## ALC Colleges Publish 'D-12'

At the end of this month all Dana students will receive free a copy of the new American Lutheran Church colleges' magazine **DIMENSIONS 12**.

This is a pilot issue of what is hoped will soon become a regular part of the Lutheran Church College scene. It replaces College Clippings, a periodic publication of clippings from the college newspapers.

The new magazine will be printed on eight pages of enamel book paper. Its format will be much like that of Luther College's Chips.

Dana is represented in **Dimensions 12** by former **Hermes** editor Bob Rademacher. The editor is Mark Lono of Pacific Lutheran University. Lono edited **Clippings** and promoted the formation of the new publication.

The first issue of **D-12** is financed by the Youth Department of the ALC. The future of the project will be determined at the Student Conference at PLU this fall.

This issue features articles about student government, entertainment, sports, editorial concerns and religious activities at the schools. Dana students will find their copies in their mailboxes as soon as possible after the magazines arrive.

## Woodwind Quintet To Be Featured in Music Festival

The American Woodwind Quintet, under the direction of Philip Farkas, will appear in concert on Thursday, April 30, at 7:30 p.m. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. The concert will be free to Dana students and faculty. Price of admission for the general public will be \$1. The concert is presented in co-operation with Schmolter-Mueller Piano Company as a part of the first annual Lauritz Melchior Festival of music at Dana.

Composed of five members of the faculty of Indiana University School of Music, the Quintet is gaining a nation-wide reputation as one of the most outstanding woodwind chamber music groups before the public today.

The group was organized in 1949. Their repertoire covers a broad range from classic works of Beethoven and Haydn to exciting contemporary compositions by Hindemith, Ibert and others.

Members of the group are as follows:

**Harry Haudeshel**, who was flute soloist with the United States Navy Band and Symphony Orchestra for 19 years.

**Jerry Sirucek**, who has been a member of the Houston Symphony Orchestra and the Chicago Symphony. He is recognized as one of the country's leading oboe teachers and performers.

**Robert McGinnis**, who has been solo clarinetist of the Philadelphia Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra and NBC Symphony.

**Philip Farkas**, who has played principal horn with the Kansas City Philharmonic and others.

**Roy Houser**, who has played bassoon with the Busch Symphony, ABC Symphony and Ballet Russe Orchestra.

## Senate Members, Amendments Voted In

## LSA Discusses Mission Philosophy

Why missions? How? Where?

This year has brought us several frustrating questions concerning the place of world missions in the Christian church, and for many of these questions we have still received no satisfactory answers.

Some very baffling questions arose first of all during Spiritual Emphasis Days this semester, and then again when two films published by the American Lutheran Church's Division of World Missions were shown at LSA meetings in February and March.

These films seemed to portray missions as institutions advocating just those ideas which maybe they should try hardest to avoid, such as Americanism, anti-Communism and even militarism!

A new understanding of the reasons for these and other factors in the church's present approach to the world may be found next Tuesday evening, May 5th, at 7 p.m. in Doctors' Hall Auditorium when the Reverend Lester A. Dahlen, Assistant to the Director of the ALC's Division of World Missions will speak at LSA concerning the Lutheran Church's philosophy of world missions.

He may not have all the answers, but he will definitely be able to give us a better understanding of the problems now confronting us, how they are being met, and perhaps how they should be met.

Come concerned, considerate, questioning.

But do come.

The Dana College Board of Regents, at their regular spring meeting on campus last week, made a number of important decisions relative to the future expansion of the college.

The Board has directed the faculty and administration to prepare specific long range plans for a ten year projection of enrollment, budget, academic program, faculty, buildings and facilities. This plan is to be completed in time for consideration at the next Board meeting in October.

A tentative operating budget for the 1964-65 academic year was adopted in the amount of one-million, thirty-one thousand dollars as compared to a budget of nine hundred, forty-one thousand in 1963-64.

The Board also directed the administration to proceed immediately to engage architectural services and get preliminary plans and costs for a Campus Center to house dining facilities, bookstore, coffee shop, faculty lounge, conference and meeting rooms. It is hoped sufficient funds and financing will be found to enable construction to begin in 1965.

Contracts for all administrative personnel and faculty were approved for the coming year. All faculty members, with the exception of one, will return in 1964-65. Mr. Roger Welsch, instructor in German, has resigned to accept a similar position at Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln. Contracts were also approved for three additions to the faculty. They are Dr. Delvyn Hutton in Religion, Mr. Roger Olson in Mathematics and Miss Donna Byriel in Women's Physical Education and Social Activities.

