

A Cappella Choir '62 May Festivities Sings March 4 Home Concert Planned by Seniors

This Sunday, March 4, the Dana College Touring Choir will present its annual home concert at 8 p.m. in Alumni Auditorium.

The 48-voice choir, under the direction of Professor Paul E. Neve, appeared in concert this season throughout western Nebraska and also in Denver, Colorado Springs and other cities in Colorado.

At home, the choir will present its regular tour program. Included in this diversified collection of vocal numbers are the Ceremony of Carols; a Bach motet, "The Spirit Also Helpeth Us;" Wilson's "Winter," with words from a Shakespearean play; and some songs of the Negro Spiritual tradition. Selections in the secular vein are also on the agenda of the 37th Annual Touring Choir's Home Concert.

The choir will also sing one number, "Man of Sorrows," on March 7, which is Ash Wednesday and designates the beginning of the Lenten season. The service will be held at First Lutheran Church.

Last Sunday the choir performed at the Music Hall Auditorium in Omaha in conjunction with the Home Concert of the Omaha Symphony Orchestra. During the orchestral intermission the choir presented a program of six numbers from their concert tour listing, three of the regular songs and the three "light" optional numbers.

Selective Service Test Pre-Sem Students April 17 Deadline Nears Hear Dr. Norstad

Applications for the April 17, 1962, administration of the College Qualification Test are now available at Selective Service local boards throughout the country.

Eligible students (any student wishing to attend college and is 18 or over) who intend to take this test should apply at once to the nearest Selective Service local board for an application and bulletin of information.

According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once. Test results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.

Coming to Dana's campus March 1 and 2 is Dr. Fredric Norstad, a member of the ALC Board of Theological Education, who will speak to students interested in entering the full time ministry of the church. He is also scheduled to speak in chapel Friday morning.

Dr. Norstad is a lecturer at Luther Seminary and at the University of Minnesota. His specialization is pastoral psychology.

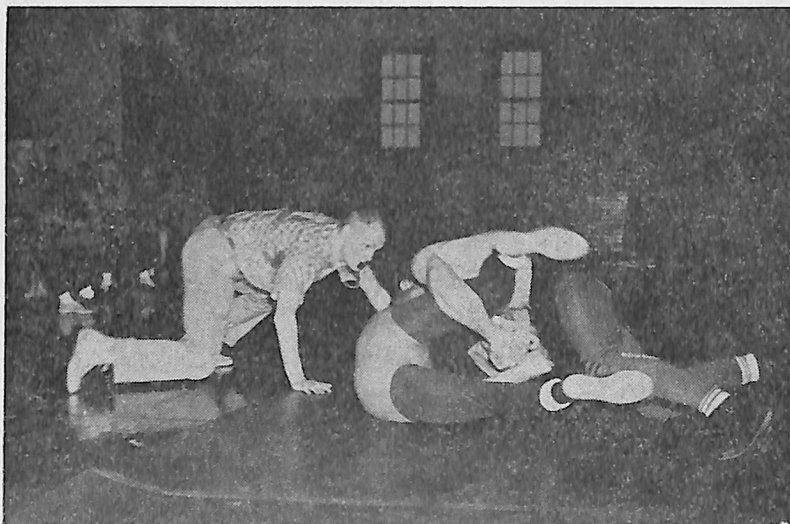

Sonja Jacobsen and Donna Layton each scored 61 points in these three games. Linda Laursen scored 14 against Mercy and 13 against Concordia to round out scoring honors.

Viking Matmen Capture Invitational First Place

The wrestling season ended in victory for the Viking grapplers who captured the Dana Invitational meet. With a team total of 69 points, Dana dropped Midland, who salvaged 52, followed by Westmar, 39; Doane, 29; and Luther Junior College with 15.

Highlights of the evening for Viking fans were the efforts of Herb Knudsen and Lowell Larson. Knudsen's fast pace completely baffled his Westmar opponent as he took first pin of the evening in 2:40. Larson brought fans to their feet as he held his opponent at near falls in each of the final two periods only to settle for a 12-4 decision.

"Seb's" average was an even 20 points per game this year. Following Sebbert in scoring was Bob Ericksen who netted 18 points for Coach Clements' quintet.

Jerry Paulsen is a 5-10 guard from Waupaca, Wisconsin, who will very definitely figure in the future Varsity squads at Dana. Jerry started out with the B team because he is a freshman but his ability soon impressed coaches into placing him on the Varsity Squad. Jerry proved throughout the year that his fine ball handling ability and shooting prowess will make him a player to watch in the future.

Tom Winscot, a 5-11 Platts-mouth letterman, saw considerable action on the Viking team this year. "Winnie" served Coach Clements equally well on both offense and defense; his corner jump shot became his trademark throughout the season and his hustling backcourt defense constantly harassed enemy ball handlers. Tom was hampered by an injury that has been with him for some time but he will be counted on in the future to fulfill guard duties for the Viking cage squad.

Charles Bro came out later in the season and saw most of his action with the B team although the Varsity used his talents and height on many occasions. Charlie was in the development stages throughout the remainder of the season and was advancing up the ranks at the close of the season. His rebounding and shooting potential may make him one of the bigger men in the conference to be handled.

Jack Muehl is another freshman who made the Varsity this season. Jack, one of the taller men on the team, stands 6-3 and hails from Pewaukee, Wisconsin. Jack was used considerably in both A and B team action; he is a fighter under the boards and has scoring skill from under the basket. Jack likes to compete and is enthusiastic about next season's prospects.

The Bulldogs, who previously this season downed the Vikings, were never actually out of contention. Their problem, however, seemed to stem from their inconsistent scoring pace that left them on the short end of the score. Half time found Dana leading.

For the Vikings, the game left them in second place in the conference race after splitting 1-1 with Midland College. Midland defeated Northwestern last weekend to insure its first-place honors.
