## ALC Points Us To Becoming Involved

Last weekend ten Dana students sacrificed their mother's home cooked "turkey with all the trimmin's" to attend a conference discussing the church's role toward those who couldn't afford "turkey with all the trimmin's."

These ten students met with about 200 other students of the ALC to discuss the church's attitude toward The Other America, the America of the poor.

We were stimulated by the thoughts of a Jewish rabbi, a Roman Catholic priest and a Lutheran theologian-social reformer. Each was a brilliant thinker. Each is a leader in social reform.

Their comments attempted to answer several questions. What is to be the role of the church in making social reform an actuality? What is the responsibility of the individual christian? How are we to work together? What methods can the church in good convenience use in forcing social reform? Does the end justify the means?

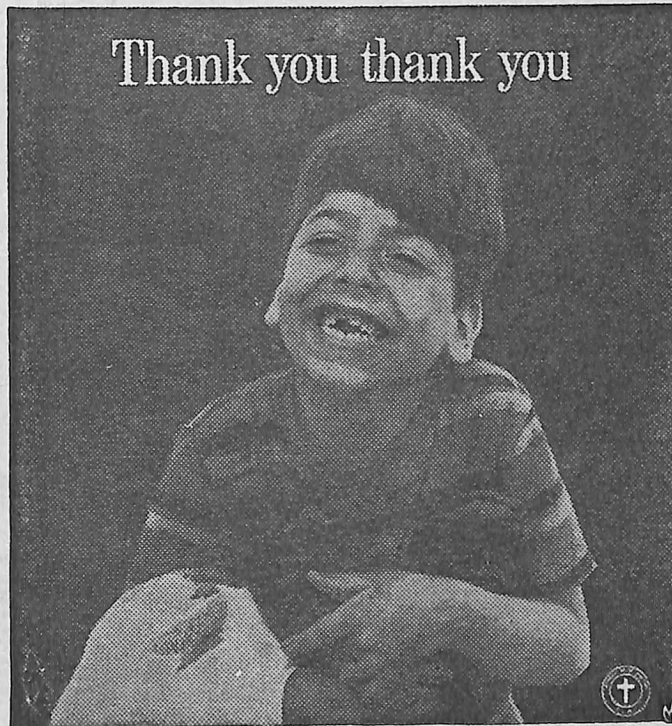
These questions were big ones to answer. In light of the problems of poverty, racism and Viet Nam, the answers must be considered crucial.

We got no easy answers. We did leave the conference with one valuable insight. We were convinced that we as students **MUST BECOME AWARE** of the social problems around us.

We cannot shut ourselves off from them. We cannot allow ourselves the luxury of complacency. Once aware, we must find effective ways in which we can act. We must find ways in which we can protest the injustices of our age. **WE MUST BECOME INVOLVED.**

Now that we are back on campus, one additional question must be raised. What can Dana students do to change the injustices in society? What is our responsibility? How are we to act?

The delegates strongly encourage discussion of these questions. The ten of us cannot help but ask them to ourselves. We are sure that together all of the student body may be able to find some answers.

## Student Christmas Fund for Children to Begin Monday

My name is Warren. I am ten years old. I have two sisters, Emelda, 15 and Eunice, 13.

The three of us live with our mother in an old house. The house is very cold. Sometimes we don't have any money for food or heat.

My sisters and I don't go out very much. Not even to school. Sometimes we don't go because we don't have very good clothes. Lots of times we are sick, especially in the winter.

We are going to get money from our father. That's what mother says. But we never do. We don't even know where he is, Maybe he died?

Maybe you can help me and my sisters so we can have food and clothes and not be sick or cold anymore?

December 6 marks the beginning of a drive to collect money on the campus to give to a family like the one above.

This family is typical of the many, many families who live without food, clothes and warmth. One or both parents may be no good. Sickness or death may take one of the parents away and drain the family's resources. Poverty usually brings rejection and bitterness.

The counselor of each living unit will collect any contributions from December 6 through the 10. Faculty and Administration may place their donations in campus mail, Harold Berry, Fund Director.

The Student Council has started the fund with \$250. The plan of this drive is for the students to match this \$250 and go as far as possible.

The money will be given to the Washington County Welfare Agency. They will see that the money goes to deserving families or a family. A record will be kept of where the money goes. The name of the family or families will not be made public.

Harold said, "I hope every student will get behind this drive. This is a chance to do something about the injustices of our age."

## Basketball Outlook Looks Promising

The 65-66 Vikings have 10 lettermen and several new faces working with hopes of improving last season's conference and all games record. Dana won 6 and lost 17 in 1964-65 overall and had 3 wins and 9 losses in the conference race. The Vikings certainly feel the two records can be bettered and are preparing for this improvement.

The lettermen are led by senior Ken Kemmish, headed for his 4th letter. The 5'10" marksman netted 394 points last year, a 17 point average. He is closing in on the career scoring record held by Bill Davis ('58). Other seniors are Larry Anderson, troubled a good deal last year with an ankle sprain, and hard working Wally Welander. Both are slated for heavy duty. There are two returning juniors, each seeking their third letter. Billy Weigel was the number two scorer last year and should lead the Dana fast break. Gene Kruse will be trying to come back from an off year after a fine freshman season.

Five sophomores round out the list of lettermen. Back court members. Roger Reutlinger and Mike Hogzett, both six footers, figure to benefit by a year's experience. The big man on the squad, 6'5," Marv Enger, has shown some improvement thus far. Bill Ross, 6'3" Chicago product, will no doubt be on the starting lineup when the season opens. Gary Shuck, 6'4", will give a little bench support from the start.

New faces include a couple of 6'5" front liners that will see a lot of action. One, Tom Kalchik, transferred from Milwaukee and will not be eligible until the second semester. Dean Krueger, class C all-stater from Hebron, Nebraska, may crack the starting lineup. Other freshmen that could see action as the season progresses, are Brent Peterson, Paul Vasby, and John Fanta, 6'4" Dave Busse from Goodland High School, Kansas is an eager rookie looking for a position.
