Speech and Drama Major on Agenda

Beginning with the 1965-66 school year, Dana College will offer a major in the field of Speech and Theatre. The advent of such a major has been long awaited by many and we welcome it to the roster of Dana College. The incoming major will have a choice of either of two "specialties" within the new major; that of General Speech and that of Theatre of Arts. There will be a slight difference in course structure between the two emphases but in general thirty credit hours will be required to attain the B.S. degree which will be offered.

The new major is so structured that it will be intra-departmental in that credit will be given towards a major in Speech and Theatre for specific courses presently offered by the departments of Art, Music and English. In addition to the thirty hours required for the major, a minor in some field is also required for a degree.

Courses offered on the 100 level will be: Fundamentals of Speech, Design, Music Appreciation and a new course. Speech 122, Introduction to Theatre. On the 200 level, courses offered will include: Public Speaking, Argumentation and Debate, and Oral Interpretation. 300 level courses include: Shakespeare, Play Production, and Voice and Diction. The courses on the 400 level will include: Theatre History and Literature, Readings in Speech, Readings in Theatre and also Research in Speech and Theatre.

Attendance Urged at 'Lord of the Flies'

Lord of the Flies, a movie based upon the book of the same name, and recently read in Liberal Arts, will be shown December 15, in a special presentation at the Home Theatre in Blair. Mr. Robinson, manager of the theatre, is co-operating with Dana in securing this film.

There will be two showings, 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. Student price is 50c. This film will be presented only one evening, Tuesday, December 15.

Choir Presents Annual Christmas Concert Sunday

Dana choirs will present their annual Christmas concert on Sunday, December 13. The program will begin at 7:30 P.M. and will consist of two different sections. Philosophy Major Offered at Dana

"Courses in philosophy are designed to enrich the life of the student through knowledge which he gains of the views of the important philosopher of the past and to stimulate him to think critically regarding the nature of reality." — 1964-65 Dana College Bulletin.

Dana College has opened up a new major in philosophy. The faculty met on November 30 and voted to begin the new major. This new outlined program can be obtained as soon as any student has enough hours.

The requisite courses for this major are:

1. Logic - 204
2. History of Ancient and Medieval Philosophy - 301
3. History of Modern Philosophy - 302
4. Recent Philosophy - 403

Plus 12 hours of additional philosophy electives. "Modern Civilization is assumed as a basic beginning course for background in a philosophy major," states Dr. Clifford Hanson. As electives a student could take Introduction to Philosophy 201, and Special Problems in Philosophy 409. Christianity in the Modern World can not be included in the Philosophy major. All the needed information will be outlined in the next college bulletin coming out in the spring.

Burns, Taft Recital Held Tonight

Be sure to attend the Burns Taft recital tonight, Friday, December 11. It will be held at 8:15 at AMA. He will be playing works that haven't been heard on campus for the last few years. Conference Delegates Discuss Vocation of Church College

"Faith is a relationship created by God. To be meaningful it must be cultivated. This divine relationship is conducted by means of human resources. The church reflects love and compassion in Christ. At the church college education is in Christ. Knowledge and truth are surrounded and undergirded by faith." Dr. R. Mortvedt opened the Fifth Annual ALC Student Conference, Pacific Lutheran University, on Thursday, November 26 with the preceding remarks.

Approximately 150 students, 110 from the Midwest, heard Dr. L. Rieke discuss "The Vocation of the Church College Community." "The future of the church college is colored by the lack of funds. Therefore, the church college can become independent or it can get out of the field of education. Is the church college a social club or is it a vital redeeming force of religion? Education must be rigorously honest. We can not be afraid of the independent thinker. We are to educate people to have a dramatic confrontation with Jesus Christ. Is the churches' function in education important or can this be done by the state? Perhaps it is time for the church to launch into new areas of endeavor? Is education more or less religious?"

Discussions, formal and informal, folk songs, led by Mr. John Ylvisaker, fourteen hour naps, bus trips into Tacoma, and meals kept the delegates busy. Dana's twelve, Dave Copperud, Tim Jensen, Wayne Josephson, Dan Aten, Jim Carpenter, Sue Hengeveld, Barb Riggs, Kathy Olsen, Jr. Schultz, Karl Petersen, Ron Heye, and Bob Larson, spent not a few hours in discussion of "church college why?" Friday, November 27, Dr. Flemming added more fuel to the discussion. He spoke on "Christian Action in Today's World."

"How do I pursue my vocation in contemporary society? Salvation involves the union of the unrelated, the indifferent the rebel with God. This also, involves a union with man. We are not obligated to like or approve of our neighbor. We are to LOVE him. We are to help our neighbor achieve his highest possibility.

"There can be no compromise of the dignity and worth of each man regardless of the cost! Christ's church should have the number one position in our lives. It should have priority in the expenditure of our time, our energy and our resources. In worship we:

Quicken the conscience by the holiness of God;
Open the heart to the love of God;
Devote the will to the purpose of God; and
Feed the mind with the truth of God."

An attempt will be made to explain the questions that have been raised by this conference, January 4 and 5, 1965, during chapel. Kathy Olsen and Wayne Josephson will speak in chapel on the fourth and a panel of the delegates will be open for all questions on the fifth. Tuesday evening, January 5, 1965, at 7:30 these questions and the problems and goals of the church college will be discussed by Dr. C. C. Madsen, Mr. A. J. Snowbeck, Mr. R. Weckmuller, and Mr. E. Lindblad. This meeting will be open to all personnel in the areas of Administration, Teaching and the mass of Scholars. Until then, the ten Dana delegates who spent over 85 hours in Car 700 and the two who hitch-hiked from Fargo to Blair are willing to engage in fiery elocution with anyone interested in the merits and/or drawbacks of the church college.

