

### Dr. Paul Nyholm, Professor, Author Speaks at Chapel

The Rev. Dr. Paul C. Nyholm, professor of church history at Wartburg Theological Seminary and author of a book to appear early this spring, will be the guest speaker at morning chapel on Friday, February 8. Dr. Nyholm, who was a member of the Dana College-Trinity Seminary faculty from 1935 to 1955, has edited and contributed to publications in Canada, Denmark and the United States and for eight years edited the bi-lingual **Dansk Nytaar**, an annual of religion and the arts.

He holds a degree in theology from the University of Copenhagen and the Ph.D. degree in history from the University of Chicago. He has been a member of the faculty of various colleges both in the United States and Canada and a parish pastor in both countries. The latter is a family tradition, with forefathers in a direct line since 1746 having been pastors; Dr. Nyholm's father was the first Danish missionary to China.

Articles by Dr. Nyholm have appeared in periodicals in five countries. His most recent publication, **The Americanization of the Danish Lutheran Churches in America**, is scheduled to appear early this spring.

### Herb Selected For European Project

Herb Knudsen, Dana Student Body President, has been selected as one of twenty-seven participants in the 1963 European Study Project sponsored by the National Lutheran Council. This contest was open to all Lutheran students affiliated with the NLC.

The Study Project is centered around two main events: (1) the World Lutheran Student Conference to be held at Järvenpää, Finland, July 23-29 and (2) the Helsinki Assembly of the Lutheran World Federation, July 30-August 10.

Included in the pre-conference itinerary are Italy, Germany, Russia, France, Switzerland and the Scandinavian countries.

## Three Guest Speakers Highlight Dana's Spiritual Emphasis Days

Three speakers instead of the usual one have been engaged to speak at the Spiritual Emphasis services next week (Sunday, February 10 through Wednesday, February 13).

They are Dr. Vernon Strempe, Professor of Practical Theology at Central Seminary, Fremont; the Reverend Robert O. Berthelsen, pastor of Sheridan Lutheran Church in Lincoln and the Reverend R. F. Jenkins, pastor of Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church in Omaha.

The general theme of the series is "Faith and Life Today." All services will be held in Alumni Memorial Auditorium except for the Sunday morning services which will be at First Lutheran.

**Wednesday, February 13**—Jenkins: "Our Weapons of Defense in Christ," 10 a.m.

Following the Monday and Wednesday morning services, a panel discussion will be held in which faculty and students will participate. Faculty on the panel for Monday are Dr. Tucker, Dean Skogman; for Wednesday, faculty panel members are Mrs. Laaker and Mr. Tweton. Rev. Nielsen will serve as moderator and the speaker at the morning service will also be on the panel.

A twenty-four hour prayer vigil is being set up from 8 a.m. Saturday to 8 a.m. Sunday in Mickelsen Hall Chapel. Persons interested in signing up for 15 minute prayer periods are asked to sign the list on the Alumni Memorial Bulletin Board.

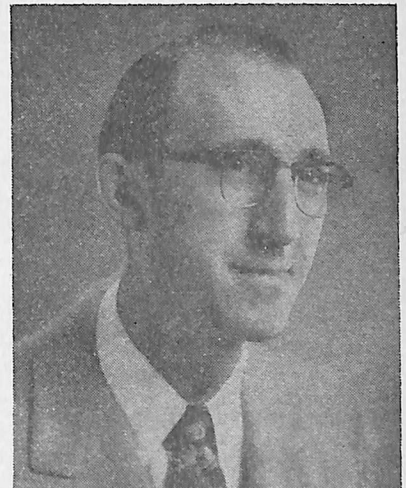
Before the evening services at 7 p.m., a preparatory prayer period will be held in the Doctors' Auditorium for approximately twenty minutes.

Dana's Folk Dancers will appear at the Festival of Nations in Joslyn Art Museum on Sunday, February 10 at 2 p.m.

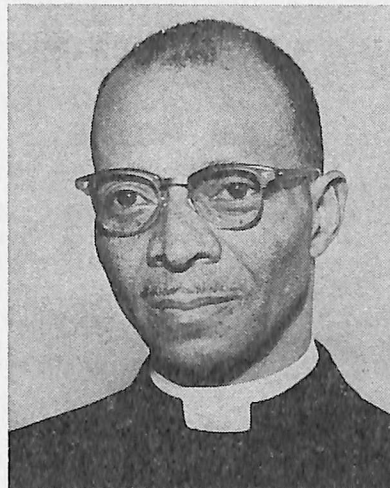
This appearance will mark the third time that the Dana Folk Dancers have performed at this annual affair.

