Discipline is Topic Of Press Meeting

A press conference was held Wednesday, January 5, immediately following chapel. This second in a series of press conferences concerning Dana featured Dr. Rasmussen, Dean of Students, and Dr. Skogman, Dean of Men.

Though poorly attended, the press conference was very good. The questions, answers, and comments were frank, pertinent, and to the point.

The major topic of discussion was discipline. Many of the questions dealt with specific disciplinary action such as, social probation, expulsion, suspension. Dr. Skogman defended the practice of assigned work as punishment, a policy used frequently by Men's Dorm Council. The question of the roles played by the Deans, the dorm council, and student counselors in disciplinary action was also considered. Dr. Rasmussen stated his opinion that there was no real conflict in the role of a counselor (student or administrative), as both a counselor and a disciplinarian.

Another subject of interest was the question of women being allowed to live off campus.

English Actor To Appear On Stage

John Stuart Anderson offers an unusual and ambitious solo dramatic presentation.

The young British actor for the past seven years has through the medium of the drama attempted to bring the church and the arts closer together.

Mr. Anderson will appear in Alumni Memorial Auditorium Tuesday, February 1. This unique actor is being brought to the campus by the Special Events Committee.

"The Living Word" is the general title for Mr. Anderson's extensive repertoire. His program is drawn from many sources: historical, fictional, legendary and Biblical; all given from memory.

Using the text of the King James Bible he has arranged a number of Biblical dramas. He has been able to revive the old art of the story-teller and has revitalized the Biblical text.

Each program is a complete production with costumes lighting & music sometimes specially composed. The "New York Times" said, "With his outstanding voice and brilliant use of movement and gesture he holds his audience spellbound and transforms the written word into something that really lives."

Mr. Anderson was born in Burma, served in the Royal Air Force and studied at the University of St. Andrews.

As an actor he formed his own mime company and presented a series of his own mime plays on television and then entered a repertory theatre.

Possibility of Danish Lodge On Campus to Be Argued

On Friday evening, January 14th, at 7 p.m., there will be a meeting in room 210, Pioneer Memorial, to discuss the possible formation of a Danish Brotherhood and/or Danish Sisterhood Lodge on Dana's Campus. At this meeting, we will explain what such Lodge or Lodges can do for Dana and for you—what the requirements are for forming such Lodge or Lodges—what the requirements for membership are—and what it costs. All members of our Student Body, Faculty and Staff who are eligible for membership are invited to attend. To be eligible for membership, you must:

1. Be of Danish origin or extraction. (Have a Danish Ancestor).

OR

2. Be married to a person of Danish origin or extraction.

OR

3. Be related to a member.

Our campaign to have Danish Brotherhood Lodges furnish rooms in our new dormitory is now beginning to bear fruit. We Danians can lend a great deal of impetus to this campaign by forming a Lodge here on our own Campus, a Lodge that would eventually form another bond with the townspeople of Blair by inviting Blairites who are eligible to membership.

Membership in such a Lodge carries definite advantages to its members, as well as to our school. Such advantages will be fully explained at our meeting.

3. Kristi Planek: "I wish we could develop an education system without finals, but since we haven't, it should be left up to the teachers to decide who should take them."

