Minimums have been set on many of the books, and a large number of the paperbacks will be sold at an auction commencing at 10:30.

All books not sold become the property of the Political Science Club a portion of the proceeds will be spent to acquire additional literature for the library in the area of political science.

Many members, both of the student body and the faculty, have given several of the one hundred or more books which are being offered.

From the ALC- Church-College Tie Declines Financially

While approving the total budget for its world-wide program in 1962, the Joint Council of the American Lutheran Church noted the serious problem of a relative decline in the appropriations allocated for support of its colleges. Dr. Schultz, Executive Secretary of the ALC Board of Trustees, indicated that since World War II the ratio of church subsidies to operating expenses of the colleges has declined by about 50 per cent.

Therefore, in recent years the colleges have turned to foundations and industry for the needed funds, instead of obtaining the help from the church. Dr. Schultz warns that while currently a close mutual relationship is prized by both church and colleges, "there are evidences a-plenty that secularization of purpose often follows secularization of financial support."

Of the total of \$11,110,000 allowed to five church divisions, the Board of College Education receives \$1,868,000, mostly for subsidies to church colleges.

'Golden Age of Comedy' Promises Eve of Fun Two Showings Monday Night

"Audiences react with continued and hearty belly laughs." This is a comment made by the National Board of Review after reviewing the film, "The Golden Age of Comedy." Dana students will have an opportunity to see this movie on Monday night, December 11, in Memorial Chapel. There will be two showings, at 7 p.m. and at 8:30 p.m.

"The Golden Age of Comedy" is classic proof that the camera as a vehicle for humor reached its peak about 30 years ago in the days of the silent movies. Producer Robert Livingston has collected this "rib-tickling" cavalcade of sight gags after viewing about 2,000 comedies made by the experts.

Included in this reel are slapstick scenes with the Keystone Cops and Billy Bevan (Creating the "Battle With the Oyster" Gag), sequences from "We Slip Up" with Laurel and Hardy, "The Second Hundred Years" and many more madcap masterpieces, memorable miming by baby-faced Harry Langdon, Ben Turpin's take-off of Erich Von Stroheim and "The Merry Widow," astounding moments with Carole Lombard in a collegiate drag, Jean Harlow losing her dress in a taxi door and many other zany items.

Professor Welsch, who has seen the movie, recommends it to all. "It is funny," he replied, "a good relaxing evening of fun."

The choir under the direction of Professor Neve opened "An Evening of Christmas Melodies" with "A Ceremony of Carols" composed by Benjamin Britten. This modern work was followed by more traditional carols and was concluded by two written by John Vincent.

Soloists for the evening were Janet Hansen, Marilyn Michel, Arden Dorn, Marlene Toft, Mary Jane Clausen, Mary Petersen and Jack Hill. Mike Stafford accompanied the choir on "A Ceremony of Carols," and the Campus Quartet appeared during intermission.

Although there was no admission charge, a free will offering was taken which will be given to the 1962 Rebuild Festival Committee in Denmark to help defray expenses of the upcoming July 4 celebration which is the largest of its kind outside the United States.

President C. C. Madsen has said that this is a way of saying "thank you" for the hospitality given the A Capella Choir which appeared on last year's program when they were in Denmark.

Words Cower Before Deeds!

How many people have you known who fit into that category? They say that they are going to do one thing and consistently do the other. Now this "other" need not be a direct reversal, but yet it shows a lack of foresight on the part of the bold speaker.

If a person is not convinced that his decision is the best possible, he should not expound his views. And then, certainly, once he has declared his principles for all to hear, he is treading the dangerously narrow line of ridicule if he does an about-face.

This reversal of decision occurs daily, even here on the campus among our fellow-students, but it is not nearly so serious for individuals to change their minds as it is for educational institutions, for example, whose reversal may have considerably more far-reaching effects.

Many times there are individuals who, vulture-like, watch for the slightest inconsistency in governmental affairs, and as soon as their beady eyes spy such a mistake, they pounce on it and in the process rip the whole institution to shreds.

We have all seen this happen again and again in state and federal governments and institutional bodies of all kinds; perhaps we can learn from them. By not being in a hurry to thrust out a half-thought through opinion, we can save ourselves the embarrassment of nursing our own crippled word.

Thoughts on -- Dancing

About a year ago the cry went up about the campus that "the students want dancing." A vote was taken and the result should be most obvious—we do not have dancing. It is, I think, necessary to examine the issue anew before the battle cry for dancing is again sounded.

To begin, what amounts to Victorian Lutheranism (i.e. moral and social standards of the Victorian Era attached to Lutherans to make them holy) has for the most part prevented the introduction of new ideas, the least of which is dancing. This attitude has in fact prevailed for so long that it has almost made a mockery out of the precept that we are a Liberal Arts college.

