The 1964-65 school year is rapidly drawing to a finale, perhaps too soon for some who have let everything slide until the last minute (some?). This is one of the two remaining editorials of the year, and in it I would like to wrap up an incident which occurred some time ago. Some of you still remember the "barber shop" incident. One of our foreign students was refused service at one of the barber shops in Blair. This caused a certain amount of commotion among those students who heard of the happenings. At first indignant, they later decided it might be wise to go down and talk with the barber and try to understand his side of the situation. This is where I came in, and this is a synopsis of what Jim and I talked about.

Jim's barber shop is located in the same block as Duffey's grocery, and has not been in existence for too long. Jim is a relatively newcomer in the community of Blair. It was because he was uncertain how the community felt about matters of segregation that he refused service to our colored student. He has nothing against Negroes. It isn't always easy being a newcomer, as Jim found out.

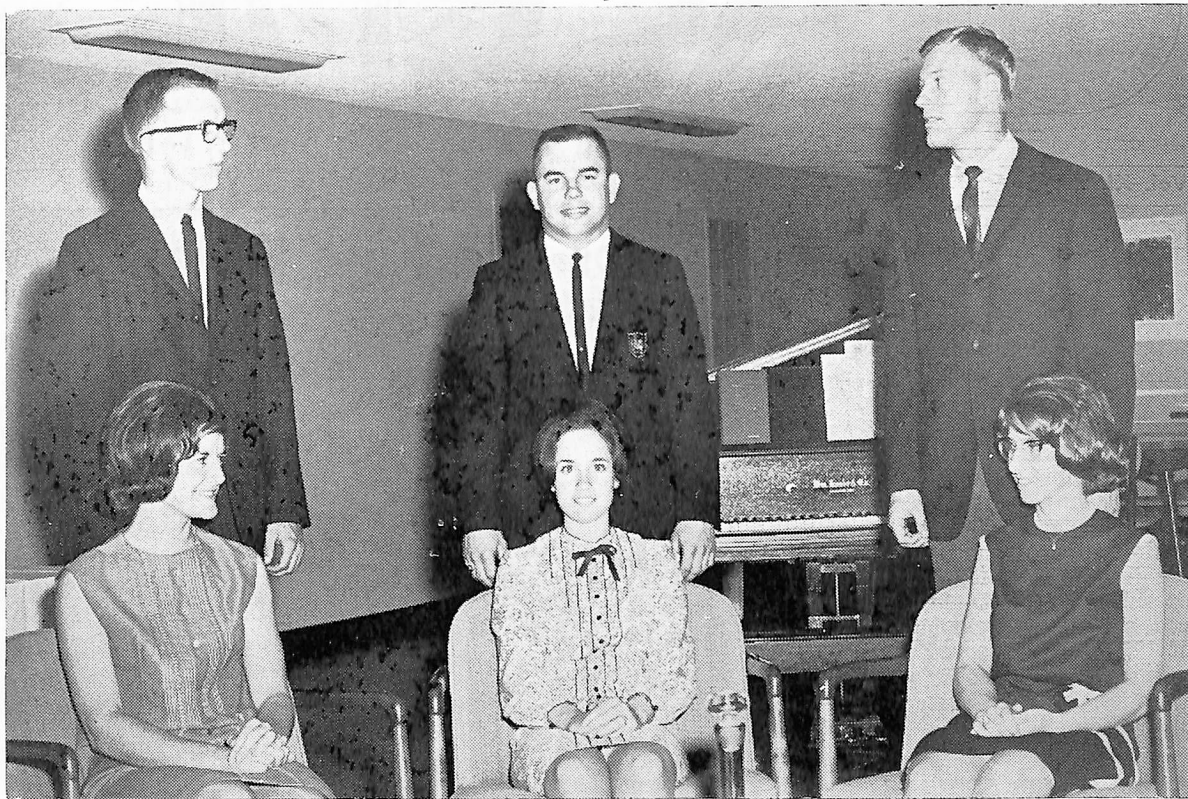
Jim has a new policy now. His doors are open to all potential customers, regardless of race. His stand has been taken, and he will follow through with it. There should be no hard feelings between anyone concerning this matter.

Jim got involved in a bigger and more far reaching situation than simply deciding whether or not to cut a Negro's hair. A person doesn't always ask to have something occur which will involve him in a prevailing problem. It happens, however, regardless of our searching it out. It is impossible to "make like an ostrich" in the struggle for civil rights, and simply because we have not yet taken a stand are we protected from having to do so in the future.

It takes courage, real courage, to back an idea which many people are against. Have you got it? One step has been taken in the right direction by a barber in Blair. How about you?

New Loan Fund Available For Those In Training

College juniors who wish to use the summer before their senior year to prepare for post-graduation Peace Corps service now may borrow up to \$600 to help pay their senior school expenses. Loan repayment may be deferred until after Peace Corps service has been completed.

The loan program, announced today by Peace Corps Director Sargent Shriver, is the product of an agreement between United Student Aid Fund, Inc. (USA Fund) and the Peace Corps Volunteers Fund, a non-profit foundation established by the Peace Corps National Advisory Council.

Privately funded, the loans are guaranteed by USA Fund, a non-profit corporation providing loan guarantees to students on 700 campuses, with the participation of more than 6,000 banks throughout the United States.

The loans are expected to enable more third-year college students to enroll in the Peace Corps Advanced Training Program a two-phase plan that provides intensive Peace Corps training during the summer months between the junior and senior year, and just after graduation. Many students who have had to work during summer months now may participate in the Peace Corps Advanced Program.

Allen D. Marshall, president of the USA Fund, called the loan program "A Unique relationship between two private organizations (USA Fund and the Peace Corps Volunteer Fund) jointly benefiting a unique agency of our Federal Government."

Trainees in the Advanced Training Program begin their Peace Corps training in June. They receive travel allowances to cover transportation to and from the training center, and a living allowance while training. Selection for the Advanced Training Program is the same as that used for all Peace Corps applicants, based on an evaluation of the candidate's background as revealed in the Peace Corps Questionnaire, Placement Test results, and character references.

Evaluation continues during the summer training program, and final selection is not made until the end of the second stage, following college graduation.

Following the eight-week summer program, Advanced Training participants return to their regular college, where they may continue language study on an individual basis. No specific course requirements are made.

After graduation, participants return to a training center for eight weeks more of intensive instruction. Those who successfully complete the final training program then will begin their work abroad as regular Peace Corps Volunteers.

The members of the Peace Corps National Advisory Council, who were instrumental in originating the Peace Corps Volunteers Fund are Ralph Lazarus, president, Federated Department Stores, Inc.; Donald Petrie, Chairman, Executive Committee of Avis, Inc.; the Rev. John J. Considine, director, Latin American Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference; and former Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, Arthur Flemming, now president, University of Oregon.

On the map, Mrs. Hauge (Dana's former Dean of Women) lived only an inch away; it turned out to be ten miles. "Sure is fun to walk. Beautiful weather. We should do this in Nebraska," we commented, gobbling peanuts during the first seven miles. Somewhere in the eighth, we began hitchhiking.

On our first try a very sweet lady picked us up. She, like the three farmers we'd asked before, had never heard of the Hagues. Finally, in the little village of Kolkar, a kindly truck driver repeated slowly the directions to Hagues farm, outside of town. It was time to walk again; the sweet lady was going the opposite way. Tim Brown and Wally Weland-er each contributed two hits in the nightcap. Jim Jorgensen turned in a sparkling performance from the mound, striking out fourteen and walking only two in eight innings. It was Jorgensen's third victory of the season.
