Pastor C. M. Videbeck Slated To Address Final Convocation

Rev. C. M. Videbeck of Atlantic, Iowa, will be the featured speaker at this year's Senior Convocation. Academic honors and special awards will be given out at this final convocation which will be held Monday morning at 10:00 in the auditorium.

Rev. Videbeck is no stranger to Dana. He is an alumnus and has been a member of the Board of Trustees. The portraits of the school fathers which hang in Pioneer Memorial Chapel were painted by him. His son Richard taught here from 1950-53. He also served as president of the Iowa District of the former U.E.L.C.

Following Rev. Videbeck's speech the various awards and honors will be given out.

Ten students will be recognized with national awards. Nine will receive Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities certificates and one will receive the **Wall Street Journal** Student Achievement Award.

The **Sower** awards will be given out. These are the Langland Awards for the fields of poetry and prose, and the Hal Evans Cole Awards for the fields of art and music. The editors of the student publications will receive gifts from the Student Council.

The Science Department will bestow honors on three outstanding students, one each from the fields of chemistry, physics, and mathematics.

The following scholarships will also be given out at the convocation: the Lutheran Brotherhood Scholarship, the Soldiers and Sailors Memorial Award, and the Ak-Sar-Ben Scholarship.

Dr. E. A. Sagabiel Is Commencement Speaker

Commencement exercises for the class of 1961 will be held in Alumni Memorial Auditorium, Sunday, May 28, at 3 p.m. Dr. Edward A. Sagebiel will be the guest speaker. Dr. Sagebiel is a former president of Texas Lutheran College, Seguin, Texas, and currently is a member of the Board of Higher Education of The American Lutheran Church.

Elgar's "Pomp and Circumstance," traditional processional and recessional march, will be played by Joanne Hess. Dr. J. M. Girtz will give the invocation. The salutatory and valedictory addresses will be given by Miss Phyllis Bondo and Miss Arlyce Fuchs, respectively.

Dr. C. A. Christiansen, Dean of the College, will present the class to President C. C. Madsen, who will confer the degrees and present the certificates to the graduating seniors.

The Dana A Capella Choir under the direction of Professor Paul Neve will sing "Send Forth Thy Spirit" and "I Will Be As The Dew."

The following people will be honored with the Dana Distinguished Service Award at the Commencement exercises: Dr. Robert B. Nemescky, Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Levine, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Slocum, Mr. and Mrs. Kendrick Wilson, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Kingman, and Dr. Edward Sagebiel.

Following the graduation exercises there will be a "Kaffebord" on the Mickelsen Hall terrace.

Anxious Travellers Are Part Of Choir History

Although seniors are usually quite anxious for that long-awaited Graduation Day, this year some freshmen, sophomores and juniors are also anxiously awaiting Commencement on May 28. The reason? On the next day, May 29, the Dana College A Cappella Choir will start on its tour to Denmark.

The Dana Choir was first organized in 1914 by Miss Agnes Nielsen. It was then called the Dana College Choral Union. Under succeeding instructors, Miss Carrie Sinamark and Miss Helen Andersen, the choral work was continued. Under the leadership of Professor Waldo B. Nielsen, the choir made its first tour in the spring of 1925, traveling through Iowa, southern Minnesota and southeastern South Dakota.

The choir's tour to Denmark this summer is not a new idea, for the first Denmark tour was made by the Dana Choir in 1929. On this first tour, the choir left Blair on May 25, and on the 4th of July it sang at the great Danish-American celebration in Rebild Park.

In 1935, under Professor Gunnar J. Malmin, the choir made its second trip to Denmark, again participating in the Rebild celebration of the 4th of July. And in this year of 1961 the A Cappella Choir is making its third tour, again singing at the Rebild festival.

Professor Elwood Kraft became the choir's director in 1938, and in that year it made a thirteen-day tour into Wisconsin, covering over 1500 miles and including 17 appearances.

1941 marked another "first" for the choir. In that year, it presented Handel's well-known oratorio, "The Messiah" together with other choirs from the churches of Blair. Professor John Link was director at this time.