It's a rotten feeling to look at a stage when the people have left, the actors gone, the lights almost all turned off, to think of all the sweat, frustration conflicts, arguments, shouting, swearing, discouragements, and what else that has gone into this production.

So let's remember that it is not only lines being conveyed (which usually contain reverberating thoughts) to us, but the whole individual is performing; the lighting crew, designers make-up crew, costumers, and the scrubs are all performing—to convey to you his own talent and ideas.

Parliamentarian Clarifies Representative Question

As we near the end of the fall semester, I would like to clarify several points concerning Student Council representatives from the living units. As a general rule, the Student Council representatives will continue to serve their respective areas next semester. But there are some exceptions, one dealing specifically with the end of the semester.

A representative is automatically removed from the Council if he fails to maintain a cumulative grade point average of five (5.00). This is particularly important for freshmen representatives since their membership depends entirely upon this semester's grade point average. A representative is also removed if he moves out of the living area he represents or is put upon disciplinary probation.

If the members of a housing area feel that their delegate is failing to represent them properly, I would like to be approached with their problem. One of the responsibilities of the parliamentarian is to keep the student government running smoothly and efficiently. If I can know where the communications between Council and the students are breaking down, the appropriate channels can be used to restore efficient representation. Ultimately, if no better solution can be found, the Student Council has the power to permit a new election by removing the representative from Council. The living unit may then either reelect their councilman or choose a new one as they desire.

Anytime a vacancy develops in one of the living areas, that area will hold a new election at the earliest convenience. The same general procedures will be used for special elections as were used the first of the year.

Maybe an optimistic basketball point for the future—there are no seniors on the team, and only three juniors . . . Junior guard Ken Kemmish has an average of 21.3 points per game and leads the team in free throw percentage (65%). Paul Refsell, 6'4" transfer from Northwest Missouri State, is second in scoring with a 16.3 average, leads in field goal percentage (50%) and rebounding average (13 rebounds per game) . . .

The wrestling team appears on its way to another fine season, despite the heartbreaking loss to Tarkio last week. The next match will be on December 17 . . .

Intramural basketball has swung into action in full force, and early indications show Rejects (married men), Raiders I (4th North Holling) and Gotchas (off-campus) as the teams to beat. Dark horses include Floaters I and Golden Boys . . .

The next home basketball game is with Doane on December 12. The first conference game is January 8 at Sioux Falls.

Tarkio Defeats Dana Matmen

In the first wrestling match of the season, Dana was defeated by Tarkio, 17-16, in one of the most thrilling matches ever seen. After Tarkio had won the first two matches by pins, Dana began a valiant comeback, but was unable to catch Tarkio.

Tarkio ran off to a 10-0 lead when Ron Hough and Jim Prouty were pinned in 123 and 130 weight classes respectively. Wayne Harvey, a freshman from Oakland, Iowa, pinned his man at 137 lbs., and after Tony Fendric drew with his opponent, Greek won by decision at 157 and made the score 12-10 for Tarkio with three classes left.

Then 167 lb. Jim Guthrie was pinned, and Dana needed a pin and a decision to win. But Cliff Staben and heavyweight Tuck Rydell each had to settle for decisions, and Tarkio won by a single point.

Refsell Leads Dana Vikings to Victory

Paul Refsell scored 39 points to lead Dana to a 91-83 victory over Tarkio College of Tarkio, Missouri, last Tuesday night in a non-conference game. Dana brought their record to two wins and three losses, while Tarkio lost their fourth out of five games.

Dana got off to a rather slow start, but caught fire about half-way through the first half. After the lead changed hands several times, Dana went ahead with about nine minutes left in the first half and never relinquished the lead.

The Vikings almost lost the lead when Tarkio came within four points with 8:42 left in the game. But Dana rallied to win by eight.

Refsell hit on 18 of 25 shots from the field for a sizzling 72% and on 3 of 6 from the free throw line for his 39 points, 24 of which were in the first half. He also snared 21 rebounds to lead both teams in both departments. Ken Kemmish chipped in with 21 points and 9 rebounds, and Gene Kruse looked his finest of the young season in scoring 12 points.

Bunnies Invade The Short Court

Women's Intramurals began Monday, December 7, with an exciting Volleyball Tournament. Second Mickelsen and Argo Hall started the season's opener at 7:00 p.m. Second Mickelsen won both games, 15-4 and 15-9. At 8:00 p.m. Mickey III upset the Fourth Floor Bunnies 15-11 and 15-2.

The next games will be played Monday, December 14. At 7:00 p.m. Argo Hall meets Mickey III and at 8:00 p.m. Second Mickelsen will contend with the Fourth Floor Bunnies.

Vikingettes Meet Omaha Art Aces

Dana's Vikingettes began their basketball season Tuesday, November 24, by traveling to Benson in Omaha. There they competed with the Art Ace's of Omaha who were the former Omaha Wrights.

The Art Ace's jumped out in front the first quarter and retained their lead throughout the remainder of the game. The final score was Art Ace's 63 and Dana 34. Linda Cleaver was high scorer for Dana with 15 points, while Diane Grindell took scoring honors for the winners with 18 points.

This year the Vikingettes have eighteen girls out for the basketball squad. They are hoping for a successful season. They also hope to have a lot of support from the student body and the cheerleaders.
