North Central Reviews Operations Of College

Examiners from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools were on Dana's campus January 30 and 31. The membership of the examining committee was: Chairman, Dr. Daniel Feder, Dean of Students, Denver University; Dr. Peter Fraenkel, Assistant to the President, University of Indiana; Dr. Harry Bangsberg, Assistant to the Director of the Board of Regents, University of Wisconsin.

The purpose of the visit was to examine every area of the College's operations to determine progress or areas of weakness since Dana was admitted to the North Central Association in 1958. The examiners submit their report to the Committee of Colleges and Universities which meets when North Central holds its annual meeting in Chicago March 19-24.

During their visit to Dana's campus the examiners conferred with members of the Board of Regents, administration, faculty and students. On the basis of these visits and oral comments made by

Dean Christiansen and President Madsen will meet with the North Central Committee in Chicago on March 19, at which time the examiners' report will be discussed.

The year 1961 faces many problems similar to those that faced Abraham Lincoln during the first year of his administration in 1861. On February 12, the 152nd birthday of one of America's greatest leaders will be celebrated. In honor of this great man, who became the sixteenth President of the United States one hundred years ago, February has been designated as Lincoln month.

More has been written about Lincoln than about any other American who ever lived. More than 250 books and pamphlets dealing exclusively with Lincoln were published in 1959, and the files of The Lincoln National Life Foundation contain more than 9,000 volumes which deal exclusively with Lincoln from cover to cover!

An ever increasing mythology has sprung up around Lincoln's life. Because of this mythology, which is usually present with the title of "a great man," the true facts are often distorted or concealed; therefore, we should keep in mind that, although truly a great man, Lincoln was also human.

During Lincoln's administration many things were accomplished, some of them well-known and some not so well-known. For instance, did you know that the motto "In God we trust" was first authorized for inscription on a United States coin during Lincoln's presidency? Or that he signed the first annual national Thanksgiving Proclamation?

In his entire lifetime, the Constitution of the United States was never amended even once! And the Lincoln penny was the first coin authorized by the Treasury Department to use a portrait of a President.

And so, to honor this great man who served our country a century ago, remember—this is Lincoln Month!

Survival Of The Fittest Or Cleverest Proven By Weather

There is one rule of life that is commonly observed by all—and that is the time-proven theory of the survival of the fittest (or "cleverest" as the case may be). The following questions are primarily tests to determine exactly who those fittest ones are and whether or not they are considerate for others in their fitness or just plain fit.

Can you endure the long hike to the girls' dorm against a 75 mile an hour Nebraska wind without taking a short cut across the winter "grass," or do you walk to your car in the parking lot, drive around to the back entrance, honk your horn, and expect your date to come running?

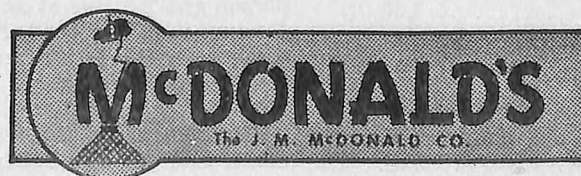
Communism poses a severe threat to the American way of life as we all know. Many of us contribute this fact to superior Russian rockets, atomic stockpiles, amazing economic growth, and more intensified education programs. The truth of the Soviet strength successfully lies in the fact that they are winning a war for the control of men's minds. Even a great multitude of Americans have surrendered weakly to the Soviet psychological offensive.

Jameson G. Campaigne in his book **The American Might and Soviet Myth** states that in a recent report to Congress on Soviet tactics it was revealed that the greatest asset the Communists have at the present time is not the hydrogen bomb, not Soviet satellites, but world ignorance of their tactics, strategy and objectives. The world is particularly ignorant of the true state of Soviet economic and military affairs, and it has been a vital part of Soviet strategy to keep the ignorance at as high a level as possible.

Professor G. Warren Nutter, University of Virginia, after traveling through Russia in 1956, said that Soviet industrial capacity is a half a century behind the West. Wing Commander Asher Lee, Royal Air Force, recently made the flat statement that the Soviet Union cannot hit the United States with any rocket it now has, or will have in the near future.

If these experts in their respective fields feel this way about Russian might, maybe we Americans don't have anything to panic about. When we have called Russian bluffs in Quemoy and Lebanon they have backed down. But we must not let down our defenses. Even in poker a bluff can be costly . . . for either side.

