## Minds Puzzle Over Logical (?) Puzzles

Charles Dodgson (Lewis Carroll) delighted in logical puzzles as well as in photography, young girls, and story-telling. See if you can solve these puzzles by reasoning. (The second puzzle has bothered some pretty perceptive minds.)

1. "It was most absurd of you to offer it! You might have known, if you had any sense that no old sailors ever like gruel!"

"But I thought, as he was an uncle of yours . . ."

"You may call it stuff if you like. All I know is, my uncles are all old men; and they like gruel like anything!"

"Well then, your uncles are—" From the information given what are his uncles?

2. A barber shop has three barbers, A, B, and C. (1) is infirm, so if he leaves the shop B has to go with him. (2) All three cannot leave together since then the shop would be empty. Now with these two premises, let us make an assumption and test its consequences. Let us assume that C goes out. Then it follows that if A goes out, B stays in (by premise 2). But (by premise 1) if A goes out, B goes out, too. Thus our assumption that C goes out has led to a conclusion that we know to be false. Hence the assumption is false, and hence C can't go out. But this is nonsense, for C obviously can go out without disobeying either of these restrictions. C can in fact go out whenever A stays in. Thus strict reasoning from apparently consistent premises leads to two mutually contradictory conclusions.

## Senate Indicates Change In Store

The faculty senate meets every year to set up the agenda for faculty meetings. Besides setting up the various committees and appointing fellow faculty members to them, they also make recommendations as to the promotion and tenure of faculty members elected by the faculty plus the Dean and President of the college. The four members are: Dr. Hansen, Dr. Lehmer, Mr. Ragan, and Mr. Weckmueler.

This year the faculty senate has two major projects in mind. The first one is to make a divisional structure with two or three divisions. There would be a faculty member at the head of each division who would answer directly to the president. As it is, we have twenty to thirty departments and therefore twenty to thirty heads which makes for confusion. Under this new system several of the departments would be put together under a divisional head.

The faculty senate is working in cooperation with the Educational Plans and Policy Committee on this second recommendation. They would like to have the courses divided into an upper and lower structure. The lower structure would contain most of those courses that are required and the upper would contain the more advanced courses. In order to go from the lower to upper division the student would be screened or have to have a certain grade point average. This second recommendation is just a possibility and nothing has been decided on it yet.

Each year students from Lutheran schools from all over the United States are invited to attend the Washington Seminar for Lutheran students. This year it will be held from April 11-14. The topic will be the "Workings of the Government in Washington." Included in the trip are tours to points of interest in Washington. Anyone interested should see Dave Israel. ## Peace Corps Tests Given On Campus

An opportunity for Dana residents to test their aptitudes for Peace Corps service will come at 8:30 A.M., Saturday, March 13. Check with Mr. Emmerich for details.

The opportunity is the Peace Corps Placement Test. It is not passed or failed, but simply indicates where your greatest potential lies. The Peace Corps Questionnaire, which must be filled out and brought to the exam unless previously submitted, tells what an applicant has done in the past. But the placement test is aimed at showing what he or she can do in the future. Applicants do not have to register for the test ahead of time.

The Peace Corps Questionnaire can be obtained at all Post Offices. On college campuses, they are available at college placement centers or the Peace Corps Liaison officers who are members of the faculty or college administration. If you can't find a Questionnaire, write the Peace Corps, Washington, D. D. 20525.

There are two parts to the Peace Corps Placement Test: a general aptitude test and a modern language aptitude test (for which knowledge of a foreign language is not necessary). Applicants should plan on about one and a half hours at the testing center, unless they wish to take the Spanish or French language achievement test, which requires an additional hour.

Test results are used, with the character references and Questionnaires, to estimate the applicant's potential for completing the intensive training program and his ability to be an effective Volunteer overseas.

Have you ever wondered about the quality of life? That is, do you look at and experience things in a bi-polar manner? Or should I say, do you see the ugliness in beauty and the beauty in ugliness? I like very much the technique Fyodor Dostoevsky used in his novels. It is "the 'magic of extremes' that had shaken Dostoevsky's personal life which made him follow man into the darkest corridors of his mind, where nothing remains hidden and where the only way out is the flight into God's open arms." He has captured "the astounding confusion between beauty and viciousness in man's interior world (which) is the recurring theme of this 'morbid' Russian novelist, and the oceanic welter of passion and harmony that marks the flow of his characters rise out of that mysterious something called the human soul."

