Ferguson Earns Doctor's Degree

Professor A. Gordon Ferguson, Associate Professor of Modern Languages and Head of the Modern Languages Department, completed his oral examinations Monday on his dissertation which he submitted for the degree of doctor of philosophy.

The dissertation entitled **Spain Through Her Novel (1940-1960): A Study of Changes in Mores and Attitudes as Reflected in the Contemporary Novel** was written in Spain while Dr. Ferguson was on sabbatical leave from Dana last year.

Official conferment of the degree by the Graduate College of the University of Nebraska will be Saturday, February 2 at 10 a.m. in Pershing Municipal Auditorium in Lincoln.

Dr. Ferguson received his B.A. and M.A. from the University of Chicago and did graduate work at the Universities of Chicago and Nebraska, and also at the Universities of Madrid and Barcelona, Spain. He has been a member of the Dana faculty since 1953.

With the earning of his Ph.D., Professor Ferguson becomes the eighth member of the faculty to hold a doctor's degree. A number of other faculty members are presently doing graduate study and research for their doctorates and several will complete their requirements in the near future.

Cafeteria, Dorm Ratings Released

Results from the evaluation poll taken by students a few weeks ago have been released. According to the tabulations, the quantity of food, appearance of food and pleasantness of food servers received ratings of "usually" satisfactory. The quality of food, the cooking of food and the selection of foods one enjoys eating were generally rated as "seldom" satisfactory. The overall rating of the food service was "fair."

In the section of questions about living accommodations, the dorm counselors received a rating of "always" satisfactory, while everything else, such as study conditions, maintenance and room temperature were rated "usually" satisfactory. The final rating of living quarters was "good."

30 New Students Expected at Dana

Enrollment figures for second semester are not complete as yet because several new students have not arrived. Thirty new students are expected at Dana this semester to make the total enrollment about 500. This is an increase of 5% compared with last year.

The enrollment this semester is a drop of 5% from first semester and it is hoped that the new and returning students will erase this drop.

History Club Hosts Films in Dana Hall

The Dana College History Club is sponsoring a series of foreign films. The schedule is:

Tickets are \$1.50 for the entire series. Single tickets are fifty cents.

There will be two showings of each film in the Dana Hall of Science Auditorium at 7:00 p.m. and at 9:00 p.m.

Broth of a Boy, which will be shown February 3, is based on the play by Hugh Leonard. Barry Fitzgerald, the star, is supported by the Abbey Players of London. Fitzgerald plays a delightfully roguish Irish character who claims to be 110 years old—the oldest man in the world. Harry Brogan plays his son called the "Wee One" who claims to be only 80. Hilarious complications set in when a London TV man comes to the quaint Irish village of Ballymorrissey to meet the pair.

The New York Times says "The Abbey Players and Barry Fitzgerald are as charming as a soft summer's ray. It all turns out as happily as a Gaelic fairy tale."

The films in this series have English subtitles. All are highly recommended. Season tickets went on sale Wednesday noon in the cafeteria and at Mr. Tweton's office on the second floor of Pioneer Memorial.

49 Students Achieve Semester Honor Roll

Forty-nine Dana students have made the Honor Roll for the first semester. This number represents approximately ten per cent of the total enrollment. Dana Registrar, Dr. Elmer Rasmussen, says that this number is about the normal percentage of students who make the Honor Roll the first semester.

To be eligible for the Honor Roll, the student must have maintained an average of 7.50 or over for the semester. Any grade of 3 or less makes him ineligible. The following is the list of full-time students on the Honor Roll with their classification and grade point average.

Jorgensen Receives Brotherhood Award

Richard S. Jorgensen, a junior from Des Moines, Iowa, was recently elected by the faculty as the winner of The Lutheran Brotherhood Scholarship. JoAnn Urie of Norwalk, California, was chosen as alternate.

The scholarship of \$300, which will be presented at senior convocation, is awarded to a junior Lutheran student "who, in the opinion of the college committee, deserves such recognition, taking into consideration the religious leadership of the student, his scholastic standing, and other qualities, as the committee may determine."

This year Richard is vice-president of the student body, treasurer of the men's dormitory council and a counselor in the men's south dorm. He has also been on the Honor Roll every semester since beginning college.

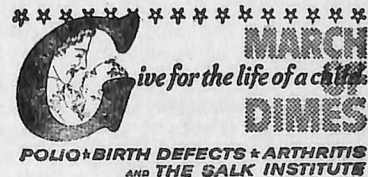
A Short Sermon

Vikings Edged by Westmar After Sioux Falls Victory

The Vikings rolled to victory over Sioux Falls by a score of 82-73. The Dana team advanced, Ken Kemmish leading the attack with 14 points. Leading the scoring for the Sioux Falls team was Reed with 26 points. Coach Clements used a total of 10 players compared to a total of 11 used by the opponent.

It was Westmar who trimmed the Vikings 80-68 after the Viking five rolled over Sioux Falls. Westmar seemed to be at a peak as they led Dana in scoring all four quarters. The Viking quintet suffered badly on fouls with a total of 25 as compared to 16 by Westmar. The leading scorer for Westmar was Mueller who pumped in 21 points. Dana's leading scorers were Marc Petersen with 13 and Gary Hanson with 12. The statistics showed very even scoring among the Vikings.

Percentage-wise, Dana outshot the Westmar quintet 76% to 63%. Dana's shooting percentage has only been bested by their opponents on three outings.