The administration, contrary to popular opinion, is not made up of ogres bent on keeping the students from having a good time. It is, however, caught between two fires. Because we are experiencing an unprecedented expansion program we are dependent to a large extent on substantial gifts from private sources. It is thought that some of these sources are opposed to dancing. This puts the administration squarely in the middle. It must decide which is to come first and fortunately it decided that our physical expansion must come first. Nevertheless, it should make efforts toward securing dancing.

The third point is perhaps the most important, i.e., the student attitude. Student apathy has been responsible for the death of more than one program about campus. It can best be summed up this way—if you are not willing to support something wholeheartedly you do not deserve to have it.

There are a few other things that should be remembered. First, dancing is not mandatory and if you feel that it violates your principles it is your right to abstain. Secondly, the total number of dances during the year would be limited to major social events. Thirdly, dancing in itself is not a cure-all for our social ills but it could be a first step in the right direction.

For every bottle cap the boys redeem from a Pepsi-Cola "+" or Teem bottle, the Pepsi-Cola Company will donate ½ cent to any non-profit organization the boys choose.

To date, approximately 66 special bottle caps have been saved, another 33 cents for the Swimming Pool Fund.

LSA Committee Reports Shortage In Monetary Goal

The L.S.A. Stewardship Committee reports that offering receipts for the months of September and October totaled \$179.58. This amount is constituted by 60% of the offering from the L.S.A. envelopes used by Dana students at First Lutheran Church each Sunday.

It has been pointed out that in order to reach the \$1,000 budget goal set by the L.S.A. for 1961-62, the bi-monthly intake should be increased by approximately twenty dollars. Every two months (plus a one-month report at the end of the term) an account of the intake received therein is sent to the L.S.A. Stewardship Committee by First Lutheran.

In order to alleviate this present laxity of funds, the L.S.A. encourages students who worship at First Lutheran Church to use the L.S.A. envelopes which are provided for them.

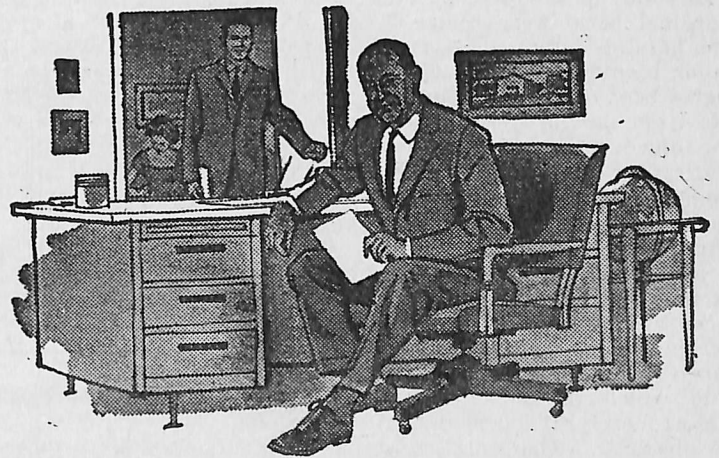

Policy Guidance Statement

A CHRISTIAN AFFIRMATION ON HUMAN RELATIONS WE BELIEVE THAT —

- God created one human family and that all men everywhere, whatever their color, culture, class or caste, are inseparably related and bound together as members of that one human family.
- All men are created in the image of God and are equally precious in His sight.
- Jesus Christ, Himself the God-man, Who was born, lived, died and rose again, lives now as the Savior and Lord of all men everywhere, whatever their color, culture, class or caste.
- All men are by nature selfish and in rebellion against God; and that only through God's reconciling grace can they be set free from the dominion of sin to live as one in Christ.
- Jesus Christ came to bring salvation to all men; and that, therefore, it is the obligation of the Church everywhere to communicate the Gospel without discrimination or distinction.
- Since the Church is created by God, the decisive factor in its policies and practices is not the will of men as conditioned by social, economic, or cultural patterns but rather the eternal will of God as revealed in Christ Jesus.
- Through the Gospel the Holy Spirit establishes the fellowship of believers and to that fellowship calls all men; and that to exclude from worship or membership in the local congregation any person on the basis of color, culture, class or caste is to sin against God and man.
- Christians ought to exercise their social responsibility by acting in their own communities to remove whatever injustices exist and to insure for all persons, without discrimination, just and equal opportunities, especially in housing, employment, education, and access to social welfare services.

Sacrament Administration Approved by Church Council for Wedding Ceremony

Recently the Church Council of the ALC approved a statement dealing with the celebration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at weddings.

The statement said, "... The understanding of the Sacrament of the Altar in the New Testament and the Lutheran Confessions gives no special warrant for its celebration at weddings. . . . Where such celebrations do occur, the character of the Sacrament

as a communion of the congregation implies that participation should not be limited to members of the bridal party, but be extended to all in the congregation who might properly approach the Table of the Lord."

The statement of clarification was prepared at the request of the Church Council by Dr. Warren Quanbeck, professor at Luther Theological Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota.