One need not run into Omaha to spy on man. Look around. These extremes exist here at Dana. There is the fella who furtively threw a snow ball at me and then went sneaking off thinking he got away with something—but look at his cry to be free and expressive. There is the discomfort of looking at someone's eyes while we are talking to them, as if we are afraid of seeing our phyness, but yet many times when we do look we see real love and concern. There is the "man" who "sneaks" ahead in a cafeteria line like a pampered child, but yet we see his desire to assert his freedom, his aggressiveness which is good. There is the Christian who hates and asserts prejudice, but yet he can and does love. There is the teacher here who is like the student, rationalizing his weaknesses and causes the students to suffer because of it—but yet knowledge and guidance flows from him. There is the weak man who tries to be an (athlete, lover, bully), but yet he flourishes in his courage that he is. There is the individual (or individuals) who sits in the cafeteria while eating watching and vulgarly desirous of the opposite sex, but it is this person who can and does give his heart with regretful and remorseful repentance. There is the student who hates the black, but yet it is this same person who is attempting to remove this rottenness from life.

It does not matter where we are on this campus—dorms, classrooms, canteen, or walking from building to building—there is this quality with us—the false hello, but yet glad that we can say hello. I offer no solution but only what I see and feel—I am only "life that wants to live in the midst of other life that wants to live." "I strongly believe in what Spinoza once said, for only then can I live with and appreciate other people. He wrote, "I have made a ceaseless effort, not to ridicule, not to bewail, nor to scorn human actions, but to understand them."

## Gregg Smith Singers At Dana March 16

The Gregg Smith Singers will make their third appearance on Dana's campus Tuesday, March 16, at Alumni Memorial Auditorium at 8 p.m. Admission will be by activities card.

Every one of the singers is a graduate of music from universities or colleges in Southern California, and a professional musician, with many of the group's singers doubling as instrumentalists.

An unusual facet of the group's personality is the presence of so many composers and conductors in the membership. At least half a dozen Gregg Smith Singers have had their works published or performed. Several are conductors of their own church choirs. Gregg Smith, a composer-conductor himself, attributes the interest of the Gregg Smith Singers in new music to this unusual background. "We feel we must try the difficult, the new to be a truly twentieth-century choral ensemble."

In fact, the Gregg Smith Singers have developed a "twentieth century-sound" even when they perform an America folk song or a Renaissance motet. It is the sound of "incredible musicianship, discipline, and devotion." (Los Angeles Times).

This choral group has performed in such well known cities as Chicago, Illinois, Los Angeles and a little known city as David City, Nebraska. They have given concerts in France, Italy, Germany, Belgium and even in a pub in Distedfodd, Wales.

# Student Congregation Guidelines

## PREAMBLE

Believing that God was in Christ reconciling the world unto himself and that this message of reconciliation is witnessed to by the Holy Scriptures, we unite in this congregation in worship of God and service in his kingdom.

## ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of this worshipping congregation shall be . . .

## ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP

Worshippers in this congregation shall retain membership in their respective home congregation and they shall be encouraged to continue communion participation and contributions in their home congregations.

## ARTICLE III. SACRAMENTS AND MINISTERIAL ACTS

Authorization for the campus pastor to administer the sacraments shall be given by First Lutheran Church of Blair, Nebraska. Reports of baptisms and holy communion may be sent to the student's home congregation whenever possible. Where this is not possible these records may be reported to, and recorded in the records of First Lutheran Church of Blair, Nebraska.

## ARTICLE IV. LEADERSHIP

Leadership in this congregation shall reside in a council of twelve people: ten students, who shall be elected annually within four weeks after the beginning of the second semester, plus the pastor, and the Student Body Religious Director.

This council shall elect its own officers.

Vacancies shall be filled as they occur by a general election at a business meeting of the congregation.

## ARTICLE V. PASTOR

The Campus Pastor of Dana College shall be the pastor of this congregation unless otherwise designated by the Board of Regents.

## ARTICLE VI. BUSINESS MEETINGS

Business meetings of the congregation shall be held within the first four weeks of each semester and as found necessary by the pastor or the council.