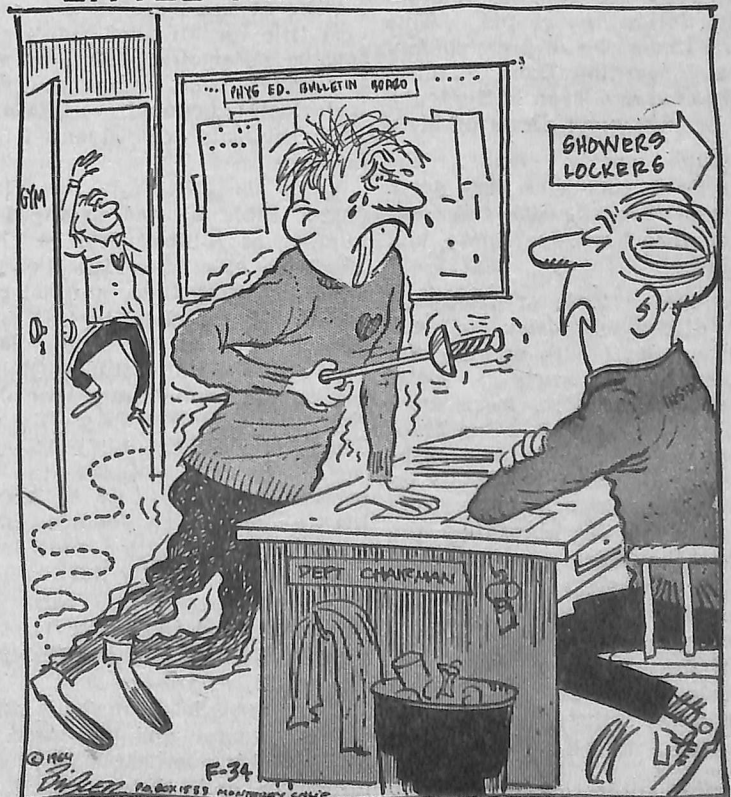
4. Mary Beth Rasey: "No, if

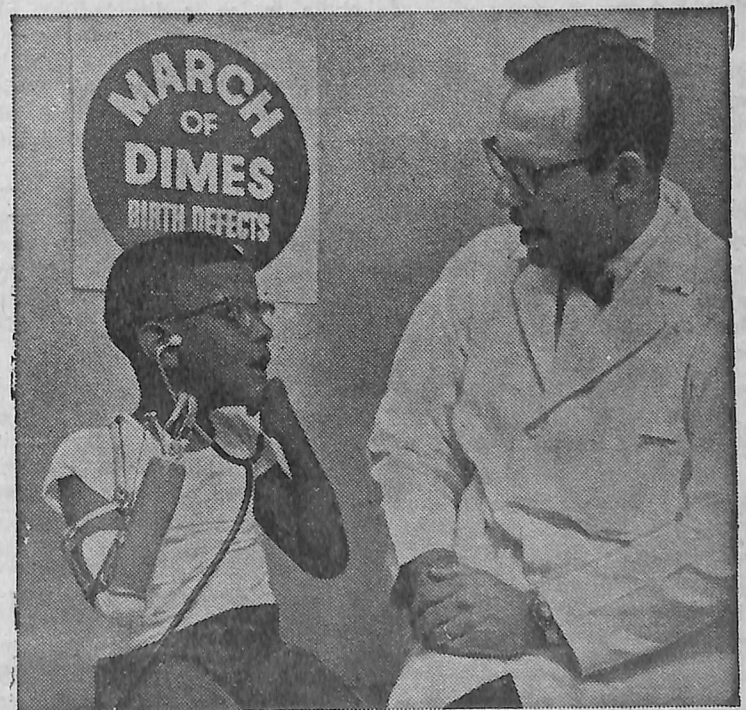

Allen, center director, how well he manipulates a stethoscope even though he was born without a right hand and wrist. Dr. Allen believes the younger a child is when fitted with an artificial limb, the better his chances are of learning to use it well. Each year 250,000 infants are born in the U.S. with this and other major birth defects. Moreover, birth defects are the nation's second greatest destroyer of life when prenatal loss is included. ATTENTION STUDENTS

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Dana Eligible For Two Million Dollars

Ten American Lutheran Church colleges throughout the country have been faced with a 107.5% increased enrollment in the past 15 years. Consequently, these colleges are now faced with enlarged student bodies and a need for more buildings.

The American Lutheran Church convention of 1964 gave considerable attention to the colleges' need for "capital funds." During the 1966 ALC convention a 20 million dollars pledge drive will be launched which will begin in the congregations on January 1, 1967.

Will this ALC drive benefit Dana College?

The answer is yes. If this projected drive is successful Dana College can receive up to one or two million dollars. To receive the benefits of this church-wide drive Dana will be required to contribute about three thousand dollars toward the costs of the campaign and also two fulltime men to assist in the campaign. It has been proposed to the Board of Regents that an additional man be hired to assist Boas Weismann, Director of Fund Raising, with the duties of the ALC drive.

Xmas Fund Drive Could Be Improved

\$560 was presented to the Washington County Welfare Office by the student body.

Of this amount \$310 was raised by the students and faculty. The remainder was given by the Student Council.

This money was used by the Welfare Office to help local families meet some of their financial needs.

Basketball Coaching Staff Shows Vast Experience

Mr. Dale Lemon, head basketball coach for the Dana Vikings, entered his third year at Dana College with the opening of the 1965-66 basketball season.

Lemon is a native of Oklahoma and graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan University and the University of Nebraska. While at Wesleyan, he lettered in football (was all-conference end), basketball and track.

Prior to accepting his present position, Lemon was head baseball coach for four years at Valley City State Teachers College in North Dakota. Strangely enough, the teams he coached at North Dakota were also known as the Vikings.

Mr. Paul Peterson, "Pete", has

been connected with Dana athletic teams since 1942 when he first assumed duties as football and basketball coach. He has also coached track during his time here.

He graduated from Dana College and coached at Craig and Blair, Nebraska High Schools before returning here.

He became Athletic Director in 1960 and is also Chairman of the Physical Education Department.
