## Hengeveld Gets Research Grant

Sue Hengeveld, junior from Lincoln, Nebraska, has been awarded a \$175 grant from the American Association for the Advancement of Science through the Nebraska Academy of Science for purchasing equipment for her research project.

The project, entitled "Investigation of Glandular Proteins, by Immuno-electrophoresis of the Thymus and Bursa of Fabricius in the Chicken," was begun this year under the supervision of Dr. Marie Tucker and is part of the course "Research in Biology." The project will be completed at the end of her senior year.

Miss Hengeveld will work on her project in the student research laboratory in Dana Hall of Science where the equipment is to be located. The apparatus will remain in Dana Hall after completion of this project for use by other students.

A report of the progress of the project will be given by Miss Hengeveld on May 3 and 4 to the Nebraska Academy of Science.

## 'Picnic' Is Second All-Campus Movie

Second in the series of all-campus free movies is *Picnic* starring William Holden, Kim Novak, Susan Stasburg and Cliff Robertson to be shown in Doctors' Hall Auditorium on Friday, March 8 (reverse night).

Two showings of the movie are scheduled: 7:30-9:45 and 10:00-12:30 p.m.

The picture which is in technicolor has won eight academy awards and was directed by Josh Logan. The brilliant cast transforms William Inge's Pulitzer Prize winning play into a dramatic, adult motion picture.

Set against the colorful sweeping vastness of Kansas skies, fields of grain, elevators and comfortable homes, *Picnic* is the story of a stranger in town and the havoc he creates in the lives of the people.

The action spans a time of only twenty-four hours, but it truly captures the drama of small town American life.

## Mr. Rippey Speaks To Home Ec. Club

Dana's Home Economics Club will present Mr. John Rippey, an interior decorator, at their meeting in Mickelsen Hall lounge on March 11. The meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. and the faculty women are to be special guests.

Mr. Rippey's present position is that of Interior Decorator and Designer for J. L. Brandeis & Sons of Omaha. In addition to his work in department stores, he has done free lance design for television commercials, hotels, restaurants and hospitals.

His presentation Monday evening will be about new trends in interior decoration and he may show slides on the European influences in that field.

## Dana Students Conduct Red Cross Campaign

On March 14th, Dana College will conduct a Red Cross Fund Raising Campaign from 3:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m. This campaign is a project of the entire student body and a first for a college to take an entire county as a project for the Red Cross in a one-day drive.

The purpose of this campaign is to raise \$2,664 for the Washington County Blood Bank, which is in danger. Blair has not met its quota for the last two years and the Bank has gradually been depleted. All Dana College students have access to the Blood Bank, so therefore, all will benefit from this campaign.

The floor counselors are in charge of the arrangements for their floors, and Barry Tuttle is in charge of the off-campus students. For those who drive cars during the campaign, a local service station will provide a gallon of gas for every 15 miles driven. Herb Knudsen, Student Body President, has said, "This is a wonderful opportunity for our college to be of service to the community, and we would like a 100% effort on the part of the student body."

Classes will not be held after 3 p.m. the afternoon of the 14th in order that all students may participate.

## 'Hermes' Articles Appear in Second 'College Clippings'

In the second edition of *College Clippings* distributed (only to students) with *Hermes* this week, appear two articles from the issues since homecoming.

The two articles from *Hermes* are a news article concerning the study being conducted by Columbia University in which 75 of Dana's students recently participated. The other is a New Year's resolution feature.

*College Clippings* is a sheet of articles from the newspapers of the colleges of the American Lutheran Church. It is edited by Dick Buchsteiner, Student Body President of Wartburg College and published by the Youth Department of the ALC.

Distribution of *College Clippings* to all students is an experiment by the Youth Department to discover whether this kind of information is of interest to the whole student body or just to a small group.

Second and third floors of South Hall will canvass business districts of Blair, Kennard, Arlington, Herman and Fort Calhoun. Fourth floor South and second floor North will cover the rural district of Washington County. Mickelsen Hall, Omaha Village, the Men's Units, third and fourth floor North and the off-campus students will take the residential district of Blair.

## Spanish, German Majors Offered

Dana College will offer majors in Spanish and German starting with the 1963-64 school year. Dr. A. Gordon Ferguson, Chairman of the Modern Languages Department, announced that it will take 30 hours in the language to qualify for a major. He also said that those interested in secondary education will be required to have an English minor starting next fall.

This is the first time a major area has been offered in a single language, although before, a major could be obtained with a combination of languages. There are at least seven people interested in a language major at this time and Dr. Ferguson pointed out that Dana lost two students this year because the college did not offer a major in this field.

## New Guinea Missionary Presents LSA Program

When the LSA meets next Tuesday, the Reverend John Mager will speak and show slides. He was a missionary in New Guinea during World War II. Rev. Mager will tell of the many interesting experiences he had with both the Japanese and the unfriendly natives. The meeting will begin at 7:00 p.m. in Doctors' Hall Auditorium.