## ARTICLE VII. PROCEDURE

All business proceedings of the council and the congregation shall be conducted in accordance with standard parliamentary procedure.

## ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Amendments may be proposed by the council or the congregation in session and may be adopted by a two-thirds vote of the proposing body at its next business meeting.

# Will Student Body Dues Be Raised?

In the February 18 Student Council meeting, Dan Aten reported on the results of the opinion poll. Quoted from the Student Council Minutes, the following questions were asked and their results given.

"Would you be willing to pay an increase in general fees from \$75 to \$76.50, with the increase of \$1.50 going to the Student Body treasury? This increase would enable Student Council to bring to you such things as big name entertainers, speakers from large universities and/or groups of an entertaining or informative nature. Results—YES 92%, NO 8%. Would you be willing to pay \$2.50 per ticket to sponsor a big name entertainer to Dana this semester? Results— YES 81%, NO 1%, IN DIFFERENT 17%.

If the Student Council is interested in raising Student Body dues for next year, we will need to act soon in order to get the change in the catalogue. After a definite proposal has been set up it will be brought to the living units for discussion.

# Scholarships Available For Dana Graduates

An expanded program of Valparaiso University Law School scholarships available to graduates of Lutheran colleges and universities has been announced by Dr. O. P. Kretzmann, VU president.

One full-tuition scholarship will be available annually to a graduate of each of the 27 colleges involved.

Professor Louis Bartelt, acting dean of the law school, explained that the new program is an outgrowth of one established several years ago for Lutheran schools in the Midwest.

The expanded scholarship list includes Lutheran colleges and universities throughout the nation and in all synods.

Each university will nominate its own candidate for the VU law scholarship which will be renewable for students who maintain high scholastic averages.

# Communication Is A Continuing Goal

Communication is the interchange or transmission of thoughts and ideas and beliefs by means of words, signs, and actions. Last weekend by several means the communication of the gospel and the idea that Christians should communicate the gospel were tried. In the attempt it was found that often we do not have a very clear idea of what we are trying to communicate. But it was also discovered that there are ways in which we can communicate the gospel to someone else.

Hopefully the response and involvement of those who participated in "Hyde Park" will continue. What we accomplish depends on how effectively we communicate. Actions and words are needed if an idea or a belief are to become living realities. Again we are reminded of the words of Paul to put on the whole armor of God and to stand. In the communication of the gospel we are called to be positive in both that which we do and in that which we say. Paul also tells us to put off the things of the flesh, those things which only keep us from communicating the gospel. He also tells us to be our own judges, not to argue and fight over doctrine and things which do not matter. Nothing is to keep us from proclaiming the gospel, God in Christ revealing himself to man. With such a positive gospel let us continue to communicate each according to our abilities and opportunities.

## Northwestern Takes Intramural Games Conference Title Decide Champions

Northwestern ran its league leading record to 11-1 with a 76-52 win over Dana at Borup Coliseum last Saturday night. The game completed the season for the Vikings, who finished in a sixth-place tie with a 3-9 conference mark and 6-17 overall.

Again Dana lost it in the field as Northwestern made 48% compared to 27%. Northwestern grabbed an early lead and coasted to a halftime lead. Dana cut the margin to 15 points at one point in the second half before falling behind nearly 30 points.

Ken Kemmish led Dana scorers with 13 points; Bill Weigel and Don Stille chipped in with 7 and 8 respectively. Gary Shuck had 6 points besides pulling down 9 rebounds, high for the Vikings.

The tournaments for intramural basketball are in full swing as all quarter-final games have been completed, along with two semi-finals.

In Class A, Gotcha's moved into the finals with a 56-46 win over the Sadists. The Gotchas will play the winner of the Fardquards I-Floaters I game. Results of the quarter finals:

- Fardquards I—53, Rejects—51
- Floaters I—45, Golden Boys—39

In Class B, Elks II defeated Malemen I, 37-33; Tabiloi slipped past Malemen II, 53-43; Fardquards II upset Mickey's, Mousers, 45-37; and Raiders II ravished Floaters II, 44-21, Elks I then moved into the finals with a 47-30 win over Tabiloi, and will play the winner of the Fardquards II-Raiders I game.

The next games will be played March 1, and the championships will be decided for both classes March 3. Intramural volleyball will probably start the week after.
