The presentation of the royal court and the coronation of the 1965 Homecoming Queen will begin at 8 p.m. in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. Mr. Palmer will then begin the royal concert.

Dr. Madsen Gets Honor

President Madsen has been awarded an honorary doctor of divinity degree by Midland College at Fremont.

The presentation was made as Midland dedicated a new \$1,250,000 science center.

Dr. Henry Margenau, New Haven, Connecticut, was given an honorary doctor of public service degree. A 1924 graduate of Midland, he is professor of physics and natural history at Yale University.

Others honored were Ed H. Bailey, president of the Union Pacific Railroad, who received an honorary doctor of laws degree, and J. Dale Milliken of Fremont, President of the Fremont National Bank, who was given an honorary doctor of business administration degree.

Dr. Margenau noted in his dedication speech that most American institutions suffer from over-emphasis on technology and gadgetry and said:

"Here is where I see the unique role of church-affiliated college."

The new Midland building has floors of classrooms and laboratories and a planetarium.

Groth Praises Dana's Values, Criticizes Smoking

"Scientific research has given us the answer relative to smoking and health; consequently, it should be out for both men and women!"

That was the reaction of Dean of Women, Esther Groth, to a question about smoking privileges for girls in the Canteen.

"Let me preface my remarks by saying that I favor all those things for Dana students which will promote their health, morals, education, and general welfare," Miss Groth said.

In response to the question of favoring equal rights for both sexes, she said, "Yes, I stand, as most others do, for equal rights; i.e., whenever the factors concerned elevate individuals.

"We have had an Equal Rights Amendment before each session of Congress since 1923. In substance, it states that equal rights shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by the states on account of sex.

"The proposed amendment has not been passed, due not to apathy or disinterest, but because of the view of the Women's Bureau, labor unions, and other organizations. These groups hold that women's welfare can be

served best, in the main, by protective legislation.

"Such legislation has protected women from working in mines, unsanitary conditions, and from doing heavy labor."

Miss Groth, continued:

"Dana has very high Christian standards—academic, moral, and social. One will have to travel far, and then, without finding as courteous, devout, and responsible a student body as here at Dana.

"Each seems to consider himself as an assistant architect to the administration of the institution, dedicated to keeping the treasured traditions and advancing Dana's high standards.

"I am told, because of this favorable image, the students here and their parents chose Dana rather than some other institution.

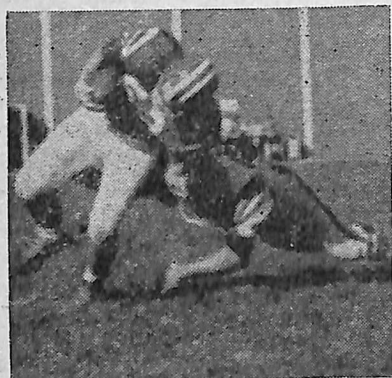
"Does it not then behoove us to see that the Dana image is not impaired and to work for the good, the fine, and the admirable things that will make the image still more renowned?"

Dana Vikings Break Long Losing Streak

Heads-up ball was the key behind the hustling Dana ball club Saturday. Four pass interceptions, two by Marlow Remmers, and three fumble recoveries for the Vikings kept them in command.

Bill Sorenson, 187 pound freshman full-back, made his best showing of the season while scoring his second and third touchdown of the season. Early in the second period the Vikings topped a sustained drive when Phil Anderson scored from the four yard line.



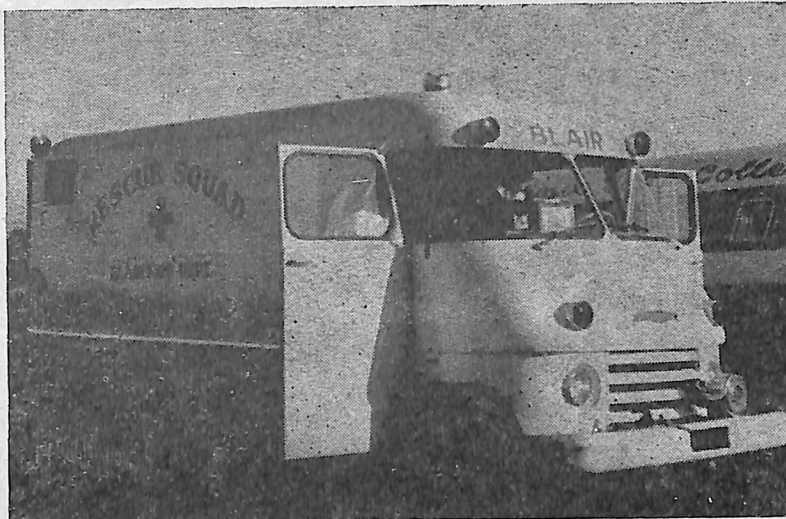
Bill Sorenson - 100 yards gained

The game seemed to come back to an even keel midway in the second period when Sioux Falls speedster Larry Skogerboe returned a punt for 81 yards to tally for the Braves. From this point on, however, it was a Viking game all the way. With 5:11 remaining in the second quarter a Dana quarterback sneak went 58 yards for the score. Just before the half Bill Sorenson scored on a play which was set up by an Anderson to Quirk pass on the previous down.