In 1944 Professor Paul Neve became choir director, and the choir presented a varied program of 18 Danish, German, Latin, English and Russian compositions during that season. Professor Neve has served as director for 16 years; in 1954 he took a leave of absence for graduate work in New York.

And so, once again, the Dana College A Cappella Choir is traveling to Denmark, upholding its traditions and those of Dana College. **Au revoir**, choir members!!

Recently I received in the mails an interesting court case dealing with film censorship. The case history is based on a Chicago ordinance that requires that before any movie can be exhibited to the public, a permit must be obtained from the city. In order to obtain the permit, it is necessary that the police commissioner view the movie; and by denial of a permit, can rule a movie obscene. Things were going rosey until the Times Film Corp. applied for a permit to show a film "Don Juan." The company got turned down on their request because of refusal to submit the film for examination. Immediately a heated situation developed and the hot potato was turned over to the courts.

The U. S. Supreme Court held, by a 5-4 vote, that it was constitutional to require all film exhibitors to submit all films to the city for censorship. However, the court did not determine whether "Don Juan" could be denied a permit after it had been examined by the city. The commissioner, after viewing the movie, can not rule it obscene on the basis that he doesn't like it. Other court cases state that if such a decision is made con to the wishes of the film producer, the producer can submit his film to the courts to be reviewed by judges which in turn rule upon its obscenity.

Now, of course, one must come to the argument of freedom of speech and press or not? The other four judges felt such censorship as a violation of the constitution. One comes aware of a sharp division in the definition of obscene also. It isn't too easy to forget the fire and fury that flew around Chicago a few years back when WGN-TV was going to show "Martin Luther." It's not an easy question to answer, but neither is the question of how obscene communication methods influence our growing crime rate?

Chief Knudsen hurriedly gathered up his equipment and ordered his stout lads—Dave Hanson, Ken Jensen, Andy Rathman, Wayne Josephson, and Bill Rodenburg—into his beat, but still running fire truck. In a whirl of dust and squeal of tires the Volunteers raced for the Blair Bridge. Upon arrival at the bridge, the group checked the origin of the holocaust with the tollmaster, only to find that it was not in Iowa as they had thought, but rather in Nebraska.

Chief Knudsen hit reverse and raced backward off the bridge until he found a few inches to turn around on.

Tearing over country roads and missing rabbits and fences by mere centimeters, the Volunteers finally reached their destination. However, their way was blocked to the fire by a corn field, but did that stop those brave lads? No sir! They plowed through the corn field to the very edge of the raging inferno. Within minutes after their arrival, nature and the firemen had combined forces and had reduced the sheet of flame to a smoldering heap of ashes.

As they were returning to their work in chem lab the weary Volunteers met Phil Larsen, Al Girtz, Solomon Gipson, Bill Johnson, and Myrv Christopherson. However, the latecomers could do nothing but watch the smoke drift away toward the north. The credit for saving the country from death by fire belongs to Chief Knudsen and his brave firemen. REMINISCING SENIORS RECALL EVENTS OF PAST QUADRENNIAL

It was the Fall of 1957 . . . we were freshmen and just as green as any other class! We were impressed by the College Rush Week as we stood in one line after another and noticed that no one seemed to be in a rush at Dana!

Our favorite spot for private devotion to God and for our own needs, the rugged Cross, was placed on the highest point on Dana's Campus . . . behind the North Mens' Dorm.

Bulldozers came to change the shape of Dana . . . took away the road between the Dorms and Old Main . . . buried the road that passed from the south end of the South Men's Dorm (where girls were living then) to the Gym . . . moved the two farms from where the new Mickelsen Hall would be someday . . . chopped down the hill that blocked the view from the campus . . . changed the campus from being known just for its location on the hill to the "windy city."

There were other things of interest, too! Dana won the C. C. C. Conference football championship the last year the organization existed. Asiatic flu struck the campus and many of our classmates—upperclassmen, too—spent the Homecoming weekend in the infirmary.

