarterbacks. During the 1959 season, Nielsen was number two in the nation in passing but this year the Midland attack has been headed by Flynn for the most part.

The two best linemen of Midland are Wallace, a freshman end from Auburn, and Olson, a senior guard who is a transfer student from Hastings. While at Hastings last year he was a member of the ALL NCC team.