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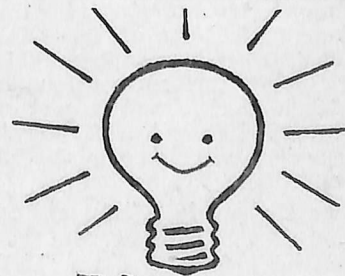

A charter for a Student Tutorship Society was presented to the Council and was approved. The purpose of this society "shall be to guide students with academic difficulties toward independent study." The charter provides for a student tutor in each academic area offered at Dana. Tutors will be chosen in the spring for the following year by professors and Alpha Chi which will administer this society.

Dave Israel asked the Council to appropriate \$20 for the publication of the L.S.A.A. Newsletter of which Dave is the editor. His request was granted.

Lynn Barnes, one of the student members of the Faculty-Student Senate, reported that the Senate had met to discuss the charter and suggested that a clause be added which would allow a student to appeal to the Senate without first going to the Dorm Council or Dean of Students in case they would not refer the case to the Senate. This clause was added.

Hermes was allocated \$5 from Council to help defray the cost of extra copies to be given to delegates of The ALC conference.

Mr. Ben Polk, Red Cross Representative, gave details concerning the Red Cross Campaign Dana has consented to undertake. Representatives from the dorms were present to hear his presentation. I wish to urge you as students to give your full support to this campaign when you are asked to help.

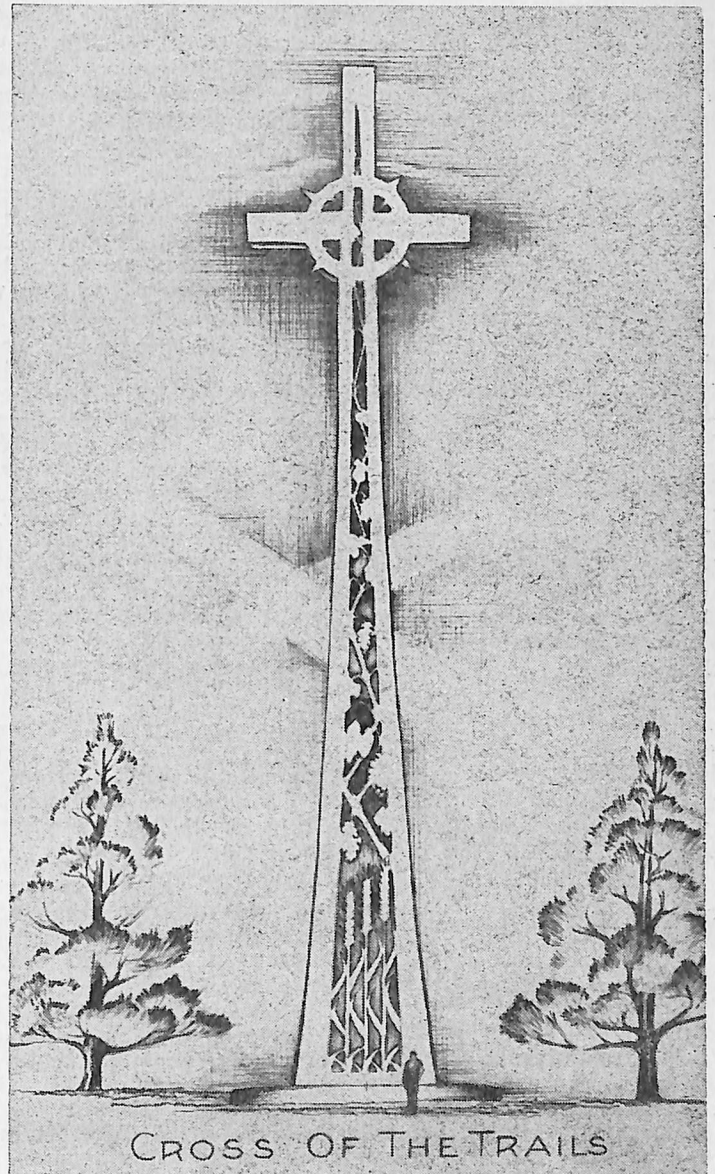

## Beneath The Cross



There is nothing on our campus calendar to indicate that we are going through any period of religious crisis—our days are well-spiced with the usual sports, movies, art shows, etc.

It is not that I object to normal activities during Lent; it is rather that I object to the black cloak of sorrow that is expressed so frequently during Lent but not practiced.

As I write this meditation I am sitting in front of a victory cross. At the base three stalks of wheat reach upward and where they stop the grape vine begins its climb to the top of the cross. Where the cross bars meet there is a crown or circle with thorns reminding us, as indeed does the entire concept of the cross, of the suffering Christ.

In the main this cross, containing the wheat and grape vine soaring upward, expresses the victory of our Savior. I believe that it is good to realize at all times even during Lenten meditations that Christ arose and lives on, victorious over death and all the problems of time, "for God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself."