Dr. C. C. Madsen called one Friday morning from Chicago to notify Dana that they were accepted by the N. C. A. Our college officials had been seeking accreditation for many years and it was finally here. How did that affect Dana students? Immediately, it meant no classes that Friday afternoon and it also meant an evening trip en masse to Union Station in Omaha to greet Dr. Madsen. The band played . . . students victoriously sang "Hail, Dana!"

We soon knew the true meaning of N. C. A. acceptance. Our degrees would be valued by every state . . . our instructors could teach everywhere . . . our Dana was now on a par with every other college. We were ready to grow!

And we did grow! The student body increased, the faculty increased, but most of all the size of Dana grew as many more acres of the hill now belonged to Dana. We had the largest campus in Nebraska . . . in acres!

In 1958 we lost Odin II, our second Great Dane mascot . . . we awoke one morning at 2 a.m. to hear "Long, Tall Sally" blast from the loudspeaker system in Old Main. We read **Walden Pond** by Thoreau as a Liberal Arts choice . . . Some student groups labored deep into the night to produce Dana's own Walden. A well-placed "borrowed" chicken house marked "Walden" sat beside the pond on center campus.

Dick Carr received the most fame as a member of the sophomore class. A track team member, Dick was entered in the Midland Relays. Before 1500 fans at the evening finals, Dick pole vaulted to fame when he prepared to jump only to discover he had forgotten to wear anything under his sweat suit . . . and to think he became Senior Class President!

Our float won first prize in 1959's Homecoming parade, celebrating Dana's Diamond Jubilee . . . dignitaries came from many places . . . **The Saga of the Tower** by William Christensen put Dana's history into readable, enjoyable form. Amazingly, the Campus was not struck by the phone-booth craze that stampeded the nation, but they did adopt another pastime . . . hunkering. Hunkers sat five high in a corner, four on a chair and twelve on a bed.

1960 brought the real highlights to our college career. Perhaps the highest light was that of our Homecoming site, a realistic torch which, under the able guidance of two senior men, glowingly disappeared.

The swimming pool was to become a reality . . . Dr. Dana was going to see to it we built a science hall . . . Borup Memorial was begun . . . and now it was our turn to leave. It seems cruel to let our class go now, when Dana is just beginning a new era of development. We leave just as all the dreams we have seen begun are coming into permanent view.

Rather than leave without a sense of belonging, we will remember that the Cross is now even higher on Dana's campus and that is significant. We have seen development, and we have had a part in assuring that more developments will come. We are leaving Dana that more may come and share what we have shared. It is only proper that this be so . . . and so, it will be . . . a gift of ourselves to the further prosperity of our Alma Mater . . . the small school that took the big place in our lives.

Zimmerman Resigns To Accept Valparaiso Post

Mr. Darrell Zimmerman, Dana's Head Track and Football Coach, has resigned, according to President C. C. Madsen, to become effective at the close of the 1961 college year.

Zimmerman has accepted a position as head track coach and assistant varsity basketball and football coach at Valparaiso University in Indiana. He will assume his new position on September 1, 1961. In addition to his coaching duties, Zimmerman will teach several classes in the Physical Education Department with the rank of Assistant Professor.

Zimmerman, who came to Dana in 1958 from Farmington, Minnesota, has produced two championship track teams for the Vikings. The most recent win being the Tri-State Conference Championship for the second year in succession.

In commenting about the change in positions, Zimmerman made it clear there were no underlying factors in his resigning—he simply could not refuse the chance for advancement.

Dr. Madsen has made no statement as to a replacement.

Young Democrats Vote On Officers

Dana's Young Democrats, in a recent election, chose their officers for the 1961-1962 school year. Those elected are Roger Jacob, president; Ken Jensen, vice-president; Sidney Larson, secretary-treasurer; and Donna Layton, corresponding secretary.

Selections Made For Liberal Arts

The final decision as to the books which will be read next year for the Liberal Arts Reading Program has been made. They are as follows: **Crime and Punishment** by Dostoevsky, **The Ugly American** by Lederer and Burdick, **The Big Change** by Fredrick Allen, **The Hidden Persuaders** by Vance Packard, **The Lonely Crowd** by David Riesman, **She Stoops to Conquer** by Oliver Goldsmith, **The Crucible** by Arthur Miller, and **The Book of Job**.

