## Rev. Neve Speaker For Spiritual Emphasis Days

Our speaker for the mid-winter Spiritual Emphasis Days is the Rev. Lloyd Neve, who is serving on the Japanese mission field of The American Lutheran Church. At present, Rev. Neve is home on furlough after having served two five-year terms as missionary on the south island of Kyushu.

Rev. Neve, brother of Professor Paul Neve, is a Dana graduate of 1945. While attending Dana, he was president of the L.S.A. and also president of the national L.S.A. organization. He attended Trinity Seminary his freshman year and transferred to Augustana Theological Seminary as a middler. For his senior year he returned to Trinity where he finished his seminary requirements. He received his Master's of Theology degree from Union Theological Seminary and is presently studying for his doctorate in New York City.

Rev. Neve met his wife in Japan and they and their six children make their home in Kurme, Japan.

The theme for these Spiritual Emphasis days is "Christ for you and for others." The first meeting will be Sunday, February 5th, at First Lutheran Church, where Rev. Neve will speak at both the 8:30 and 11:00 o'clock services. The other meetings are scheduled during the regular morning chapel period and at 7:00 p.m. in the Dana College Chapel.

Myrv Christopherson presided as president for the last time at the Student Council meeting which met in Mickelsen Hall on January 26. One of the most important items of business was the election of Jim Ihrig as the new vice-president to take the place of Pete Petersen who became the new president.

The budget for this current semester was presented to the council: Intramurals, \$175; Religious Activities, \$40; Social Events, \$200; and the General Budget, \$500. The total, \$915, was approved. This figure runs approximately \$200 over last semester's total budget.

After a great deal of discussion, the council voted not to have a project this year.

An exchange program with Nebraska Wesleyan University is being planned. The program will be similar to the one exchanged with Midland last year.

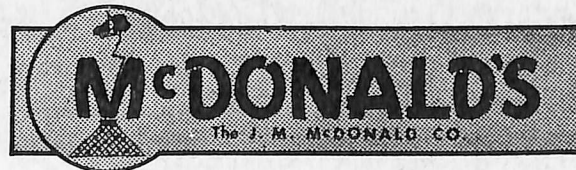

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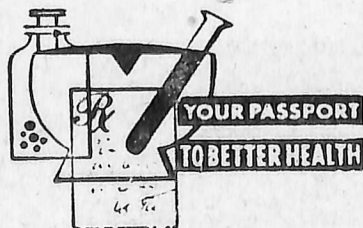
