Tickets for the program are available at the cost of 50c for students and \$1 for adults if purchased before Saturday, November 23. After that date the prices will be \$1 and \$1.50. Tickets may be obtained from the Public Relations office, PM 105.

Touring the United States under the auspices of the Danish Ministry of Education, the team is directed by Arne Mortensen and managed by Niels B. Madsen.

Although the Ollerup Academy was founded for the specific purpose of training gym teachers, its curriculum conforms to the philosophy guiding operations of the Folk High Schools with their emphasis on liberal arts studies, informal discussion and community singing. Hence the tradition that every practice session in every gym club in Denmark begins and ends with the gymnasts marching and singing—The Folk High Schools are boarding schools, religiously oriented and rather well disciplined. They are not all co-educational, but they are all minus exams and "credits."

New Grand Piano Seminary Visitors Given To Dana Coming Monday

Dana College acquired a new Baldwin grand piano through the generosity of Mrs. Pauline Christiansen, a resident of Vermillion, South Dakota.

Mrs. Christiansen has been a contributor to Dana for many years. She has donated \$10,000 to the Student Loan program. Her husband worked on the development drive to get funds for the North and South Halls' building program in the 1920's.

The piano has been a long-desired item for the campus and music department and it was by a letter of suggestion from Professor Paul Neve, chairman of the music department, who is a personal friend of Mrs. Christiansen, that the piano was given. The piano will be used primarily for concerts and recitals.

Dr. Alfred H. Ewald, president of Wartburg Theological Seminary in Dubuque, Iowa and Arden Dorn, a junior at Wartburg and a senior last year at Dana, will be on campus Monday, November 25.

At the November 14th meeting, the Council finished preparing a slate of nominations for the 1964 Homecoming Committee. Election of the chairmen of the various phases of Homecoming planning which constitutes the committee will be held sometime this week. Check the bulletin board and chapel announcements for further details.

Five Council members will be attending the Nebraska Student Council Convention at Doane College on November 23. They are Chuck Jorgensen, Janie Botos, Bob Rademacher, Tom Lange and Kathy Olsen. Some of the discussion areas at the conference are campus ethics and honor systems, campus journalism and student government.

Tim Jensen was elected chairman of the committee doing preliminary investigation on the aspects, problems, responsibilities and procedure of forming a student congregation for our campus. Correspondence is being carried on with other colleges which now have student congregations to ascertain information on their feasibility and effectiveness.

Several suggestions were voiced at the Council meeting in regard to improving the low percentage of students voting in campus elections. The elections commission will study some of the suggestions and put those into practice which may help to improve the last election's low percentage of voters to 75% or better for future elections. Some of the suggestions were to have several voting places, place ballots in the mail boxes, vote at the beginning of Liberal Arts Reading sessions, put memos in everyone's box with pertinent information about the election and the candidates, and also the placing of posters about campus publicizing an up-coming election.

All students are invited to attend Student Council meetings each Thursday evening from 7 to 8 p.m. in Doctors' Auditorium.

Gymnastics Are Not Substitute Spotts

A boarding school founded by the late Dr. Niels Bukh (1880-1950), the Ollerup Academy of Physical Education is owned and supported by its alumni on a non-profit basis, and subsidized by the Danish State. Since it was built in 1920, 15,000 gym teachers have graduated.

Gymnastics is compulsory in Danish public schools. However, Ollerup gym teachers are not automatically accepted for teaching in public schools. Their function is avocational. Their objective is to contribute towards maintaining a decent standard of physical fitness among the nation's youth, on a voluntary basis. There is hardly a village in Denmark without its gym teams.

Ollerup courses consist overwhelmingly of intensive physical training along with anatomical and physiological studies.

Gymnastics in Denmark do not serve as a substitute for sports activities, but as a basis for such activities. It is used as a medium with which to do other things better by virtue of improved health and physical fitness.