The books are selected by a committee composed of three students and three faculty members on the basis of a ballot made by the students and faculty. The books which receive the most votes are selected except for the few which are too expensive or do not fit into the aims of the reading program. The book receiving the most votes this year was **The Ugly American** followed by **She Stoops to Conquer**.

Viking Cindermen Slaughter Bulldogs

On May 9, the Dana Cindermen were hosts to the Concordia College Track team in a dual meet. This was the last meet of the year before the Tri-State Conference Meet and as the score indicated it was a warm-up for the Vikings.

The Vikings took first place in all events except the 220-yard low hurdles which was won by Melber of Concordia. In doing so the Vikings ran up an overwhelming score of 108 points to 24 for the Bulldogs.

Extensive Summer School Program To Be Offered

An extensive summer school program has been planned for 1961. Courses in art, typing, education, English, mathematics, music, psychology, physical education, religion, biology, history, government, sociology, and speech will be offered.

The summer school is divided into two separate sessions. The first will commence on June 5th and end on the 7th of July. The second is scheduled to begin the 10th of July and to end the 28th of July. A student may sign up for a maximum of six hours for the first session and three hours for the second session. This permits one to earn a maximum of nine hours credit for the entire summer.

Registration is scheduled for the first day of each session. All classes will be in the morning. Further information can be secured from the business office or Dr. Elmer Rasmussen, Registrar.

This year's season record for the team was three wins and three losses.

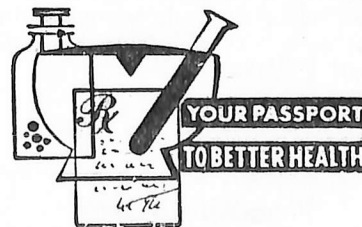
'Campus Illustrated' Begins Publication

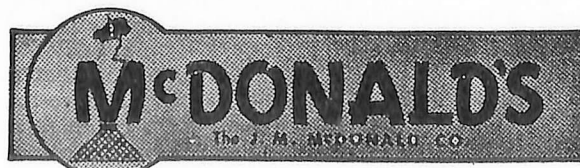

This year the Dana track team broke twelve school records during the course of the season.

Bryce Olson and Wayne Peterson tied the school record of 9.9 seconds in the 100-yard dash. Wayne Peterson set a school record of 22.5 in the 220-yard dash. Hans Willadsen lowered the 440-yard run to 51.4 seconds. In the 880 John Laughhunn brought the mark down to 2:03.

In the mile relay the record was lowered to 3:33.2 by Willadsen, Beck, Sutton and Laughhunn. The two-mile relay was also established by Willadsen, Dynneson, Barnes and Laughhunn in a time of 8:28. The shuttle relay of Frank, Leehy, Jensen and Rholl lowered the mark to 1:04.8.

In the high jump, Junior Bill Bracker had a leap of 6-5½ while Emory Anderson put the shot a distance of 47-2½ to break the old record by one foot.

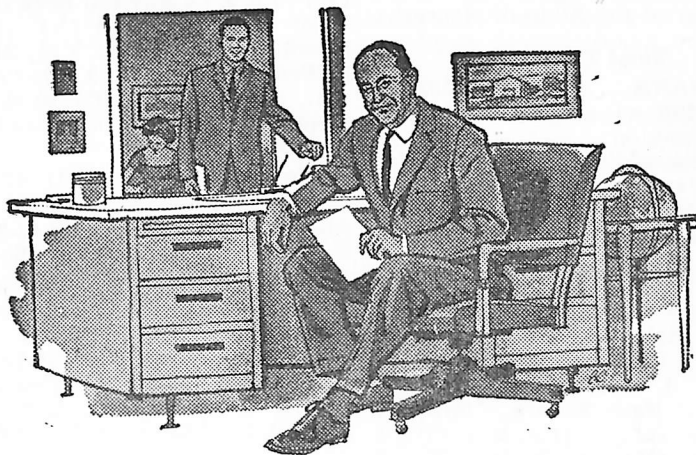
