Tri-State Leaders' Conference Being Organized Under Danian Initiative

Dana College has taken the initiative to organize a Tri-State Leaders' Conference for the purpose of familiarizing student leaders of the various schools within the Tri-State Athletic Conference with the various functions of the member schools.

Leaders in the areas of student government, journalism, and religious organizations will exchange information on the procedures of operation and organization.

Dana is organizing this conference because it felt the need for closer co-operation among these schools. It is our hope that such a conference will stimulate a congenial exchange of ideas and,

at the same time, help keep a friendly relationship between the student leaders of these schools.

The idea for this conference came from Myrv Christopherson's platform submitted during the 1959 election campaign.

Phil Larsen has been appointed chairman of the committee to organize the conference. Questionnaires have been sent to all member schools asking them to show their interest and preference for a possible date for the conference.

In the near future, the **Hermes** will publish more information about this conference, as it becomes available.

Cool, Blue Pool Dream To Become A Reality

The cool, blue pool which everyone has hoped would become a reality will be included in the new Student Activities - Physical Education Building. When the Board met, \$65,000.00 of the goal had been reached. Based on the students' participation and their willingness to continue with the project, the Board voted unanimously to include the pool in the revised building plans. This means that the students must continue their work in an effort to raise the remaining \$35,000.00.

It was further decided that all loans received by the Corporation should receive a rate of 5 per cent interest rather than the original 4%. The Board has put a great deal of faith in the students and feel that they will finish the job already nearly two-thirds completed.

Board Postpones Acceptance Of Bids For Borup Building

The Dana College Board of Regents found it was not possible to accept any of the bids for the new Borup Student Activities - Physical Education Building scheduled for construction this spring. Dr. C. C. Madsen stated that bids had been received from ten separate contractors, but each was considerably higher than the proposed construction figure.

The Board instructed the firm of Helleberg and Helleberg, architects for the building, from Kearney, Nebraska, to revise the present plans for the building in order to cut costs. The Board emphasized the fact that the usefulness of the building will not be affected by these revisions.

Upon completion of the revised sketches, the architect is directed to re-negotiate with all contractors in securing second bids. It is hoped that these changes can be made within the next few weeks in order that construction might begin by early spring.

S.A.M. Elects New Officers

Jerry Lincoln will preside over his last S.A.M. meeting as president **tonight** at 7:30 as the Society for Advancement of Management will hold its annual election of officers at this time. In addition to the three new officers, members and chairmen of the five permanent committees must be chosen. A report will also be made on the money raising drive to buy books in the business and economics fields for the library.

Following this business meeting, Mr. Simon Korshoj will speak on "Management versus Labor" in room 203 in Old Main. Guests and those interested in joining the Society will be welcome at this 8 o'clock session.

In other action the Board approved preliminary sketches for the Charles A. Dana Hall of Science to be started during the latter part of this year. They also approved an operating budget of \$742,645.00 for the 61-62 school year—an increase of well over \$100,000.00 from the present budget.

President Bids Us Farewell

Fellow Students:

Three and a half years ago, I registered as an incoming Freshman at Dana College. I was scared stiff! I came from a small community in northwestern Wisconsin called Milltown. My high school was small and so was Dana, but when I said the goodbyes to my parents, I knew I was out on my own. I'll never forget the words of advice my father gave me as we stood outside the north entrance to the north dormitory. He said, "I'll tell you the same thing my Dad told me when I went out on my own. If you can't stand it, you can always come home." Tears came to my eyes as my parents drove away. I thought about the words that my father had uttered. Many times I was ready to take his advice and pack up my bags and leave for home, but I stayed. I learned to love Dana College, the students, faculty, administration, and staff. I came to know what was meant by "the Dana Spirit," and chills of pride went chasing up and down my spine whenever "Hail Dana" was sung. Dana became "my home away from home," and my new home gave me opportunity to learn, to make hundreds of new friends, to follow and to lead, and I shall never cease to thank God for bringing me here.

Now three and a half years later, having fulfilled the requirements for my graduation, I find it necessary to leave Dana as a student. Since May 1, 1960, I have served as Student Body President, and I have enjoyed this opportunity immensely. Last spring when I ran for this office, I had no intention of leaving this semester, so please understand that I'm not trying to run out on you. We have worked hard this past semester. The formation of Dana College Students, Inc., last spring was a big step for us. Since that time we have raised over \$65,000.00 in loans and gifts toward our \$100,000.00 goal to be used to build a swimming pool in our new Physical Education - Student Activities Building. We still have a long way to go, but we're over the hump now, and I am confident that we can raise the additional amount if the time is granted us.

We have organized for a Tri-State Student Leaders Conference. February 16 will be "Gripe Night" where students are welcomed to come to the council and voice their complaints. These are just some of the projects your student council has been working on in addition to the regular business of the student body.

Because you elected a very capable body of members to the student council last year, no big change will take place next semester. In accord with the Constitution of the Student Council, the Vice-President, Peter Petersen, will take over the duties and office of President, and the council will appoint a new Vice-President. I am confident that Pete and the Student Council will carry out their duties with the utmost concern for the welfare of the Dana students.