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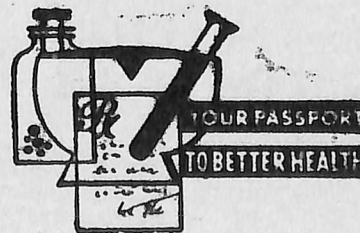
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Dialogue On Light

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TALC Student Mission Conference At St. Olaf

The guest speakers are Dr. Walter Judd, congressman and former missionary; Dr. George Hall, traveler and lecturer; and the Rev. Gordon Ruud, missionary to Madagascar. The program will be centered on the role of the college student in the program of Foreign Missions.

African Non-Fiction Added To Library

Three books pertaining to Africa have recently been added to our library's non-fiction shelves.

African Voices is an anthology of native African writings compiled and edited by Peggy Rutherford. This book is the first collection of native writings to be published in our country. It includes various forms of literature: creative writing, prose, and poetry from all parts of Africa. It is "worthy to stand with any natural culture in literary quality and scope."

Ray and Nellie Fay Hagberg, both former students of Dana, have sent two other books pertaining to Africa. The Hagbergs are now active workers on the mission field in Tanganyika, East Africa. One book is **The Tanganyika Guide**, a fine introduction to travel and social customs in Africa. The other, **African Nationalism** by Sithole Ndabangingi, deals with the rapid rise of nationalism and is "concerned to show that it is not anti-white but anti-dominative." Mr. Ndabangingi believes that "nationalism will not want to exchange the domination of the West for the domination of Russia; however, if African advice is opposed by the West, Africans may turn to Russia." Mr. Hagberg hopes that this book will help those students interested in African affairs to develop a better understanding of some of the difficult problems that have to be met and overcome by these merging nations.

Debate Squad Is Successful

Two weeks ago on the 20th and 21st of January, the Dana Debate Squad traveled to the Pittsburgh State Invitational Debate Tournament. Competition was keen as evidenced by the many schools represented including Northwestern University, Brigham Young University, Mississippi Southern University, North Dakota University, and many other fine institutions.

The weather in southeastern Kansas was cloudy and cold, but the argumentation could very easily be described as being clear and concise as well as hot and heavy. When the final results were posted, Dana, probably the smallest school in attendance, posted three out of six victories behind the Pete Swan - Bob Hansen duo. The defeated schools included Mississippi Southern University, Kansas State Central, and the College of Emporia. Others participating in the tourney were Donna Layton and Pat Peters, newcomers to debate who did not post any wins, but who picked up some valuable experience, and Kay McGill, who entered individual oratory.

This weekend our debaters travel to Nebraska Wesleyan.

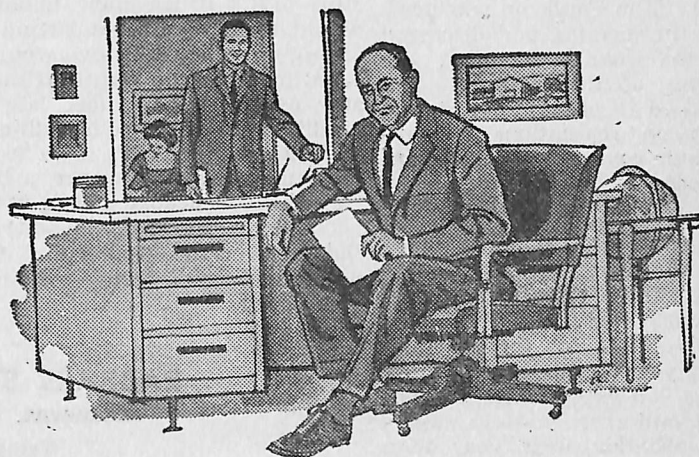
Boys Need Help! Girls Dig In Now!

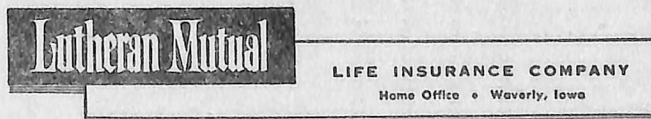

The victory snapped a ten game losing streak for the Vikings. The red-hot Viking quintet was never behind in the game as Frank Grasso opened the scoring with a driving layup in the early seconds of the game.