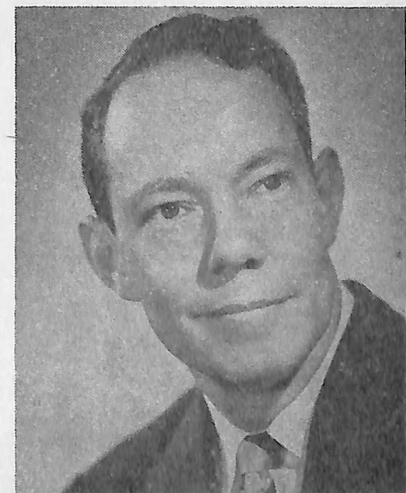
Dr. Vernon Strempe

He served as instructor in sociology and practical theology at Dana and Trinity Seminary from 1946-48. He served as Associate Secretary of the Board of Higher Education of the former ULCA and at present is on the faculty of Central Seminary in Fremont.

Rev. Jenkins is a graduate of Immanuel Lutheran College and Seminary at Greensboro, North Carolina. He was an instructor of religion for several years and has served parishes in Charlotte, North Carolina and Selma, Alabama, before becoming pastor of Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church in Omaha. He has been President of both the Northern Nebraska District and South Eastern District of Immanuel Conference.

Rev. Berthelsen is a 1942 graduate of Dana College and a 1949 graduate of Trinity Seminary. He has served parishes in Oregon and Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and has been in Lincoln since 1962.

# HERMES Our Nation Today Still Sees Lincoln As Its Strength *Council Clips*

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Americans think most often of Abraham Lincoln in the light of the momentous events that followed his election in 1860 as the sixteenth President of the United States.

In that year the nation was about to split asunder over the issues of States' rights and slavery. By the time the tall, gaunt, thoughtful man from the West had taken his oath of office, eleven southern states had left the Union to form the Confederate States of the America.

**When in the spring of 1861 the Civil War began, the new President's first great purpose was to save the Union—even if this meant maintaining slavery in the states where it was legal. But within a year, he had come to understand that the second great purpose of that tragic conflict must be the abolition of slavery.**

Under his leadership both of these purposes were achieved and Lincoln lives on in reverent memory as the preserver of the Union and the Great Emancipator.

**When Lincoln left his Springfield, Illinois, law office to assume the Presidency at a moment of great crisis, he had been a national political figure for a brief time only. It took time for Lincoln to grow into his office, but once he had done so he stood revealed as one of the giants of history—a great man who was also a living demonstration of the opportunity that a nation "dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal" offers to its most humbly-born citizen.**

Abraham Lincoln not only exemplified the principle that all are created equal, he believed in it. And he always expressed the belief in simple words—as when he addressed the 166th Ohio Regiment late in the summer of 1864.

After stressing the fact that victory is the conflict that would perpetuate this "great and free government" with its "equal privileges for all in the race of life," he said to the battle-scared soldiers:

**"I beg you to remember this, not merely for my sake, but for yours. I happen temporarily, to occupy this White House. I am a living witness that any of your children may look to come here as my father's child has."**

Thus spoke the man who had begun his long journey to greatness in a log cabin—the same man who, more perhaps than any other American, belongs to the people of the whole world.

So, as Lincoln's birthday comes around again on February 12, we are reminded once more that America is ever strengthened by the memory of Abraham Lincoln whose ideals continue to guide us in every great national undertaking.

## Duty As Seen by Lincoln

"If I were to try to read, much less answer, all the attacks made on me, this shop might as well be closed for any other business. I do the very best I know how—the very best I can; and I mean to keep doing so until the end. If the end brings me out all right, what is said against me won't amount to anything. If the end brings me out wrong, ten angels swearing I was right would make no difference."

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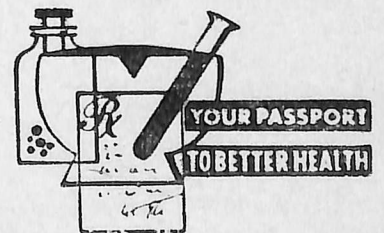

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## Dana Host This Weekend To Westmar and Northwestern

Dana will entertain the Red Raiders from Northwestern tonight at Borup Coliseum. Northwestern comes to Dana after losing two straight to Midland and Concordia last weekend here in Nebraska. They are a good-scoring ball club and like to run with the ball. Because of Dana's win over them last weekend, they should be tough to beat in their quest for revenge.

On Saturday night, Dana will play host to Westmar College. Westmar will also be seeking revenge after spending a disastrous weekend last week at the hands of Concordia and Midland.

Westmar has a nationally ranked performer in Jim Sutherland. He is ranked number 16 in the nation in free-throw shooting with a .845 percentage according to National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) statistics.

## Viking Five Loses To Yankton After Sioux Falls Avenges Earlier Loss

Sioux Falls avenged an earlier defeat as they edged Dana by the score of 75-69 at Sioux Falls. The Vikings got off to a slow start in the first quarter as Sioux Falls outscored them 20-7. Throughout the remaining three quarters however, it was Dana outscoring Sioux Falls by slim margins.

Bob Erickson led the Vikings in scoring with 17 points. De Boer pumped in 25 points for the winners. Dana suffered at the foul line hitting only 57% of their free throws. This compared to 71% for the hosts. It was a scrambling game all the way as showed by the foul statistics of both teams: Dana had 27 while Sioux Falls had 18.