With these words of explanation, I officially submit my resignation to you, the students of Dana College. Thank you for your fine co-operation and understanding, and I extend my best wishes to the Student Council, the students it serves, administration, faculty, and staff for a pleasant and rewarding second semester, and a bright and prosperous future.

Two or three years ago the American public was subjected to a barrage of statements telling them that our educational system was falling far short of the standards needed to keep America the Free World leader. Now we hear little, since Sputnik is a past memory, but what about our educational system?

Mr. Arthur H. Motley, publisher of **Parade** magazine, had this to say about educational advances over the past ten years, "... we have tripled our expenditures for education, built over half a million classrooms, eliminated thousands of inefficient school districts, raised both the numbers and salaries of our teachers, improved the quality of instruction, increased the holding power of our schools and colleges and generally accelerated the upgrading of American manpower." He credited these advances to better teaching methods and organization to some extent, but mainly to the greater depth of understanding on the part of Americans everywhere that there is an imperative partnership between business and education in building a better America.

Our educational system need take second to none. We leave the purpose of our system to the community and the people who constitute it. When such a system becomes an arm of the government, it becomes a device to exploit the people. Take a good look at past Nazi Germany and what happened to them. Can not our system, proven superior in the past, surpass the threat posed by the educational system in the Communist Bloc to make our education methods obsolete?

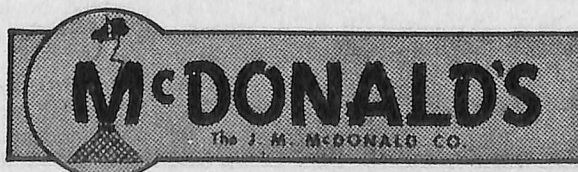

**Projects Make S.A.M.
An Active Organization**

"The most active organization on campus" enthusiastically agree the members and advisors alike of S. A. M., although in age it is undoubtedly the "baby" of Dana College.

The Society for the Advancement of Management is a national organization usually found in the much larger colleges and universities across the country. On February 1, 1960, under the guidance of Mr. Coon, the Dana chapter was approved by the national organization and the club was officially begun here with a charter membership of 29, which has increased to 38 this year.

"Learning by Doing" is the motto of these business and economics majors, and the Dana group is certainly no exception. Their regularly scheduled meetings are held at 8:00 on the third Thursday of each month. An outside speaker is usually the feature of the meeting, and the ever-growing guest list includes the General Manager of the Omaha Chamber of Commerce, the Industrial Relations Manager from Gate City Steel, Inc., of Omaha, the Vice-President of the Carpenter Paper Company, a professor from the University of Nebraska, and local businessmen from Blair. Two tours, of Carpenter Paper Company and Gate City Steel, have also highlighted their brief existence. Already planning for next year, S.A.M. hopes to have a representative from the **Wall Street Journal** as a featured speaker.

A special book project is also under way. By sending letters to alumni and friends they hope to receive gifts of either a book or its equivalent price which they in turn will present to the Dana library. Approximately \$240 has so far been brought in.

The officers who will be terminating their office tonight are Jerry Lincoln, president; Al Storzer, vice-president; and Nena Wegener, secretary-treasurer. S.A.M. is under the co-advisorship of Mr. Coon and Mr. Ragan.

Two New Scholarships To Become Available

The Board of Regents recently announced plans for two new scholarships. The Board of Regents Scholarship and the Dana College Merit Awards, as they will be known, will become available for the 1961-62 college year.

The Board of Regents Scholarship will automatically be granted to valedictorians and/or the individuals in the top 2% of the graduating class. The amount of each scholarship will be half of the tuition and may be renewed each year for four years if the student maintains an honor roll level of scholarship.

The Dana College Merit Awards will be awarded to qualifying students in the upper 25% of their graduating classes and will be in the amount of \$125 per year and will also be renewable depending on the maintenance of a designated level of scholarship. Factors other than grade averages will be taken into consideration for the granting of the Merit Awards.

In addition to the two new scholarships, the Board also approved the sum of \$10,000.00 to be used in the College Grant-in-Aid Program. Students who are outstanding in some particular field or who have a definite need for aid may direct application to the Student Aid Committee for consideration under this program. The College will also continue to participate in the Federal Aid to Education Loan Program by which students may receive educational loans at a minimum interest rate.

The college Board of Regents announced the following faculty promotions for the 1961-62 college year: Dr. Wayne Wise as Full Professor of Music; Pastor Lloyd Refsell as Associate Professor of Religion; Mr. Raymond Weckmuller as Associate Professor of Education; Mr. D. Jerome Tweton as Associate Professor of History; and Miss Luella Nielsen as Assistant Professor of English.

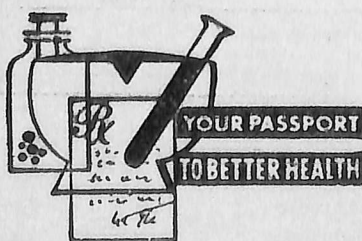
