

## Proposed Budget Adopted At Feb. 10 Student Body Meeting

The semi-annual meeting of the Dana College Student Body, which met Friday, February 10, during the regular chapel period, was called to order by President Pete Petersen. Following an invocation by the religious director, Paul Petersen, the secretary's and treasurer's reports were read and approved.

The approving of the budget for the current semester was the principal item of business. Each of the directors for the various activities presented his budget: Intramurals, \$175; Religious Activities, \$40; Social Events, \$200; and General Expenditures, \$500. The total, \$915, is approximately \$200 more than last semester's total figure.

Norma Parde read a letter from Myrv Christopherson, past president of the student body, concerning the task of raising the remaining \$35,000 for the swimming pool. A committee to head the completion of the project has been organized with Nena Wegener and Richard Jorgensen serving as co-chairmen. Other members include Paul Petersen, Bud West, Tom Lange, Thern Kaldahl, and Herb Knudsen. One other member will be appointed in the near future.

Richard Jorgensen reported on actions presently being taken by this committee. He assured the student body that the project was by no means dead and that a concentrated effort will be made to raise the needed \$35,000 by May 1st.

President Petersen extended an invitation to anyone who would like to attend the student council meetings on the first and third Thursdays of each month. The meeting was then adjourned.

## Lenten Banks Will Be Distributed

Lenten banks will be distributed through the campus mail this weekend to all students and faculty members.

"For God so loved the world that he gave..." Let us also give—to help other people less fortunate than we are.

The money collected in these banks will be sent in to the National L.S.A. Council where, together with funds received from other schools throughout the country, it will be used for scholarships for Christian students around the world.

The banks will be collected during Holy Week.

## Changes Made In Academic Program

Members of the student body in attendance at Tuesday's convocation were informed as to the changes which have been made in Dana's academic program by Dr. Christiansen.

Instead of offering five different degrees as has been Dana's policy, there will be only three offered. They are Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Science in Nursing. Those dropped are the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration and Bachelor of Science in Education because of their duplicate requirements.

The majors of Business Education, Humanities, Language, Physics, Social Service, and Speech have been dropped because of the minimum demand for them. Another reason for this action is to more highly concentrate the teaching efforts in the remaining areas.

## Day Of Prayer To Be Observed Here Monday

A special service at evening chapel on Monday, February 20, will be dedicated to the Universal Day of Prayer for Students.

When you come to this service, you will be joining students from all over the world in saying Our Father "in many languages, but in one voice."

This day binds students from all over the world in a fellowship of concern in their witness to the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Through a common experience of prayer and worship, students may transcend the barriers which divide them—lack of a common language in which to speak to one another, racial prejudice, opposing political convictions, quite different church traditions—and come to recognize that oneness which has been given to them, in Christ.

## Lutheran Insurance Holds Art Contest

The Lutheran Brotherhood Life Insurance Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota, is again sponsoring its annual Lutheran student art exhibition during May under the direction of William G. Fisher.

Competition is open to Lutheran students attending Lutheran colleges and seminaries or other state, private or secular colleges, universities and schools of art in the United States and Canada. Entries may be in any media.

# Washington Born Eleven Days Ahead Of Birthday

Did Saturday, February 11, go by without your noticing that it was the birthday of one of this country's great men? That man's name was George Washington, and his real birthday was on February 11, 1732. However, twenty years later the British government ordered the Georgian calendar, or "new style" as it was called, to be adopted. The deficiency was then eleven days; these were added, and today February 22 is celebrated as Washington's birthday.

This great statesman's birthday was first celebrated in 1781, when Count de Rochambeau acknowledged the friendship of France and the United States by ordering special observance of Washington's birthday. Another interesting fact in regard to this celebration is that Brotherhood Week is always set for the week in which Washington's birthday occurs.

As with Lincoln, many myths and stories have grown pertaining to Washington. Probably the most popular and well-known one is the hatchet and cherry tree myth. Although Washington is pictured by many writers as being perfect in everything and having no human sympathies, we should keep in mind the fact that he, as other great men, had faults like any other person and was not cold nor unfeeling.

From our history lessons we can all recall the steps in Washington's road to greatness and how he served our country in many capacities. But he is best remembered as the first President of the United States, and the one who led our country in the first stages of its freedom. Washington's influence is still to be found in the traditions that belong to the Presidential office.

The founding of the New York Stock Exchange, the first successful balloon flight, and the invention of the cotton gin are among the accomplishments of Washington's administration.

And so the month of February honors another great man—George Washington, the father of his country!

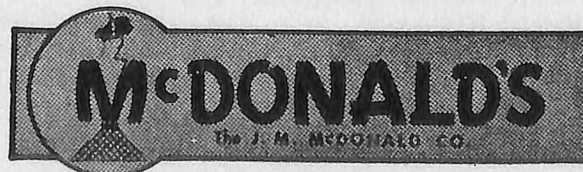
# How Much Honor Is Involved In Being On The Honor Roll?

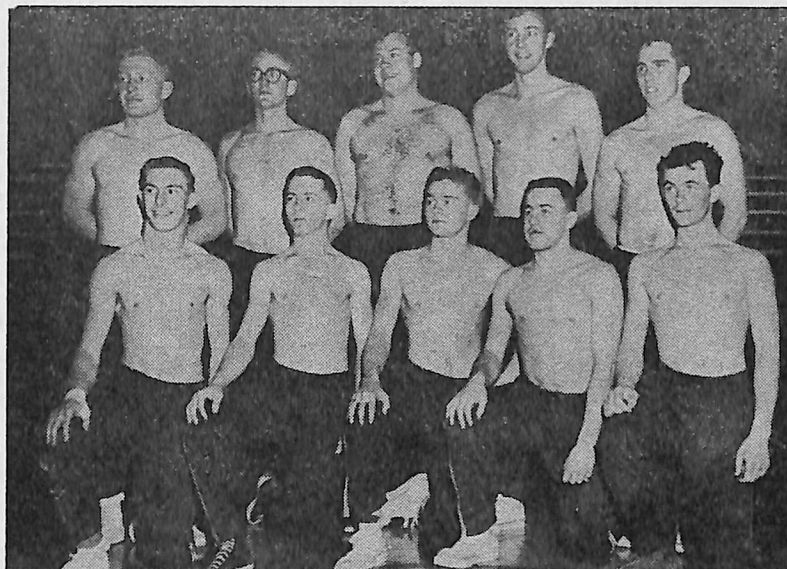
## Meet The Team