Early in the second period Jerry Quirk was on the receiving end of a pass that went for the TD. Sorenson added his second score midway through the same stanza. Failing to convert all of the P.A.T. attempts, Dana tallied a total of 30 points.

The Braves could muster only one more TD, and this was against Dana reserves in the closing minutes of the game. Scoring both their extra points, the Braves ended up on the short end of a 30-14 final score.

The Dana Vikings played with definitely improved desire Saturday. I can't help but wonder what grabbed the Vikings by the horns. See you in Yankton! GO BIG RED! !

Dana Meets Tough Yankton Bulldogs

"Yankton is the class of the league — the team to beat," said Coach Grant Walls.

He hastened to add that Dana can beat the Bulldogs.

"Yankton," he said, "is a big, fast team."

The best Yankton players are John Hughes, a senior quarterback; Roger Heirigs, a speedy sophomore halfback; and Jesse Bankston, a 213-pound senior full-back.

Heirigs leads all small college players in scoring. He has eight touchdowns and eight extra points.

Coach Walls saw the Bulldogs play Midland last week and noticed that Yankton employs an eight-man rush and keeps the secondary deep. He said that he plans to throw short passes between the 0 line and the defensive halfbacks. "Once you break through (their line)," he said, "you usually have a big gain."

Mr. Walls was quite happy with Saturday's performance against Sioux Falls. "We moved the ball," he said. "The boys did the job."

Three players stood out for Dana. Phil Anderson, who started the first time, completed five of eight passes, one for a touchdown, and ran for two more touchdowns. All five pass receptions were made by Jerry Quirk. Bill Sorenson also scored twice.

These three accounted for about 250 yards of Dana's total of 300. Reserves Dennis Sellon and Max Boustead also played well.

Alert defense was a key. Dana defenders recovered three Sioux Falls fumbles and intercepted four passes.

"They didn't quit," said Mr. Walls. "They wanted to win."

Homecoming events continue on Saturday with several coffee hours for the Alumni all day. Tivoli Park will be open in the morning. A special feature of the day will be helicopter rides over the campus and town.

The Parade of Royalty and bands will begin at 1:30 p.m. at Viking Field. Immediately afterward the Dana Vikings will host the Northwestern Red Raiders.

The Continental Buffet Dinner will be served at 5:30, 6:30 and 7:30 p.m. in the Dining Room. Borup Coliseum will be the scene of the traditional Homecoming Dance. The Dance will begin at 9:30 p.m.

Tickets for the Buffet Dinner are free to students with seven day meal tickets. Everyone planning to attend the Buffet Dinner must pick their tickets up in the Dining Hall next week.

Tickets for the Homecoming Dance will go on sale next week. They may be purchased from Tammy Lykke or any other member of the Dance Committee.

A special feature of the weekend for the Alumni will be the program Saturday evening honoring former students and faculty of Trinity Seminary. The annual choir reunion will be at this time.

These values are present today in the ordained men in the administration and faculty: C. C. Madsen, Richard Jensen, John Nielsen, Clif Hansen and F. W. Thomsen.

The Trinity Seminary Program will begin at 8:15 in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. Dr. R. E. Morton, former Dana President, will be the master of ceremonies. Dr. William Larsen, secretary of the American Lutheran Church, will be the featured speaker.

"Homecoming in Tivoli" will close Sunday with the Sunday worship service in the morning and the Campus Open House in the afternoon.

Dr. Edward Hansen of Willmar, Minn., will speak at the Festive worship service in Alumni Memorial Auditorium. The service will begin at 10:30 a.m.

Dramatic Readings Will Be Given In Three Chapels

"Don Juan in Hell," a reading from George Bernard Shaw's "Man and Superman," will be presented at chapel periods Monday through Wednesday next week.

A dramatic presentation of this kind is an invitation for chapel, Campus Pastor Richard Jensen said.

"This is not an attempt to preach a sermon in a clever guise," he said. "We will hear, rather, the 'preaching' — to use Shaw's own words — of a very learned man of our century."

Pastor Jensen said Shaw's "preaching" will lead listeners "to think through the meaning of ideas like life and death, Heaven and Hell and the nature of existence itself."

It should not be classified as Christian "preaching", Pastor Jensen said. "Shaw's ideas invite us as Christians, however, to reflect upon some of the meanings of very basic concepts in our theological jargon."

The readings will be under the supervision of Rod Whitaker of the Drama Department.

Budget Passed By The Student Body

At the first 1965-1966 student body meeting, the proposed \$3,375 first semester budget presented by the Student Council was passed as presented.

President Tim Jensen and other council members explained the budget.

Among the items questioned were the two hundred dollars listed for cheerleaders and the \$1,035 listed as social miscellaneous.

It was explained that the purchase of new uniforms caused the large amount to be set aside for cheerleaders.

The social committee chairman, Rick Houston explained that his committee hopes to obtain a big name group some time this year, and the \$1,035 in the social budget will cover its expenses.

A total of \$1,635 was appropriated for general expenses including conferences, cheerleaders, publicity and office supplies.

The appropriation for intramurals was 125 dollars.

Other amounts approved:

Religious, including chapel and Spiritual Emphasis Days, expenses, 130 dollars.

Social, including dances, a hayrack ride and other events, \$1,485.
