## The Dana Folk Troupe Is Planning Grand Schedule

Originating in 1957, Dana Folk Dancers is one of the traditions that Dana has inherited from her mother country, Denmark.

Sandra Thomsen was the organizer of the group, with The American Scandinavian Foundation serving as the mother organization for the group.

"To have fun" is the main reason for the organization stated Jeanne Froehling, who is serving this year as co-director along with Kathy McKenna. They perform original Danish folk dances in authentic native costumes that they plan for themselves. New costumes are being planned this year.

A troupe of the dancers accompanied the Dana Choir in 1961 when it journeyed to Denmark. The dancers have also performed at the Joselyn Art Museum, the

Strategic Air Command Headquarters, at Peony Park in Omaha for the Republican convention last year, at National Conventions of both the Danish Brotherhood and Danish Sisterhood, and at the Ak-Sar-Ben Square Dance Festival.

This year a tentative tour in the Mid-West has been planned. The troupe also will be appearing here the Friday night and Saturday morning of Homecoming, and October 20 during the Brandeis Danish Day Celebration. They appeared on the West Coast last year as guests of Walt Disney.

There are about 50 students involved in the dance group, with around twenty of these new members. This is the largest turnout the group has had since it was started. Only about eight couples dance at one time.

## "Students To Search for Meaning"

"A Voice In the Wilderness" is the main theme for Spiritual Emphasis Week-end, Saturday through Monday.

With the aid of a guest speaker, a drama, a contemporary recording and discussion groups, Dana students will search for the importance of communication among people and God.

Saturday a play, "Construction", by Ralph Stone will be presented by a cast of Danians under the direction of Vaudine Weber.

In the evening, open house in faculty homes will be the setting for discussion groups concerning the play.

The final event on Saturday will be a communion service.

Rev. Roger K. Guy of Sterling, Colorado, using three outstanding lines from "Construction", will be the guest speaker at Sunday morning worship.

In the afternoon, a modern recording, "The Zoo Story," also dealing with the communication among people and God, will be played.

A special litany will be held Sunday evening.

The week-end activities will close with a chapel talk Monday by Rev. Guy.

## Student Chapel In Distant Future?

Plans for a new separate chapel are in the discussion stage only.

Nothing definite has yet been planned, but much thought is being given to this project.

It is estimated that the college will not put up a chapel building for less than \$275,000. This would include exclusively designed interior and furnishings.

Chapel cost can run as high as \$650,000 and as low as \$17,000 (converted army barracks).

Money for the chapel is planned to be raised by donations only. This means that the students will have to work to help raise the money. The chapel will not be named after a major donor.

## Denmark Sending Dana More Lights

Dana is anticipating the arrival of eight beautiful old light fixtures which for more than one hundred years have hung in Borsen, Denmark's Board of Trade building in Copenhagen.

This information was released by Paul E. Strand, the Associate Director of Development, who said that during a visit to Denmark this past summer he spent some time with a cousin who was recently elected Chairman of the Board of Trade.

As they toured the more-than-three-hundred-sixty-year-old building, he inquired about the possibility of gifts for Dana's proposed new Campus Center. His cousin offered the light fixtures from Borsen, promising to crate and ship them to Dana as a gift of Denmark's Board of Trade.

The Swedish American Line, as the result of current negotiations, has offered to transport those fixtures to this country, also as a gift to Dana.

There are still difficulties such as customs duties to be overcome, but it is hoped that one or more of these historical light fixtures will grace our new Campus Center when it is completed.

## Dana Offense Ineffective; Vikes Play Sioux Falls Next

"We need to get some momentum in our attack."

Thus Coach Grand Walls described Dana's main problem this season.

The failure of the offense has not only reduced the Viking's yardage but has also given opponents more chances to score.

"Our defense has been good," said Walls. "The only problem is that it plays too much."

The secondary has been especially strong. Jerry Bray, halfback, leads the team in tackles. Only about one-fifth of the passes thrown against Dana has been completed.

Coach Walls planned to emphasize passing during practice this week. He said that he will use both Andersons, Ron and Phil, at quarterback until one moves the team better than the other.

Dana's injuries were numerous Saturday. Tim Brown hurt his knee and did not play during the second half, but he expected to be ready for Sioux Falls.

Bob Longacre and Bob Hansen were bothered by less serious ailments. Both should be healed by Saturday, according to Mr. Walls.

Ken Quirk, whom Walls considers the Viking's quickest-starting back, did not play against Midland.

His badly pulled thigh muscle kept him out of uniform. He should see action Saturday.

Sioux Falls has improved considerably since last year, Walls said. The team has size and speed.

Sioux Falls has defeated Concordia and lost to Westmar only when a touchdown was nullified by a penalty.

On Saturday, October 9, the Dana Vikings are host to Sioux Falls College, another conference rival. Sioux Falls downed Concordia 20-13 last week to win their first conference game. The Vikings are due and I hope to see the Braves tuck their head feathers away Saturday afternoon. GO BIG RED!!!

# Wisconsin Prexy Will Talk On Communism at Lyceum



DR. HARRINGTON

"America and The Communist World: The Next 20 Years" will be the title of the lecture presented by Dr. Fred Harvey Harrington next Monday at 8:00 p.m. in A.M.A.

Dr. Harrington, a distinguished historian and educator, is president of the University of Wisconsin. He has served on various national educational committees and has been active in professional societies. These include the American Council on Education, Commission on Academic Affairs and the Institute of International Education Advisory Committee of College and University Presidents.

As a specialist in American diplomatic history and Lincoln and the Civil War period, Dr. Harrington has published, "God, Mammon, and the Japanese"; "Fighting Politician: Major General N. P. Banks"; and "Hanging Judge," the biography of Isaac C. Parker. He also the two-volume "An American History," and a "History of American Civilization," both in collaboration with other historians.

He has lectured at the American Studies Seminar at the University of Kyoto, Japan, and was named "Outstanding Wisconsin Citizen" in 1965 by the Wisconsin region, National Conference of Christians and Jews, Inc.

The lecture is free with admission by Activities Card, being sponsored by the Special Events Committee.