Authorization was also given to engage an administrative assistant to the President or an assistant in the field of fund-raising. This position has not yet been filled.

Four faculty promotions were approved by the Board. They are Miss Luella Nielsen to the rank of Associate Professor; Mr. Paul Emmerich, Mr. Bernard Matthies and Mr. Donald Warman to the rank of Assistant Professor. Tenure was also granted to Dr. Clifford Hanson and Mr. Kenneth Tiahrt. (Mr. Tiahrt will be on leave of absence during the 1964-65 year to do graduate work.)

Nominations were also made for members of the Board of Regents. They are Miss Margaret Fischer, Omaha Attorney; Pastor Nels Carlsen of Pasadena, California; Mr. Harold Miller, Omaha; and Mr. Joe Lindholm of Audubon, Iowa. Election of new members will take place at the meeting of the Dana College Corporation which meets in conjunction with the biennial convention of The American Lutheran Church in October.

Final action concerned the approval of a request from a student committee to hold Sunday worship services on campus this spring and next fall with the understanding that no formal congregation be organized unless developments indicate this to be advisable.

The Board adjourned on Tuesday, April 14.

The services will be held in Alumni Memorial Auditorium at 10:00 a.m. with the Reverend John W. Nielsen officiating. Although the services will be Lutheran oriented, all students, regardless of their denominational affiliation, are more than welcome to attend and participate.

On April 14, Dana travelled to Morningside and again split a double-header. Dana won the first game 4 to 2 behind the brilliant pitching of Jim Jorgensen. The second game was lost to Morningside by a score of 6 to 4. In the second game Dana was leading 4 to 3 until the bottom of the sixth inning when the Morningside third-baseman homered with two people on base to give Morningside the winning margin.

On April 18, Northwestern travelled to the Viking field, and for the third consecutive time Dana split a double-header. Dana took the first game 9 to 1 behind the fine pitching of Jim Jorgensen and the stinging bats of the whole ball club. In the second game, Northwestern came from behind to defeat the Vikings 3 to 2 in ten innings. In the top of the 10th inning a Northwestern runner reached third base with two out. The next batter up hit a little dribbler down the first base line, the first baseman fielded the ball but there was a mix up and the runner reached first safely. On the play, the runner from the third scored the deciding run.

April 25 the Dana Vikings travel to Yankton to play the league-leading Greyhounds. If the Vikings can pull two games out of the fire, they will be in a tie for the first place.

## Two Vikings Place In W-Club Meet

The W-Club meet was postponed from Tuesday, April 21, to Wednesday the 22nd. Due to a conflict with the All-Sports Banquet, Coach Pete sent only six men.

Ron Beck and Owen Vasby were the only ones to place for Dana. Beck took third in the shot put with a heave of 46'2" and Vasby placed fourth in the pole vault with a jump of 12'6".

As for the other four men, Don Sutton ran a :52.9 quarter mile, Dennis Barker ran the 330 intermediate hurdles in :44.0, Knight Wynn broad jumped 20'8" and Gary Hiemke ran the 880 in 2:04.2.

Dana's next outing will be this evening, Tuesday, April 28, at the Westmar Invitational.

A number of students have asked about campus policy concerning alcoholic beverages, so the policies will be presented here. Most of these policies are of long standing; some are more recently added in order to more effectively support the laws of the state.

The college supports the laws of the state which prohibit any minor (a person under twenty-one) from purchase, use or possession of alcoholic beverages, and also prohibits anyone from purchasing such beverages for them. In addition, the college prohibits such selling or in any way providing beverages on campus or in housing used by students as well as students coming on campus "under the influence."

If a student who is a minor has broken the law or the regulations, the college is under obligation to discover all the facts. If the minor has purchased the beverage, a report is made in writing to the State Liquor Commission, with the signature of the minor as to how and when the purchase was made. If an adult, student or otherwise has sold or provided the beverage, the college also reports it to the Commission and the adult is subject to any penalty the Commission may assess.

If a student withholds or falsifies basic information needed in enforcing the regulations, he is subject to immediate suspension or dismissal. If he provides all needed information, he may be permitted to continue as a student as long as he follows probationary regulations established for him. For a second offense during his four year stay as a student, he is subject to immediate suspension unless he is needed to appear in a hearing at a later time; in such a case he may continue as a student for the time being.

Laws and regulations concerning alcoholic beverages are made for the protection of minors; the college believes it must actively support such laws and regulations as fully as possible.
